
From Tim Warren, outgoing chairman

I also thank those who have contacted me about Surrey bridge, whether with brickbats or bouquets or anything else – it's the interaction with our members that's been the best part. I'm delighted that Richard Banbury was elected to take over from me, and I wish him all the very best.

From Richard Banbury, incoming chairman

Many thanks to Tim for all his hard work during all the turbulence caused by COVID and the changes it has brought to the game. The county's success with schools bridge is a great achievement.

As a brief introduction about myself, I have been playing bridge for 40 years — and to take Richard Ackland's (RA) point (see



below) I have never attended a bridge lesson (which probably explains a few things about my playing style!). Previously I have been Chairman for Hertfordshire Bridge Assoc, and worked for EBED (a charitable organisation set up by the EBU). Now I am the full-time manager for Richmond Bridge Club, as well as a teacher and national director.

We tend to think of the bridge world as slow to change, but who would have contemplated the rise of the online game even 5 years ago. These days Youtube is full of bridge videos and new players can now use ChatGPT and other Artificial Intelligence sources online to answer their questions. These changes mean new opportunities.

The EBU has a target to grow the playing membership by 5% (should that sound so daunting?!). RA's letter (see below) highlights some key issues about teaching and bringing new people into the game. The SCBA's role is to encourage improvements in those areas so as to support the EBU's goals.

• Teaching should be an enabler (not a barrier to be crossed), to allow new players to take part in a relaxed game for their own enjoyment. Regular practice then builds the confidence to learn more. Developing new bidding/play skills can all come later.

• RA mentioned he would have no hesitation in introducing a novice player into a club — and while there may be some practicalities around that, I think the bigger point is how many of us have actually invited someone to come along — to introduce a new person to the game - and then continued to help them as they get started. This is one thing which we (ie you!) can each do (surely we must all know one person) to make a big difference to the game's future. Those word of mouth recommendations are by the far the best way for us to support the growth of our clubs — so let's spread the word.

All Square at Swiss

Playing the penultimate match of the Easter Festival's Swiss Pairs, you pick up an uninspiring collection as West, all green: JT54♠ KT875♥ 82♠T6♣. Passing as dealer, the auction starts with a 2♣ open, a 2♠ overcall by partner, and an "undiscussed" double by South. You make a restrained raise to 3♠; North bids 5♣ and is raised to 6 by his partner. Your brow furrows as you count out tricks. Two losers in each red suit... those confident club bids suggest a singleton with partner... surely only one spade loser... that comes to a penalty of 500 or 800 against their 920. It's speculative, but you take the sacrifice and put your hand down as dummy in 6♠X.

Alas! Astute readers will have noticed that you were counting up the penalty for 4♠, a calculation relevant a few hands ago but not here. You are going for at least 1100. As the play progresses, you realise that your partner, the notorious SCBA Competitions Secretary, had nudged your opponents into an inferior slam by overcalling on 87652♠ 943♥K543♦5♣. With 7 clubs in North and both your kings onside, 6NT is laydown and both grand slams are making. You have turned your partner's top of -940 into an ignominious bottom of -1700.

But there is more to come. You pick up 98542 & 6 & KT85 & QJT &, and starting with an open from North your uninterrupted opponents bid 1 & -1 & -4 & -4 NT -5 & (1 or 4 key cards) -6 &. How enticing! Your opponents have bid to slam on a 4-4 fit, unsuspecting of a truly dire split. No need to alert them to the crisis with a double. You pick out the club queen, and see a strange dummy come down. $J_5 \& AKJT854 \& Q32 \& 8 \&$ presents itself as North shamefacedly explains that he had overbid in spades instead of hearts by mistake. South with AKQ76 & Q9 & 985 & A42 & discovers the trump break on the second round, and is completely cut off from dummy – she can make only 5 spades, 1 heart and the ace of clubs for off 5 and -250. One top out, one top in.

The moral of the story? First – learn to stay awake after lunch! But more optimistically, remember that in a Swiss event you will be matched with opponents on roughly the same score as you – and that means no matter how ridiculous your mistakes, you can always hope to receive the same in return.

The May edition of the EBU magazine makes for depressing reading.

On page 5 we are told that we cannot expect to join a bridge club unless we have first taken a course of lessons.

Worse: on page 20 we are told that these lessons must come from a professional teacher and we must pay for them.

If this reflects the prevailing attitude of clubs and club members then it's small wonder that numbers are diminishing.

This sort of thing is anothema to those who've never had a lesson in their life, who picked up bridge casually along the way, perhaps at university, whilst doing National Service, as a lunchtime relaxation at work or from old uncle Joe one long-gone Xmas round the kitchen table

Why can't we play too!?

Why must we undergo these initiation rituals?

And which are these clubs who are so unwelcoming as to prohibit membership to those who don't measure up to their notions of competence? They may be establishments where bridge is played. They certainly aren't "clubs".

For a club is surely an organisation where like-minded people go to indulge in a mutually enjoyable activity/interest. It's not something which necessarily strives perpetually for excellence.

And who are these mean-minded members who find it insufferable to play with players of an inferior standard? They were all novices once. Why is it a "perennial challenge" to join a bridge club? If it is daunting then it can only be the established members who make it so. Why? Whatever happened to common courtesy and good manners? These intolerant members should remember at the very least that in the course of an evening's bridge they have to play only one round against the incompetent newcomers. Is that really too much to bear?

Against all that I can report that I have 4 local bridge clubs readily available to me and I go to all of them (but not ALL of them EVERY week!). At none of them have I encountered any unwelcoming attitudes and I'd have no hesitation in introducing a novice to any of them, lessons or no lessons. Why isn't that universal?

Let's all remind ourselves that bridge is a game, a pastime, something we do to enjoy ourselves midst convivial company.

I've no problem with teachers making a living from tuition nor with those who are anxious to understand the game better and to improve their own standard. That's all very commendable and to be encouraged. But not to the exclusion of the rest of us, who just want a bit of social enjoyment a couple of times a week.

We play bridge for fun don't we? After all, "it's only a game"

This is the response from the editor of English Bridge (slightly changed for context). Published with her consent.

Thank you for your email.

I think you are reading the articles without context. I think it's very difficult to join a bridge club if you don't know how to play. Of course it doesn't exclude 'lessons' from old Uncle Joe, friends in the services, university bridge club etc - all are effectively 'lessons'.

However, if you are a complete novice and deciding to take up the game you would probably be put off if you arrived at a bridge club session and announced you'd like to learn through playing in the weekly duplicate. What a baptism of fire if you had never played. If you are very lucky the club may offer free lessons, but in most cases you will have to find a teacher. And there's the rub. It is disappointingly difficult to find teachers. If they were better paid we might encourage more teachers. Fewer and fewer players seem to be learning through the wonderful ways you suggest – when young and when we were used to learning and used to making mistakes as part of the journey. Of course we are always delighted to hear that some players are still learning that way.

Are you by any chance a volunteer or paid teacher? If so, your area is very, very lucky to have you. If not, it would be interesting to know why not.

Bridge needs an army of volunteers from board level down to keep the game going. Not many people would expect to learn a new hobby for free - so payment might encourage more bridge teachers - Mary Sharp thinks paying them a market rate is the way forward. As a teacher too, I happen to wholeheartedly agree.

As for unwelcoming clubs . . . I think our club is friendly, but for those that lack confidence, all bridge clubs feel unwelcoming. In fact the whole spirit of competition is uncomfortable for some. We play the game for fun, but chat is left until after playing the hands, not before and throughout the hands. That kind of thing makes some novices feel that it's incredibly serious - it's not, but you often need a certain level of competence and enjoyment of the game itself before you can realise that. I also know that coming bottom week after week is not an encouraging way to fall into the game.



Double Dummy Puzzle #25 - Solution

The bidding, for those who like to see how NS actually got there, was

| East | South | West | North |
|-------|-----------|------|------------|
| 2D | 2S | Р | 4 S |
| 5C | 5S | 6C | 6S |
| 7C | Χ | Р | 7S |
| X end | | | |

• K lead is ruffed in hand. A spade to K reveals the 2-0 trump split and puts paid to a simple cross ruff.

T3-5: 3 rounds of hearts finishing in dummy.

T6: AQ is led from dummy and East is skewered. If he discards a diamond, South plays low and cross ruffing enables him to set up the long diamond in North's hand for his 13th trick. If East discards a Club, South overtakes with AA and sets up a long club is his own hand for the last trick.


Double Dummy #26

Directors Corner - Announcing

Richard Banbury

In my teaching role I often get asked questions about alerting and announcing – eg which player does what, and which bids need to be alerted or announced. For this bulletin I will just look at "Announcing".

Alerting and Announcing requirements are governed by the English Bridge Union's regulations – ie not be the Laws of Duplicate Bridge. This means that these requirements are specific to England and may well be different in other countries. The details can be found in the "Blue Book" on the EBU website.

The person who alerts/announces is always your partner – never self alert/announce your own bids (unless required when playing online)

Announcing only applies on the first round of the bidding (starting with the first bid (ie not a pass) and the next three calls)

Never announce an overcall (eg do not tell the table your partner's jump overcall is weak!)

Some common examples of things to be announced (not a full list)

- If an opening 1C or 1D bid could be shorter than a 3 card suit, announce "could be as short as xx" (so no need to announce "better minor" if it is always at least a 3 card suit).
- For an opening 1NT, announce the range eg "12-14" and if relevant add eg "may contain a [low] singleton". If your partner regularly opens 1NT with 11 HCP then make that clear in the announcement.
- Opening a <u>natural</u> suit at the 2-level, announce as appropriate "weak" "intermediate" "strong/forcing" or "strong/non-forcing". Conventional 2-level openings are alerted.
- No need to announce the range of an opening natural 2NT
- In response to 1NT/2NT announce 2C/3C as "Stayman" (there is no requirement to announce whether it actually promises an interest in the majors or not)
- Announce the suit shown by any transfer responses to an opening 1NT/2NT
- Announce any natural suit responses to 1NT/2NT (incl jumps below the level of game) eg "forcing" or "non-forcing"

Zia at Richmond


At the start of April Richmond Bridge Club hosted the famous international player Zia Mahmood. 52 players took part in an all day event enjoying 16 interesting boards from Zia's past along with a book signing event and a buffet lunch. etting the experts in to learn from their brilliance can be a great way to improve your bridge. Richmond Bridge Club recently hosted Zia Mahmood who is wonderfully entertaining and equally instructive.

There were 14 tables of club members and visitors. Zia had selected 16 boards, many from his playing career. Eight pairs got to play against Zia, and four individuals, drawn at random, got to partner him for four boards. (The advice the players were given as they arrived was 'Sit E/W if you want to play against Zia; sit N/S if you want a chance to play with him!)

Zia talked through the boards after they were played, and entertained us with stories from his life in bridge. Some of the deals were educational, requiring classic thought and planning, and some were more exotic.

Here is a deal from the former category:



You are sitting South. If you open a 12-14 no trump, West will come in with a Landy 2♠, showing the majors. Playing a strong no trump you would open 1♠ and West would overcall 1♠. Either way you get to play in 3NT. West leads the ♠O.

You win trick one with the ♠K and count your winners. There are eight tricks on top, so it seems that you will need the heart finesse for your ninth. When you have a plan, see if you can think of a better one! The bidding has made it unlikely that the heart finesse will succeed, but what about cashing three tricks in each minor, discovering West's initial 5·4·2·2 distribution, and then exiting with a spade? West is welcome to four spade tricks, but then has to lead away from the ♥K. Contract made! Give it a go by clicking in the centre of the hand diagram.

Every club should think about inviting an expert in now and again. This one was hosted on a Saturday, with lunch in the middle to keep the energy levels up! It was great fun and congratulations to the organisation team led by Jonathan Hird and Titch Glenday.
