REACH, Growth Goals

Bridge is a game and should be fun

REACH

Many of you may have noticed the upcoming "Regionals at Clubs" – aka REACH – event scheduled for

early February.

This event is a byproduct of the increased level of energy and activity engendered by our new CEO Bahar Gidwani. As Bahar noted in the Bridge Bulletin, he aims to provide clubs with long-needed support.

The basics of REACH are for players to pay a small upfront fee plus normal club fees in order to compete in a regionally rated event against other pairs. A unique feature of this event that contrasts with STaCs – sectionals at clubs – is that a pair's performance is based on the strength of the club game.

So pairs that play in a tough club game might fair poorly in a STaC but will do relatively well in a REACH event.

Where does the REACH money go?

Several of you have asked where the REACH money goes. Importantly, some of the REACH money goes back to districts to compensate for potential lower attendance at regionals. The REACH program is actually run in highly cost-effective manner based on the generosity of volunteer efforts.

From the Director's Chair:

"We misentered the score."

That's forgiveable. I guess. But what was East/West doing? When you check the scores and approve them, the idea is that you check them first and then approve them. Of course, players are so anxious to see the results from the other tables that they simply punch the approve button in order to get to the juicy parts.

This is another reason to not show the scores on the bridgemates. My partner affirmatively does not want to know the scores as they display on the bridgemate. Her view is that a duplicate bridge session is not meant to be the kind of competition where participants know the score as the event progresses. Beyond that, showing the scores can lead to many sorts of things that are disruptive to the game-- gloating over a good result and making opponents feel bad, attacking partner for a bad result and making partner feel not good, discussing the results loudly to wonder how such results could have been attained and ruining the board for everyone that hears.

Last month, I wrote about the fact that players need to finish their rounds on time. Finishing on time is just being considerate of all the other players in the game. But entering the scores in the bridgemate and approv-

ing them is one area where you can take just a little extra time to make sure the entries are correct.

My partner and I once had a scoring error that affected our final standing. I must admit that I generally accept responsibility for approving scores for us as East/West, and I did this time too. The score was entered wrong and approved by me. We discovered it after we had left and gone home. We called the director to complain, but North/South claimed a lack of memory and that for the result to have been as claimed, South would have had to make an irrational play. That is exactly what had happened. But no relief. So partner and I now have a new procedure: North (our opponent) enters the scores, I approve them and we move to the next board, at the end of the round after I have approved the last board, I hand the bridgemate to partner and she pulls up all the scores for the round to make sure that I have done my job correctly.

Play with reasonable quickness but take an extra moment to make sure you score the game correctly. Nobody likes to deal with a scoring error, especially when it really counts so let's take a little care to make sure we get the scores in right in the first place.

What call do you make?

A significant part of this problem is interpreting the 2♣ bid. I was not the originator of this problem. If I had originated the problem, I would ask what South's rebid should be after North advances I♠. I had rejected the problem previously because of that difficulty, but chose it this month. (Maybe I'm running out of good material. Send me your problem hands!) I think 2♠ should be natural. If 2♠ is a cuebid, does this hand merit one?

Meyers: 3. I don't have enough to bid game in my own hand, and I already cuebid.

Shuster: 4♥ (Assuming I bid 2♦ and not 2♣). I'm willing to give up on 3NT as we'll never be able to accurately judge when that is best anyway. I'm also willing to give up on slam, as even the most optimistic constructions for North do not yield cold slams. ♠Axxx ♥KJx ♦xx ♠AQxx [many players would cuebid instead of advancing I♠ with that hand] is an example of a stone cold max with no wastage, and we are still on a diamond guess. The main alternative is 3NT, which "should" offer partner a choice between 3NT and 4♥ (otherwise you'd have bid 3NT last time around.) But 4♥ should be fine and doesn't risk an accident.

Dunitz: 4♥. Slam requires perfect cards. If I bid 3♣ will partner have any idea that I want hearts to be

trump? The auction is ugly.

Goldsmith: 3♥. I'll guess 3♥. Can partner have as much as ★Kxxxx ♥Kx ◆Qxx ★Qxx? [This example doesn't make 4♥ a good contract, but 3NT by South looks reasonable.] I think so. I think 2♣ is natural.

Davis 3♥. Close between pass and 3♥. Partner won't have more than something like ♠AKxxx ♥xx ♠Qxx ♠xxx for his non-forcing 2♥ bid, but that would be enough to make game pretty good. I need partner to have something more than his minimum to bid a game. If his something extra is in clubs, he may bid 3NT, which I will pass. Although my hand is balanced, I will likely have to lose the lead too often to suggest notrump myself. I would bid 2NT over 2♥ if my minors were reversed.

Kantar: 3. I'm not sure what 2♣ means; a strong spade raise? a second suit? Anyway, I sort of like my hand and am beginning to feel like a coward.

The panel wasn't sold on the $2 \clubsuit$ bid either. Regardless of what $2 \clubsuit$ means, they range from thinking this hand is barely a $3 \heartsuit$ bid, to thinking $4 \heartsuit$ is best. I'm a $3 \heartsuit$ bidder. My $\clubsuit Kx$ isn't enough to bid 3NT, but if partner can bid 3NT, I will pass.

You, South, hold: ♠JT943 ♥Q2 ♦97654 ♣A What call do you make?

Again, the panel wasn't in agreement with the auction up to this point. Many of them point out that Stayman, followed by 2♠ over a 2♠ response, is commonly played as a light invite with five spades, and this hand fits that description. I agree that is the most common treatment for the non-competitive sequence: $INT - 2 \clubsuit$, $2 \spadesuit - 2 \spadesuit$, but there are other possible agreements. I strongly prefer that auction to be a signoff. I get to use the sequence on hands like $\Delta Jxxxx \forall KQTx$ $\bigstar xx \, \Delta xx \, or \, \Delta QJ9xx \, \nabla Qxxxx \, \Delta x \, \Delta xx. \, Further, for pairs$ who use 2NT over 1NT as not natural (a transfer to diamonds or a puppet to $3\clubsuit$), the sequence $INT - 2\clubsuit$, $2 \checkmark$ - $2 \spadesuit$, shows exactly four spades. I was given this problem by an East Coast expert. I don't know what his preferred agreement about Stayman followed by 2♠ is, but he thought 3♠ was the best bid. Partner didn't super accept, so I think any further try is too rich. I think 3♠ is preferable to 2NT if you are going to bid again.

Meyers: 2NT This is a crapshoot depending on if the hands fit. I will bid 2NT but only because we are vul at IMPs – I think in a vacuum it is right to pass.

Shuster: Pass. An optimist will note the possibility of either suit being established with the ♥Q or ♦9 as a late entry and visions of a vulnerable game. However, my partners are more likely to have 14 than 16 when they open a 15-17 NT, and despite good spade texture, I probably lack a late entry. [My partners are far more likely to have 16 than 14 when they open a 15 - 17

NT, and I'm still not sold on acting again.] There is no safety in inviting, as undertricks are in the 100s (the odds for bidding close vulnerable games go down considerably when they might be set multiple tricks.) I would have preferred to start with Stayman on this hand type, with the agreement that Stayman followed by 24 shows a light, distributional invite.

Kantar: Pass. Again feeling a little cowardly, but partner had several ways of showing a stronger spade hand than 2.

Goldsmith: Pass. This is why most play 2♣, then 2♠ is invitational. 2♠ is almost certainly a better contract than 2NT, and the hand is a marginal invite. Even red at IMPs, I think bidding 2♥ then 2NT rates to go minus so often that it's a poor risk. But an invite which ends at 2♠ is fine; we preserve the likely plus in 2♠, avoid a silly 2NT or 3NT contract, and get to game when we have a fit.

Davis: Pass. With my high cards in my short suits, I don't think this hand is worth inviting game even though we are vulnerable at IMPs. However, if my cards were in my suits (♠JT9xx ♥xx ♠AQxxx ♣x) I would force to game with 3♠.

Dunitz: $3 \spadesuit$. I would have bid $2 \clubsuit$ over 1NT, and then $2 \spadesuit$ over $2 \spadesuit$ or $2 \heartsuit$, which would show an invitational, distributional hand. Forced to transfer instead, I would bid $3 \spadesuit$.

You, South, hold: ♠AJ ♥AJ5 ♠75 ♠Q97654 What call do you make?

Partner has doubled twice. The first double is negative and the second double is more high cards. His minimum is something just under an opening bid. At MPs there would undoubtedly be greater sentiment to pass. At IMPs passing is tougher. Or maybe it's not. Is it Eddie?

Meyers: 4♣. if partner does have ♠10xx or more I can't see making 3NT, even if partner had the ♣AK I would need another quick trick.

Kantar: Pass. I'm visualizing ♠xx ♥KQxx ♠AKxxx ♠xx. How far off was I? [I don't know the actual hand. Why do you have to be off at all?]

Shuster: 4♣. Partner doesn't hold five hearts, and with no ready source of tricks a 4-3 fit is an experiment in terror. Partner rates to hold close to an opening bid with spade shortness. With my excellent controls and extra club length, it is tempting to take a stab at 5♣ myself, but I choose to leave that decision to partner. If partner holds magic: ♠x ♥Kxxx ♠AKxx ♣Jxxx, I hope he'll find a raise. We might be comparing with 3NT -300 at the other table, even when we are making 5♣.

Goldsmith: 4♣. Let's give partner ♠xx ♥KQ10x ♦Axxx ♣KJx. 5♣ is much better than 4♥. Or give partner ♠xx ♥KQ10x ♦KQxxx ♣Kx. No game is any good; 4♣ is probably only down one. They are probably down one or so, so passing is too risky. How well we do on offense really depends on partner's clubs, so let's emphasize them. It's possible that partner really, really, wants me to bid 3NT (♠xx ♥Kxxx ♦QJ10x ♣AKx), but when he doesn't have the ♣AK, 3NT seems unlikely to make.

Davis: 4♣. With my long suit requiring substantial help from partner to run, and having probably only a single spade stopper between us, 4♣ looks like a better call than pass or 3NT. If partner had game forcing values with a five-card heart suit he would have bid 2♥, so it sounds like partner has a balanced or semibalanced hand with 10+ HCP. Maybe knowing I have a long club suit will enable partner to bid a game, e.g., ♠xx ♥KQxx ♠Axxx ♣ATx.

Dunitz: 5♣. I'll bid four and a half clubs. OK, make it 5♣.

No stopper? No problem! Eddie reminds us that the late Marshall Miles (the former moderator of this column) would have bid 3NT (in complete tempo).

Meyers: 3♥. I'm hoping partner can bid 3♠ or 3NT.

Kantar: 3NT. Not to worry, Marshall will have the clubs stopped.

Shuster: 3NT. Maybe partner has a club honor; it isn't like he has a lot of diamond honors. Even when we have no stopper, they might try a sneak attack or the suit could block. Maybe at MPs pass is wiser, but games stolen are thrice as much fun as games earned, so I'll play the thief.

Goldsmith: 3NT. There was no raise, and it was a white 3♣ opening, so why not take a shot at the highest-scoring contract?

Dunitz: 3NT. This call can win so many ways. Part-

ner may have a club stopper, the clubs may block even if we don't have a stopper, and they may lead something else.

Davis 3NT. Partner's diamond suit is not very strong, so he is more likely than usual to have a six- or sevencard suit. If my RHO had three clubs he might have raised clubs. This leads me to think 3NT is our most likely game. A confident 3NT bid by me might get LHO holding ♣AQJxxx to try to find his partner's entry to lead through my assumed club king.

This hand occurred in a club game. I was the $3 \clubsuit$ bidder. The player who got this problem is not an expert, but he is a very strong club player. He passed in tempo and I was shocked. I thought his hand was way too strong to pass. Only Jill mentioned $3 \heartsuit$, but I think even that is better than passing. His partner had the $\clubsuit A$ on the actual deal, and it made 12 tricks in diamonds and 10 tricks in NT.

This time I was the player who had the problem. Jay Tipton was the 5♥ bidder. I'll start with two panelists who know the hand. Jeff Goldsmith knows the hand because he was at the other table. He had a great result on the board. He played 4♥ undoubled, down two. If I am not mistaken, Jeff's partner Paul Markarian raised 1♥ to 4♥, which ended the auction without my hand ever bidding. I would have acted over that auction. Ed Davis knows the hand because I gave it to Leo Bell and him at a fantasy football auction a few days later.

Meyers: Dbl, this is takeout with equity to protect.

Goldsmith: Dbl. I have no idea who can make what, but West thinks we can make something, so I'll show some signs of life with the best hand at the table. The normal agreement of a double of a mixed raise is takeout. Double's being clubs was good for this hand. [The world is split on whether a double of a Bergen mixed raise shows the bid suit, or a good takeout of their major. I have different agreements in different partnerships. Here, I was playing with Rick Roeder and the double showed clubs.]

Davis: Dbl. This is an unusual bid by LHO since he might reasonably expect to be able to make 4♥, but nothing higher, given that he did not have a strong 1♣ opening. It feels like LHO's 5♥ bid might have been the winner as I would have been able to bid 4♠ if he had bid 4♥. I expect partner to play me for a strong

3=1=3=6 type of hand for my double of 5♥, and he will only pull the double with sufficient distribution. Shuster: Dbl. The opponents have used their methods to put us under tremendous pressure. LHO is trying to save. RHO might still have defense. If partner passes, -650 is a live possibility, but I have too much hand just to give up here.

Kantar: Dbl. My first double was for takeout, and so was my second.

Dunitz: Pass.

I chose 5♠ at the table; Leo Bell said he would have bid $5 \spadesuit$. It went all pass, and Rick put down $\spadesuit A7xx \forall x$ ♦JT9xx ♣Jxx. Jay lead a high heart, saw his partner Linda Tipton play low. Jay shifted to the ♣9, covered with dummy's $\clubsuit J$, Linda's $\clubsuit Q$ and won by my $\clubsuit A$. I lead the 48 (to unblock the suit), and a spade to my jack, which won, with both opponents following. I collected the $\triangle Q$ with my $\triangle K$. I needed a dummy entry to finesse against the ♣T in case the ♣9 had been singleton. To get to dummy, I lead my last trump to dummy's last trump. Scary! If I misread the club situation the entire heart suit would run, and I might be down about 5. The ΔT came up when I lead the club from the dummy and I made 5 for plus 650. Reflecting on the bid leads me to realize that way too many things had to go right. 5♠ was too aggressive. Double is best.
