Club of the Month - Nailsea

A group of local rubber bridge players met on 23 November 1972 and Nailsea BC was established. Legend has it that the number of Committee members was originally set at eight so that bridge could be played after meetings. Two of the founder members were Marion Blackhall and Barbara Parker who still play regularly at the club.

In the '80's we had two teams of juniors from Nailsea Comprehensive and Bristol Grammar Schools who attended regularly, practising for the Daily Mail Schools Cup, in which they both did well.

When Avon CBA was formed, our members overwhelmingly voted to remain with Somerset, a decision never regretted. Over the years members have regularly entered County competitions and supported Somerset Bridge through stints on the County committee (with at least three having been Chair) and organisation of County events, including the West of England Congress.

The club has always met at Mizzymead Recreation Centre in Nailsea. When our membership exceeded 60 in the earlier 90's we filled the main hall but in more recent years we have managed with a much smaller room – although numbers have improved recently thanks largely to lessons provided by Daphne Patrick in this area.

It's great to think that November 2022 will see our 50th anniversary when big celebrations are planned!

We aim to be a friendly club, welcoming new members and visitors – partners can usually be arranged.

Chairman's Blog #6

For the past few weeks I have been in South Africa, playing bridge four times a week at the local bridge club. On three days a week bridge starts at 9am and it is an impressive sight to see the room filled with 20 tables or more waiting to start at such a time. The number of players swells greatly in the summer months as the town fills up with swallows, i.e. visitors who stay for up to three months, and others like ourselves who are more swifts than swallows as our annual stays are much shorter. In addition to South African nationals I counted French, American, Canadian, Dutch, Belgian and Irish players in addition to a large contingent of Brits at the club yesterday.

It is an eclectic mix of people and systems, the bridge is of variable standard just as it is at home and everybody is extremely friendly, just as it should be. I think that there should be more consideration given to daytime bridge as many older people prefer not to drive at night. I am aware that several Somerset clubs play in the afternoon and are very successful and I think more clubs could benefit from daytime sessions.

The South Africans have dispensed with the Stop Card and I congratulate them for getting rid of a protocol which is widely abused, is nearly always ignored and as far as I can tell adds nothing to the game. I should say that that's a personal opinion and not that of the SCBA which of course supports EBU guidelines!

As was written in last month's newsletter longstanding players in both clubs and county will receive an obituary.


Pearl Heal - 28 September 1927 to 29 January 2019

Pearl was born in September 1927 in Bridgwater. She was an only child, and her early years encompassed both the Great Depression and the Second World War. As a young adult, she attended a teacher training college in Salisbury, and after qualifying, she moved back to Bridgwater. Initially, she

worked at a school in Street, travelling daily, but she soon got a post at Eastover School in Bridgwater, and stayed there for the rest of her career

until she retired in her mid-fifties.

Pearl married Dennis in 1950. They did not play bridge when first married, but they did play in many of the local whist drives. Bridge came much later, after they had learnt the basics whilst on holiday on a cruise. In those days, Pearl and Dennis played their club bridge mainly at Cannington and Burnham on Sea, and they also supported County



events. They went on many bridge holidays together during their retirement.

Pearl was a spirited lady, who always knew her own mind. Her big contention was that 'finesses never work for me'. This led her to play suit holdings in unexpected ways. Many an opponent was left red-faced when Pearl led away from a position in her closed hand. The opponent would not take their trick, convinced that their partner must hold a singleton honour, only to find their defensive trick melt away.

After Dennis's death in 2012, Pearl continued to play at Langport, and less frequently at Wells. She enjoyed her bridge right until the end, and last played just eight days before she died aged 91. She will be missed by all who knew her.
