Situated on a bend of the Mississippi River 100 miles from its mouth, New Orleans has been the chief city and the busiest northern port of the Gulf of Mexico since the early 1700's. It was founded by the French, ruled for 40 years by the Spanish, and bought by the United States in the 1803 Louisiana Purchase. Its culture is a unique blend of European, African, and Native American.

Though all the national events are on the 1:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. schedule, if you are content to play regional events you can play at 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. every day, or maybe like us, you do some of each. Our best man from our wedding 51 years ago and his wife live in New Orleans. They have lived in New Orleans for many years and were forced out of their home after Katrina for 16 months. They evacuated to Chicago because a son lives there. Their tales of helping Katrina evacuees was heartwarming in that it demonstrated the generosity of Americans to those in need.

Another interesting story about our time with our friends was the first night we were supposed to meet them outside the Marriott Hotel. When we went outside where they were to pick us up we found that the entire street had been cordoned off. Thank heavens for cell phones. The street was blocked to accommodate an ear-

Board Meeting Highlights

The board meetings at the New Orleans NABC were productive as many matters were decided. The following are the highlights of the meetings.

Bridge Motions

The Board passed two items relating to the Convention Chart. First, Transfer Responses were added to the Competitive Bidding section of the ACBL General Convention Chart with the following language "Transfer Responses (responses after overcalls) where the call shows length or values in the suit of the transfer."


A second change to the General Convention Chart amended Paragraph 7 of the Competitive Bidding Section had added that a "2 diamond bid showing a onesuited hand in hearts or spades is now allowed over natural notrump opening bids or overcalls."

Grand National Teams

The Board passed a motion providing that effective commencing at the 2015 Summer NABC, for the first two days for Flights A, B, and C of the GNT Final, the entry fee is waived as an award for winning the District portion of the GNT competition. I supported this motion and also spoke in favor of waiving the entry fee for the Super Flight, but there were not enough votes from the Board to pass this provision.



Masterpoints awards for KO, 5-6 person teams

The following motion requires a second reading that will occur at the Summer NABC in Chicago: "At non-NABC events, players on KO Teams with more than 4 players who are otherwise eligible for overall awards will be subject to the following participation reductions:

For every segment (half a match) of a match that is won and where a participant sits out, the overall awards for that individual will be reduced by 5%. For example, if a player's team wins a 4-session KO and that participant played only half of each match, that player's masterpoint award will be reduced by 20%.

Screen Surcharge

In Providence, the Board passed a screen surcharge. In New Orleans, a motion for reconsideration was passed by the Board of Governors. Since Providence I have had many discussions with our players regarding this charge. With the costs of entry fees for NABC+ events, it was wrong for the Board to pass this surcharge. In Chicago I will be voting to rescind this charge.

Next month I will discuss the 2015 budget.

ly St. Patrick's Day parade headed for the French Quarter.

On the days we played in the national events, we were on the late schedule. This, too, had its advantages because New Orleans is such a fascinating city and having free mornings gave us time to explore. One place we are sure to visit each time we are in New Orleans is Café Du Monde whose menu is limited to dark roasted coffee and chicory, beignets, white and chocolate milk, and fresh squeezed orange juice. The coffee is served black or au lait. The original Café Du Monde was established in 1862 in the New Orleans French Market. The Café is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It closes only on Christmas Day and on a day an occasional hurricane passes too close to New Orleans.

Other interesting activities to do during your free mornings or a day off from bridge might include:

- Visit the National World War II Museum
- Walk through the Garden District which began as a plantation that was divided and sold into lots. Developed in the mid 1800's the Garden District offered luxurious houses and gardens to the city's elite and remains the most presti-

gious neighborhood today.

- Take a Ghost and Vampire Tour. Anyone who has read Anne Rice's Vampire Chronicles will be interested in such tours because they often include a walk by 2727 Prytania Street in the Garden District, Anne Rice's former home.
- Take a cooking class in the French Quarter
- Walk through French Quarter, which is interesting day and night with its many restaurants, novelty shops, bars and jazz saloons.

Lastly, there's the food. If you end up at some boring restaurant eating hamburgers while in New Orleans, you're missing out. Some of the dishes that have earned New Orleans its culinary legacy include:

- Gumbo, a mix of West European, African, Caribbean and Native American influences, calls for okra simmered for hours with a variety of meats, onions, celery and bell peppers usually served over rice.
- Jambalaya, a meal in itself consists of sasusage, vegetables and a variety of meats or seafood and long-grain rice.
- Andouille, a spiced, heavily smoked sausage, is the key flavor in many New Orleans's dishes.
 - Shrimp Creole
- Muffuletta is the New Orleans "Subway" sandwich with a distinctive taste due to its piquant olive

spread.

- Po' Boy is a French bread sandwich piled high with meat or seafood mixed with a flavorful tarter-like white sauce.
- Red Beans and Rice, a Creole classic which is a staple on menus across the city. It is often featured on Monday menus because the dish was traditionally made with leftover pork from Sunday's dinner.
- Oysters Rockfeller is served all over the city, but Antoine's holds the title of creator, serving the original dish since 1899.
- Bread Pudding which began as a way to use stale bread is soaked in milk, eggs and sugar, baked and then topped with a sweet bourbonbased sauce.
- Bananas Foster is a distinctive dessert made with bananas, ice cream, dark rum, sugar and spices.
- Beignets, sometimes called the French doughnut is a square piece of dough that is deep fried to form a crispy pillow then dusted with powdered sugar.
- Creole Pralines, dating back to 17th Century France, were originally made with sugar coated almonds but when brought to the United States the almonds were replaced with pecans.

It is good that New Orleans is a walking city. We sure needed the exercise after all that food. We also got exercise finding the restrooms from the playing areas—miles away—often down an escalator on the floor below. When asked how we did, my answer is we had a good time

We have been to a national tournament in New Orleans three times over the years, spaced at about five years apart. It is too early to plan for the next one, but Chicago is coming this summer and it, too, is an interesting city.

Bridge Stories

This recurring series in the Southern California Bridge News includes short bridge stories from District 23 players who earned a new rank last month, as collected by Rand Pinsky

Here is the short history of my life with bridge. In 1969 I married my sweetheart and went to London for a two month honeymoon. It was too long, I bought an Acol bridge book and read it many times. Then I sat at bridge table and for years lost a lot of money to my friends! For the next 50 years, I read many books, improved my game and playing contract bridge. About two or three years ago, I played my first duplicate bridge and became a member of ACBL. Bridge continues to be a part of my life.

I would enjoy sharing my bridge history with you, briefly.

My mother, who was the best natural card player I was ever fortunate enough to play with, introduced me to bridge when I was in junior high school. That was when Charles Goren was still playing at "Bridge Week" at the old Ambassador Hotel, and I was one of the many who were allowed to kibitz. I was impressed by seeing an old Ely Culbertson - he played without sorting his cards. I went to a duplicate class run by an early life master named Jack Ehrlenbach. When I was lucky enough to have him for a partner he would say to me "I'll get you in the right contract, you just make it." When I went on to high school there were no kids playing bridge, so I left the game for years for college, a career, and marriage to a wonderful man who doesn't play cards of any kind. However, he is my biggest booster and encouraged me to return to bridge, which I had never stopped loving. In the 50 intervening years, it became a new game. So I went back to learn again with Peter Knee who was teaching at the Bridge Academy. I am now about five minutes from becoming a full time "bridge bum." My goal, as is the goal of many others

like me, is to become a life master before I am too old to hold my cards. I still have my first copy of Goren's "Point-Count Bidding" and Sheinwald's "5 Weeks to Winning Bridge."

I believe that it is important that bridge does not become an "old people's" game. Kid's from 10 years and up are very competitive and are very strategically oriented. I would be happy to become an "angel" or supporter of anyone who needs whatever I can offer to encourage bridge at schools. I think the chess clubs are doing fine. Bridge needs to do better.

Of course, I am thrilled to reach this milestone in my bridge life. It has taken me about 20 years to accomplish this, but I believe it is never too late. Setting short and long term goals is very important. I feel that if I learn something each time I play, then it is well worth the effort and quite rewarding. I owe a great deal to my early teachers, Craig Kavin and Bill Sides. They gave me the basics from which to move forward. I have had many wonderful partners over the years who have been there to share the joys of victory and the agonies of defeat. My partner of three years, Bill Carlson has taught me a lot and has shown unending patience.

I grew up in Ohio and was taught by my parents at a very early age. I played all through college (more than I went to class). I stopped for about 25 years after marrying Sheldon and raising three children. He does not play which is probably for the best-- at least for our marriage. While trying to learn the game, I ran an entertainment consulting business, Center Stage Productions. After retiring three years ago, I began my real quest to reach 2500. Now that it is accomplished I feel so relieved. However, I am certain I will have a next goal. Onward and upward to 3000.

I wish to thank all of my friends and partners I have made in District 23. It has been a joyous ride.

We have two interesting (?) hands for you \rightarrow

this time, both from the recent D23/D22 STaC. On the very first board, sitting East, you find yourself staring at:♠K652 ♥J ◆-- ♣AKJ98754

Ho hum, just your run-of-the-mill 8-4-1 hand. You open 1♣, LHO overcalls 1♠ (not a surprise, is it?), partner responds 1♠, and you ... ? Tempting to play in clubs, especially since partner doesn't guarantee five spades in this sequence, One hopes you have some way of showing a good spade raise, because partner has:♠Q9873 ♥AK3 ◆K62 ♣62.

Even with those two wasted red kings, 6♠ can make if you pick up the trumps (LHO has ♠AJx), but 6♠ is one down unless you take the first-round hook for the trump queen, since RHO has all three of them. (Oh well, they say one peek is worth two finesses ...) This is all predicated on the opponents not sacrificing, since 7♠ is only three down for -500.

Next up is a little lesson on how not to play negative doubles. Sitting West, with no one vulnerable, you pick up: ♠A9 ♥Q8764 ♦6 ♣AT983.

For better or for worse, you open 1. Next hand overcalls 2. and partner passes. RHO also passes, and you double (takeout). Pass, pass (!), pass. While 2. does take a beating – down about 800 – that's not good enough because partner – the passer – holds: \$\delta KT7 \times AJT2 \delta AK985 \delta J and 6\times is stone cold. Worse, the \$\times K\$ is not only on side, it's stiff, and 7\times rolls home. Too bad, so sad! (The pair defending 2\delta actually won the event with about 68% ... one can only imagine their score had they bid the slam.)

He runs a weekly individual game with the interesting format of being scored in both matchpoints and IMPs. This is the April Fools' edition, so we will have a return of The Hog. The Hog is a character not exactly based upon multi-time Barry Crane Trophy winner Ron "The Hog" Anderson, nor Victor Mollo's wonderfully entertaining character "The Hideous Hog," nor Leo Bell's character "The Hog", but a combination of all three.

We'll start off our April Fools' edition with a hand I have been waiting to use for just this occasion.

Sacks: 5♦. Sometimes the first thought works... 5♦. Now, if I were a heavy underdog in a match, or way behind I might let my imagination run a little wilder. Kudos to anyone bidding unusual 2NT hoping to hear partner bid clubs aggressively.

Meyers: 5♦, wrong-siding it.

Itabashi: 5♦. Who knows what makes here. A weakness of Precision is that over 1♣ the opponents have no idea if they have a fit. Let them find it at the 5-level. It won't take much to make 5♦.

Mealymouth: 5♦, hoping to catch partner with the ♣J and giving up on the slam I don't know how to reach anyway (would partner ever know to bid 6♦ with the ♥A in addition to the mighty ♣J?). Perhaps West will sacrifice in 5♠ and run into partner's stack and a bruising penalty double.

Frenkle: Double. Start with a double, and over partners probable major I'll show my diamonds. If we're still low enough and partner bids 3NT, I'll let him play it. If he doesn't bid 3NT, but has enough to respond to my diamond bid, I will try 5♦.

Interesting approach. Trying to be scientific about it may let the opponents find a major suit fit. They are very likely to misjudge your offensive potential though.

Lee: 6. It's anyone's guess. 5. commits us to bidding 6. if they bid 5. or 5. I will be unhappy if they bid 5. or 5. so I will just put the pressure on now.

Badizadegan: 6♦. Over a Precision 1♣, partner's pass indicates that he doesn't have a particularly unbalanced hand. East's 1♦ bid does not necessarily preclude the possibility that East has a distributional hand, so our opponents definitely have a massive major suit fit. Over a Precision 1♣, we want to be as disruptive as possible, and since we only have 1.5 defensive tricks,

Sacks: 3♠ if we are not playing Mathe (asking for singleton) and requesting cuebids up the line. Otherwise, 4♣ hoping to hear 4♠.

Badizadegan: 4♣. Partner has just invited us to game with a 9-card fit, but we don't need very much to go to slam here. The ♥K, ◆A and ♣K make us cold for 7, but 3 kings is enough for six. A diamond control is a must, so in the absence of a splinter, I want partner to cuebid 4♦ if he has the ◆A, and then we can continue with Blackwood from there, and try to find 7♥ if partner has the heart and club kings. If he bids 4♥ to deny the diamond ace, we can cuebid 4♠ so that he has the chance to bid 5♣ to show the club king, then our bid of 5♥ clearly invites to six if partner has good enough diamonds.

Itabashi: 4♣. I hope to hear 4♦ and if you bid 4♠ later, it will give partner the chance to show the ♣K if he has it or to hopefully give value to the trump king.

Mealymouth: 4♣. Forget about some silly "rule" that "controls must be bid up-the-line"; [Right analysis, right bid, wrong system. 3♠ (even if it doesn't ask for a singleton) isn't a cuebid, but a side suit. See Lee and Frenkle.] I don't buy it, especially when the "con-

trol" can supposedly be "first- or second-round" as though aces and kings, singletons and voids were all equivalent. Bidding 3\(\Delta\) to show the \(\Delta\)A would induce partner to love his possible \(\Delta\)KQx but dislike his possible \(\Delta\)8532 (just the wrong way round). Bidding 4\(\Delta\) to show the \(\Delta\)A will induce partner to love his possible \(\Delta\)Kx and encourage him to cue-bid the \(\Delta\)A if he has it (just the cards, along with the \(\Delta\)K, that he needs for slam).

Lee: 4. I play this shows a natural side suit, so it seems perfect. [Right analysis, right bid, right system.]

Frenkle: 4♣. Start with 4♣ because 3♠ might be taken as offering a second playable suit. If partner cuebids diamonds I go to six, otherwise stop at four.

Meyers: 4♣, see if I get a 4♦ bid.

The Hog: 4♦. Why not deter a diamond lead on the way to 6♥? This is especially apropos on April Fools Day. Of course if my LHO is a Greek whom I have fooled before, I'll change it up, bid 4♣ and maybe he'll lead a club.

and a lot more on offense, we can go to 6♦ without too much risk that we are sacrificing too high. We also only need the right 3 points (the club king) from partner for it to be cold, and one of the major suit aces and a club doubleton from partner gives us a fighting chance.

The Hog: $6 \blacklozenge \cdot$ I'll have to bid $6 \blacklozenge \cdot$ if they bid $6 \blacktriangledown \cdot$ or $6 \spadesuit \cdot$ I'll bid $6 \blacklozenge \cdot$ now to put the pressure on them.

This problem comes from the 2014 US Team Trials. Both tables had the same auction up to this point. Eric Greco bid $5 \blacklozenge$ and heard it go Pass, Pass, $5 \blacktriangledown$ by Jeff Meckstroth who held a weak hand with five spades and six hearts. Greco rebid $6 \blacklozenge$ only to see Eric Rodwell bid $6 \blacktriangledown$, down two for an excellent save against the making $6 \blacklozenge$. Ralph Katz elected to bid $6 \blacklozenge$ right away. This bought the contract, +1370, when Kevin Bathurst elected not to save holding the 5=6=0=2 weak hand.

2♣ bidders think this one is easy.

Frenkle: 2♣ and plan on passing unless partner shows a big hand.

Lee: 2♣, I don't know what the alternative is supposed to be, but I'm not passing or bidding 1NT (Yes, those are the alternatives).

Mealymouth: 2♣. I have about what partner should expect for this non-forcing, only mildly constructive, advance. Thank heaven for easy problems!

Meyers: 2♣. No other comment.

Sacks: 1NT. This rates just a notch above 2♣, mainly because I do not want a ♣ lead if they buy the hand in hearts.

Badizadegan: 1NT. I want to make a takeout double of partner's suit, and 1NT feels like the lie which is the least bad. If partner has the measly 8 HCP he promised me, we may go down a few, but the -100 is still a reasonable result. If it gets doubled, we can run to 24, showing our lack of interest in moving on. Also, when we are

NV at matchpoints, with evenly distributed HCP, we want to be the first pair to bid notrump. If you are playing with a junior, you probably have to bid more safely, because we have been known to overcall our "good" 6-counts.

Itabashi: 1NT. 2♣ could be right but if NT is right it should be played by South.

The Hog: 1NT. NT and The Hog are a matched pair. Besides, my partners are told to bid minors, leaving NT for me!

Badizadegan: 2NT. I am between 2NT and 4NT on this hand, both showing hands with both minors, where 4NT shows a crazier hand with more preemption. Ideally, we want to be able to go to 6♣ if partner has the diamond ace, but stop at 5♣ if he doesn't. Over a 4NT bid, partner will still bid 5♦ to sign off with ace and two little ones, and we don't have any ability to find the diamond ace. If partner bids diamonds, we can reply with some number of clubs to try to show our club strength and keep him talking, and if partner bids clubs, we are going to bid spades to show our void. It is likely that we are going to get interference, but the exchange of information probably benefits us more than it benefits our opponents, even though it allows them to find their heart sacrifice more easily.

Frenkle: 2NT. Start with 2NT. If partner never bids, I will go to 5♣. If partner is able to get into the auction, I'll cuebid my spade void and if he shows me either other ace I'll go to six, both then seven.

Candy Scott took an informal poll about 35 years ago asking the better Southern California players what a balancing 2NT meant. Not only was her panel split about 50/50, almost every major partnership disagreed on the meaning of the bid. Today, there is little disagreement among experts about the best meaning for a balancing 2NT call. Almost all expert pairs play it as 19 – 21 balanced. Thus, for many of the panelists, 2NT wasn't a possibility.

Meyers: 2♥, which I play is 2 suited almost GF. [Interesting idea! Works very well here.]

Sacks: 2♣. Next bid 4NT implying the type of hand I have. 3♣ is stronger but has higher chance of playing there.

Lee: 2. I'd love to show the minors here but I don't have a bid for it, so I will just start low and see what happens.

The 24 bidders are certain they will get another chance. They are 99.44% to get that opportunity. With this much distribution out there, somebody always bids.

Itabashi: 5♣. This is pretty much the same reasoning as problem 1.

Mealymouth: 5♣ Borrowing a page from Dad's-- er, Al Roth Sr.'s-- book, I'll complain that this problem could never arise at the table, as somebody would have bid spades by now. [Sorry Mealy! This problem (as reported by Leo Bell), did occur at the table!] Before the opponents can find their cheap 5♠ save, I'll jump to 5♠, relying on partner to have as little as the ◆J (with either the ◆T or length) or a defensive slip to help me make it. Yes, we might have a slam, but there is no clear path to reach it (how could I convey to partner that the ♥A is gold, the ♠A is dross, and the ◆J is a precious gem indeed?) and a slow pseudoscientific auction might so confuse partner that we'd wind up in an inferior diamond or (heaven forbid!) spade contract.

The Hog: 5♣. I'll bid 5♣ before they can get to 4 of a major.

A key question here is does 4NT mean? Ask enough people what 4NT means and you will hear: minors, two places to play, invitational to 6NT, RKC for hearts, and vanilla Blackwood (no kings). Our panel is in the invitational camp.

Badizadegan 4NT. We have a 17-count and partner has shown us a hand that wants to play 4♥ opposite a 7-count, so we are too strong for 3NT, but a little too weak to just blast 6NT. 4NT here is probably for keycard in hearts, but I am assuming that you play 5♠ after a Blackwood response here as a relay to sign off in 5NT (most of my partnerships do, but it probably seems a little too convenient for this hand). If partner shows that we are missing at most one keycard in hearts (the ♠A), then we are going to 6NT, but if we are missing 2 keycards, we can stop in 5NT. Without the 5♠ relay bid, we just have to bid 6NT and pray.

Frenkle: 4NT. Invitational, let it be on partners head.

Itabashi: 4NT, quantitative. You have to have a way to show extras by responder. Use 4♠ as 2 places to play. [Good idea!]

Meyers: 4NT. Quantitative.

Lee: 3NT. I'm not going to hang my partner, and even though we could make a slam I don't think we are even close to trying for it.

Mealymouth: 6NT. I cannot condemn West harshly enough for robbing me of my classic sound 1NT opening, and I'll speak sharply later to North for depriving me of the chance to gamble sensibly with the 3NT I would have bid in the passout seat had he not butted in with his takeout double. As it is, I'll gamble that he doesn't have a spade void (a good bet when East hasn't bid 4♠ preemptively) and bid what I think I can make, 6NT, avoiding the suit slams that might founder on the rocks of bad trump splits.

Sacks: Pass. No clear direction towards slam, we should collect 500 or 800.

The Hog: Pass. I would love to try 6NT, but my partner might not have extras. My partners love to make takeout doubles a little light because then I get to play the hand! Dummy may well have no entry.
