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

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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

At our last meeting, the WBL Board faced the necessity of staunching the flow of red ink on our balance sheet. Rents are rising, and sanction and directors' fees are also increasing. At the same time, attendance is declining. This is true not only of our Unit Game, but of sectionals and regionals throughout the country, as the bridge-population ages and younger players do not replace them.

To help counteract the deficit, the Board has adopted two measures. The first was to raise entry fees: if you've been to the game vou'll have notice that both Unit Game and sectional entries now cost \$11/session. (This is in line with NVBA entry fees.)

The second measure is eliminating free plays for section tops. The Board regrets the necessity for this, as we recognize the satisfaction that comes with receiving a prize for a winning performance. However this was the least painful of the alternatives considered that we believed would achieve our goal of balancing the budget. The new policy is effective as of 1 September. Moreover, existing free plays for section tops will no longer be valid after 1 January 2018. Please use those free plays as soon as possible! Free plays for volunteer work,

such as guaranteed partner or serving on a committee at the Unit Game, will continue to be issued and will be valid indefinitely.

The Board will review the financial situation in January and decide if further steps need to be taken.

The Board also decided, by email, on a revised policy for the Guaranteed Partner Program. This policy was advertised at the Partnership Desk as of 31 August (and may be found online at the WBL website). These changes: to entry fees, section top awards, and to the guaranteed partner program underline the need to provide more timely information to our bridge community. To this end, the Board plans to consider how we can best use a website to provide the most current updates to our policies. Suggestions would be most welcome.

Effective January 1, 2018, stratification caps at Sectionals and Unit Games will be raised to Unlim/4000 masterpoints for the A/X games, 2500/1500/750 masterpoints for the B/C/D games. and 500/300/100 masterpoints for the Intermediate/Novice games. This is in response to a request from several WBL members.

We love to hear from you and find ways to make the game more enjoyable for everyone.

I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the

score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

ner opens 1 ♥ and you respond 1 ♠. 2 ♦ comes back to you. 3 & is probably where you belong. If you have a good hand, you double or cue bid. Therefore, $3 \clubsuit$ should be non-forcing and show a weak hand with long clubs. You don't need both double and $3 \clubsuit$ to force. $2 \clubsuit$ is non-forcing in the following auction since you could double or cue bid if strong. 1 ♦ (Pass) 1 ♥ (1 ♠) Pass (Pass) 2. When partner passes instead of making a support double, you want to reopen with a double just in case partner has a penalty pass. If you don't want partner to pass your reopening double because you have a long suit, you can cue bid. Therefore new suits are non-forcing.

Seven experts are getting too high. Two of them prefer to play 3NT. I wonder how many club tricks they are getting. Partner might not have an entry.

Theurer: "3NT—I play here that partner's 3♣ is forcing. Yes, I wish he could have found a double so as much as I hate my hand, I will honor his forcing call. I could bid 3 here probably showing two since I did not make a support double on the previous round but then partner will not be able to bid 3NT if that's right. At least I have two diamond stoppers."

Hopkins: "3NT. Where misfits go to die."

Five experts take responder back to spades. I wonder how many players would respond 1 ♠ to $1 \vee holding \wedge Qxxx \vee x \wedge xx + KJ109xx$?

Schwartz: "3 ♠—Unlikely 3NT is a good spot and would be pleased if partner as able to pass."

Parker: "3 ♠—I assume we are playing support doubles so I'm showing exactly two spades. No tricks in notrump with all the garbage."

King: "3 ♠—I didn't make a support double, so partner should expect only two spades."

Two experts play 3 ♣ as non-forcing but think that 3 \(\infty \) will play better than 3 \(\infty \). If partner has spades that will play opposite two, he might have reopened with $2 \clubsuit$. This is a matchpoint problem and spades is a major.

Korbel: "3♠—In my view, 3♣ is not forcing. In that case, 3NT will not be a good contract and I can hope for a six-card spade suit over there once in a while."

Shi: "3 ♠—Thanks partner. An easy preference at least. Partner won't have four spades and six+ clubs here - they would have responded 1NT originally with that hand type weak, and they would have doubled 2 ♦ with invitational or better. I expect 5-5+."

Three experts join me and pass partner's nonforcing I-want-to-play-3♣ bid.

Woolsey: "Pass—With my own agreements 3♣

would be defined as to play, so of course I would pass. However, I would not think that is a mainstream agreement."

Sontag: "Pass—Responder shows six or more clubs and a competitive hand."

Adams: "Pass-Where the heck is the balancing double partner promised to make when we agreed to play support doubles? Maybe partner is 4-7 or something, not strong enough for 2. Partner better have something extreme like this. If partner simply forgot to double, that's his problem, he can play 3..."

If Responder is in pass-out seat and can double or cue bid, then there's no reason why a new suit should be forcing.

Partner passed and then responded 2 . Since he's a passed hand, he is likely to have only five hearts. So how do you try to find a better strain assuming that you don't want to play in $2 \checkmark$? If you bid $2 \land$, partner will assume that you have at least six spades and could pass with a singleton spade. However, if you bid 2NT, partner will know that you don't have six spades and if he has another suit, he should bid it which would make you happy.

Three experts bid 3. I could see partner holding $Axx \bigvee KQ1098 \bigvee Kxxx AQx$, either passes 3 Aor bids 3 . Either way, you'd miss your eightcard diamond fit.

Theurer: "3 - UGH, just the bid I did not

want to hear. Partner did not open weak 2♥ so either he doesn't have six hearts or if he does, they aren't very good. I'm hoping to find a minor suit fit which will exist unless partner is specifically 2=5=3=3. His 2♥ presumably denying three-card spade support.ct from a likely 5-0 fit. 2♠ would be nice if it were just "waiting" and hoping partner introduces a four-card minor but here I think partner will take it as at least six spades and pass with 1-5-3-4 or 1-5-4-3 shape or even a five-card minor which is not what I want. But if partner does have a doubleton spade, 2♠ could be right so it is a reasonable alternative."

Shi: "3 \clubsuit —Unless partner has 2=5=3=3 we have a fit somewhere. This will allow partner to bid $3 \spadesuit$ on the way to $3 \spadesuit$ if he happens to be 2=5=4=2."

Hopkins: "3♣—I will try to show my unbalanced hand as cheaply as possible."

Schwartz: "2♠—Partner unlikely to have six hearts so 2♠ should be better if partner passes. If he bids, it leaves room for 2NT or three-of-a-minor. Would pass 2♥ not vulnerable at IMPS."

Parker: "2♠—Yuck, only five spades but some spots, hope to scramble 7-8 tricks. Partner did not open 2♥ or 3♥ so he has some distribution or bad hearts."

Sontag: "2♠—The alternatives pass, 3♣ and 2NT to me are awful."

Korbel: "2♠—I can't leave partner to rot but I don't want to make a forward going move."

King: "2♠—Yuck. Partner didn't open 2♥ so he has only five so I need to bid again. I will go low and not imply greater strength."

Two experts agree with me and leaves room for partner to bid a minor. If partner is 5-4-3-1 or 5-5-2-1, he's unlikely to pass 2NT. If partner is 2=5=3=3, you'll play 2NT.

Woolsey: "2NT—Leaves partner room to bid a minor. If he passes, we might survive."

Adams: "2NT—The best way to find our minor suit fit is to let partner bid it. If I bid 3♣, we might miss a diamond fit. 2♠ in Washington Standard promises six."

As in many auctions, the cheapest bid is the best bid. 2NT gives partner a chance to describe his hand.

The experts have three reasonable choices. 1 \spadesuit , bid 2 \spadesuit or rebid 1NT. Passing 1 \spadesuit loses when partner has a very good 4=3=5=1 hand such as \spadesuit AQJx \forall Axx \spadesuit Axxxx \clubsuit x where 4 \forall is a reasonable contract. Passing wins when partner has \spadesuit AQJx \forall x \spadesuit Axxxx \clubsuit xxx where 1 \spadesuit is the best part-score. Bidding 1NT wins when partner can support your hearts or has bad spades and they lead trumps stopping opener from ruffing diamonds.

Six experts join me and pass $1 \clubsuit$. We hope our singleton diamond is worth a lot. This is a trump leading auction.

Parker: "Pass—Should be our best fit and I don't play $1 \spadesuit$ forcing so we are high enough. My bet is partner has arong $1 \spadesuit$ opener."

Korbel: "Pass—This will probably play better than 1NT. I think a 1NT bid is fine."

Woolsey: "Pass—We could have a game, but since partner didn't jump shift, it is more likely that 1♠ is where we belong."

Shi: "Pass—A little heavy, but sometimes it's good to stay low."

Adams: "Pass—Hate getting this in a bidding problem. I really believe pass works great on this sort of hand at matchpoints. I also know that almost no one else sees it like I do. Sticking to my guns."

Hopkins: "Pass—This has to be playable and I am not sure but that any further bidding will get us in trouble."

Four experts keep the bidding open. Two experts rebid 1NT which allows partner to support hearts with three if he wants to. BTW, I always support hearts with three even 4=3=3=3.

Theurer: "1NT—I have a bit too much to pass. My hearts are not good enough to rebid since there's a decent chance partner is short there and 2♠ should show either four-card support or at least better than three small."

Schwartz: "1NT—Enough values to keep the auction open. Playing 1♠ could be ugly."

Two experts break the 'Don't raise partner's second bid suit with only three' rule.

Sontag: "2♠—But only because I hate 1NT."

King: "2♠—I think I have too much to pass and the poor club spots lead me to raise with only three."

Holding a singleton, it's usually best to play in a suit.

Partner opened $1 \triangleq$ and we have a very strong hand. Seven will be reasonable if partner has three aces. If partner has Axx of hearts you'll have to guess hearts. Six might take a heart guess if partner has two aces and five might also take a heart guess if partner has only one ace. Partner could have xx or xxx of hearts. The simplest answer is to immediately ask for aces. However, there are problems with that. Partner might not have an ace. So how do you create an auction where partner will cue bid an ace if he has at least one ace and signoff if he doesn't have an ace? One way is to jump to 4 & which shows spade support, club shortness and a game-forcing hand. If he has two aces, he'll bid one of them below 4. If partner signs off over 4., it's very unlikely that you have a slam.

Six experts bid Jacoby 2NT showing a gameforcing four-card spade raise. In standard Jacoby, partner jumps to 4♠ showing a weak hand. If you would not accept a limit raise you jump to 4 \(\ \ \ \ \ over 2NT. If you would accept a limit raise, your hand is too strong to jump to jump to $4 \clubsuit$ over 2NT. $\spadesuit Qxxxx \forall Ax \spadesuit Axx \clubsuit xxx$ as well as $\triangle QJxxx \vee Q10x \wedge KJ \wedge QJx$ are examples of hands where you would pass if partner made a limit raise and therefore jump to 4 A over 2NT. In my first example, 6 \$\infty\$ is cold and not many would even open the hand. In my second example, you're off three aces and they may even get a heart ruff. Jacoby 2NT is ok only if the weak bid is 3.

Theurer: "2NT—I will set trumps and see what partner says - there is a decent chance I will bid 4NT RKC later. It might depend on whether partner shows short hearts and/or extras."

Woolsey: "2NT—As it is possible we are off three aces, I'm not going to rush to ask for aces. If partner shows a dead minimum and then refuses to cooperate at all, we don't have a slam." **Korbel:** "2NT—Let's set spades as trumps and see what partner has to says. If he jumps to $4 \clubsuit$, I'm passing."

I wonder if Opener is allowed to jump to $4 \clubsuit$ holding two aces.

Adams: "2NT—I am not about to give up captaincy by splintering, and bidding 2 ♥ when I have five-card spade support is not my style."

King: "2NT—Let me try to find out about partner's hand rather than try to show mine."

Hopkins: "2NT—Set trumps and see what type of hand partner has."

Three experts bid Blackwood, Does partner promise an ace when he opens the bidding. Wouldn't you open $1 \clubsuit$ holding $QJxxx \blacktriangledown Q10 \spadesuit KQJ \clubsuit QJx?$ Suppose partner has $QJxxxxx \blacktriangledown - \spadesuit AKxx \clubsuit Qx$. The heart void allows you to make $6 \spadesuit$. A slight problem will occur if opener responds $5 \spadesuit$. Is that three aces or two keys and the queen of spades? More investigation is necessary.

Schwartz: "4NT—All that matters is aces. Very unlikely the five-level is unsafe and want an answer before opponents interfere."

Parker: "4NT—I will play a small slam if partner has two Aces and a grand if he has three. I know what to do if he has only one ace."

If you're missing the ace of hearts, slam could be on a heart guess. What if Opener doesn't have an ace?

Sontag: "4NT—Regular blackwood."

One expert joins me and bids 2 . Usually I say that you should set trumps ASAP. However, it's more important to find out if partner has heart support and how many aces partner has. If partner raises hearts, you can bid 3 . which will force partner to cue bid at the four-level. If partner does not raise hearts, you can support spades at the three-level which will suggest that partner cue bid an ace if he has one. Either way, we won't get to the five-level off three aces.

Shi: "2 ♥—All I'm planning to do is keycard but in the off chance partner can raise my hearts, I can

keycard in hearts. If partner can't raise, I will be able to bid the grand if we have all the keys knowing he has Ax."

Before you ask for aces, make sure you can handle all of partner's responses. If there is a response that you can't handle, take a different road.

There are votes for pass, $1 \, \checkmark$, $2 \, \checkmark$, $3 \, \checkmark$ and $4 \, \checkmark$. The only correct answer to this problem is what bid works out at the table. If you open $4 \, \checkmark$ LHO overcalls $4 \, \spadesuit$, partner doubles $4 \, \spadesuit$ and they go for 800. This makes $4 \, \checkmark$ the best bid. On the other hand, if you open $4 \, \checkmark$, LHO doubles and you go for 800, this makes $4 \, \checkmark$ a losing bid. Same for all heart openings. As you can see from the expert answers that there is no correct bid. The only correct answer is the one that works at the table. The higher you bid, the more red honors partner needs to make your bid work.

Three experts pass hoping to be able to describe their red-suited hand later. They are more likely to be doubled if they stray too high. Passing allows the opponents to start describing their hands and he who starts the auction has an advantage.

Theurer: "Pass—I'm in second chair where preemption should be somewhat more disciplined.

Besides, I'm not sure how high to preempt and if I preempt in hearts we could have a big fit in diamonds. Plus my hand has a lot of soft, potentially defensive values which somewhat offset the shapeliness."

King: "Pass—I hope I can show my distribution at a reasonable level on the next round."

Hopkins: "Pass—I am sure there will be plenty of action in this hand and I will likely be able to describe my distribution to partner fairly well."

Partner will play you for 5-5 not 6-6 in the reds.

One expert opens $1 \, \mathbf{v}$. You'll probably get a chance to show your diamond suit. If the auction gets competitive, the opponents won't know whose hand it is. However, $1 \, \mathbf{v}$ allows the opponents to enter the auction at a low level.

Shi: "1 ♥—I have a very distributional hand and the opponents are not vulnerable so if I start preempting, they will just bid over me and I will be guessing. Hopefully 1 ♥ will keep the auction slow."

Three experts open $2 \, \mathbf{V}$. I bet they're going to bid again if they get a chance. However, it's easy for the opponents to enter over $2 \, \mathbf{V}$.

Sontag: "2♥—Let's get this party going."

Korbel: "2♥—A tactical 2♥. If you know me, then you know I'm planning to bid again."

Adams: "2♥—2♥ or 3♥ or 4♥ could be right. Unfavorable, second seat, reigning it in a

lot. If partner raises, I might violate protocol. Don't really like pass. It might be at the four-level by the time it gets to me and I will have gone through the auction never mentioning any of my six-card suits."

One expert opens 3 . The higher you open, the less likely you are to be able to bid your diamond suit. Also, the opponents will think it's their hand if the auction gets competitive.

Schwartz: "3 ♥—Tempting to pass with RHO a passed hand, and the stiff king, but that usually doesn't work out with these distributional hands."

Two experts open $4 \, \mathbf{v}$. They put a few diamonds in with their hearts. If you find the rest of the strength split, $4 \, \mathbf{v}$ might end the auction.

Woolsey: "4♥—Mentally moving a couple of diamonds over to the heart suit gives you the right evaluation."

I'm not sure I like bidding $5 \spadesuit$ over the opponent's black-suit bid. You are vulnerable. It up to partner to do something.

Parker: "4♥—And then 5♦ if they bid 4♠. I may go for a number but make it as hard on them as possible."

Make aggressive preempts.



AT THE TABLE: A SURVIVAL MANUAL

—Part 11—

We continue our discussions of common problems at the bridge table. While some discussion may presume a certain amount of experience and sensitivity to the situations being described, even a novice may improve in these areas through exposure to the underlying issues. Discussions include both practical advice on how to cope with problems once they occur as well as procedures to follow to minimize or avoid disruptions in the first place. Every suggestion may not be appropriate for all games or players: some are not intended for novices or events with low MP limits; others may be modified for more socially-oriented or club games. But above all else, please remember that the emphasis of bridge should always be on fun, enjoyment and relaxation. Even in serious competition it is to everyone's advantage to avoid practices which can cause problems or illfeelings among the contestants.

A Played Card

Principle: When a card is considered played depends on whether it came from the dummy, declarer or a defender. The key issue is: for defenders, was it possible for partner to see the card's face (not whether he actually saw it); for declarer, did he perform any action with the card which indicated an intent to play it; for dummy, was the card deliberately touched by declarer, named or otherwise designated as the one declarer proposed to play.

Deciding whether a card has been played can be a volatile and confusing matter. But understanding the underlying concepts can help simplify the issue.

For a defender, the key issue is one of unauthorized information: If a defender holds a card so that his partner *could* have seen its face (whether he actually saw it or not is irrelevant), the card is played.

For the declaring side, there is no reason to be

concerned about unauthorized information: declarer can already see both his own hand and dummy's, while dummy cannot legally participate in the play. The key issue in these cases is whether there was *intent* to play the card. Declarer may not change his mind once he has designated a card from dummy or played a card from his hand. For declarer, the Laws specify that there is evidence that a card has been played if it is held face up touching or nearly touching the table, or maintained in such a position as to indicate that it has been played. Thus, if declarer removes a card from his hand and lowers it to the table, showing it to the defenders, it is considered played. Note that players don't always release their cards onto the table so simply holding it near the table is sufficient. Some players take a card from their hand and show it to the opponents to indicate that it is being played. So if declarer shoves a card under a defender's nose, as if to say "Here, I'm playing this," the fact that it isn't near the table is irrelevant. The key is that it is maintained in such a way as to indicate the intent to play it. Conversely, a card dropped accidentally by declarer is never considered played. Also, a card detached from declarer's hand but not held or maintained in such a way as to indicate that it is being played (for example, declarer may hold it aloft while he continues to consider whether to play it) is not played, even though it's face may be clearly visible to everyone at the table. (Of course we should all refrain from detaching or touching a card until we are certain we intend to play it.)

For dummy, the same concept applies as for declarer except that the physical mechanics are a bit different. Although declarer doesn't usually handle dummy's cards, if he deliberately touches one of them—unless he does so to arrange it or to get at another card above or below it—that card is played. Also, if he names or otherwise designates one of dummy's cards as the one he proposes to play, it is played.

One final issue regarding dummy's plays. Although declarer may at times give dummy an instruction such as "Run the spades" (meaning play

them from the top), there is no basis in Law for such an instruction. Therefore, even though dummy carries out declarer's wishes, the play of dummy's cards is deemed to be conducted on a trick-by-trick basis. This means that at any point declarer may cancel his instruction to play the remaining cards, provided he does so before dummy plays the next card (detaches it or places it in a played position). Effectively, it is as though declarer's instruction had been, "Run the spades until I tell you to stop."

(See also Changing a Played Card; Changing a Designated Card.)

Changing a Played Card; Changing a Designated Card

Principle: A played card may be changed to comply with a penalty, to correct an illegal play, if it was played as a result of misinformation, or to change a card played after an opponent's card when the Director allows that opponent to change his card. A card which has been inadvertently (verbally) designated, as in calling a card from dummy, may be changed only if declarer attempts to do so without pause for thought (i.e., the call was a slip of the tongue).

I know the above principle sounds as if a gaggle of lawyers had been hired to write it. I wish I could have found a simpler way of saying it that would still be accurate. Let's take it one point at a time and I think you'll be pleasantly surprised. The Laws allow a played card to be retracted for any of several reasons, some technical and some legal. These are:

- (1) To comply with a penalty. Suppose, for example, a defender gains the lead while his partner has a penalty card in front of him. Declarer has certain lead options available, but before he can exercise any of them the defender leads a card. If declarer chooses not to accept that lead it is canceled, the card led becomes another penalty card (and information from it unauthorized to the leader's partner) and declarer is given his choice of his original options.
- (2) To correct an illegal play. Suppose, for example, a defender, in attempting to follow suit to a card led, revokes and then catches it before it becomes established. He must substitute a legal card in the suit led, after which the revoke card becomes a penalty card (this applies only to defenders, not declarer) and information from it becomes unauthorized to his partner.
 - (3) To change a play that was based on misin-

formation from an opponent, but only if no other card was subsequently played to that trick (or if dummy was not spread if it was the opening lead). For example, suppose after a brief distraction you ask "Whose lead is it? RHO mistakenly says "Yours" and you lead before anyone can correct the error. The Director will allow you to retract your card and information from it becomes unauthorized to the opponents but authorized to your partner. Or suppose, before playing to a trick, you ask the meaning of a call made by an opponent during the auction and are given an erroneous answer. You play, but the opponent then corrects his explanation before anyone else can play. Once again the Director will allow you to retract your card (with the same authorized/unauthorized information provisions as above).

(4) To change a card which was played after the Director allowed an opponent who played to the trick before you to change his card. Suppose, for example, declarer calls a card from dummy but the wrong card is detached and placed in a played position. The next player sees dummy's play and follows suit before declarer notices the error. The Director will allow dummy to correct the errant play and the next player to retract his play (if he wishes) without penalty. Information from the next player's withdrawn card becomes unauthorized information for the offending side (declarer) but authorized to the non-offending side (both defenders).

In all other cases, a played card may not be changed, even if it was played inadvertently (see also *A Played Card*).

Finally, these days players do not usually designate a card they wish to play orally (although a player who is having difficulty removing a card from his hand, or card holder, may name the card he intends to play to expedite things). Thus, the provision in the Laws for correcting an inadvertent designation is usually applied to declarer's oral designation of a card from dummy. A player may, without penalty, change an inadvertent designation if it is done without pause for thought. The burden of proof is on the player to show convincing evidence that: (1) his designation was inadvertent and not a change of mind; and (2) the attempted change was made without pause for thought. Also, if the next player plays before the correction is made, that play must not in any way suggest that the designation was a mistake. In other words, there is a strong presumption that the card called is the card the player intended. In fact, all of the provisions for changing an inadvertent call (see Changing a Call (c)) apply here as well.



THE FORCING NOTRUMP

This column plans to have a series of articles on the **Two-Over-One (2/1) Game Force** system of bidding. One advantage of playing 2/1 (defined as: when partner opens 1-of-asuit and responder bids 2-of-another-suit without jumping) as game-forcing is that it allows players to relax and engage in more precise bidding in a 2/1 auction, without any fear of partner passing.

However, as a result, the response of 1NT to partner's One-of-a-Major (1M) suit opener becomes a bid that covers a broader range of hands, and is typically treated as forcing for one round. Please note: The Forcing 1NT response only applies when partner opens $1 \, \mathbf{v}$ or $1 \, \mathbf{A}$, not when partner opens a minor suit.

Learning to use the Forcing NoTrump response when partner opens 1M is an integral part of the 2/1 game force bidding system. Here are the main criteria for using the Forcing 1NT response when partner opens 1M:

You respond 1NT to partner's 1M opener with 6 to 12 points with the following exceptions.

- (1) You should still respond 1♠ to partner's 1♥ opener holding at least four spades.
- (2) You should still raise 1M to 2M directly holding 7-10 support points and at least three-card support. With a hand worth 6 to a bad 7 in support points, respond 1NT and then support partner's major at the lowest level.
- (3) With three-card support and 11-12 support points respond 1NT and then jump in partner's major. With four-card support and 11-12 support points, raise directly to 3M. Here, using the Forcing NT allows you to distin-

guish between a limit raise with 3-card vs. 4-card support.

Axx ♥ Kxx ◆ Axxx *xxx or Axx ♥ Kx ◆ Kxxx *xxx are examples of three-card limit raise hands where you respond 1NT to 1♠, planning on jumping to 3♠ over opener's two-of-aminor response.

Never respond 1NT with a game-forcing hand!

Axx ♥Qxx ♦xxxx ♣xxx or Axx ♥Qxx ♦Jxx ♣xxxx are examples of hands where you respond 1NT to 1♠, planning on bidding 2♠ over opener's two-of-a-minor response.

So, as you can see, the Forcing No Trump response includes all of the hands on which you would have responded 1NT if using Standard American, but it expands the range of hands on which this bid is used. Remember: you will no longer bid a new suit at the two level with 10, 11, or 12 points.

Ax ♥Kx ♦QJxxx ♣Jxxx and Ax ♥xx ♦KQxxx ♣Jxxxx are examples of hands where you respond 1NT to partner's 1M opener. Note that 1NT does not show a balanced hand.

Now, let's look at Opener's rebid choices when partner has responded 1 NT.

First of all: Don't pass! (Note: If you opened in third or fourth seat light, there are limited exceptions to this rule). You must find a rebid.

In general, if you are 5-4 or 5-5 or have a sixcard or longer major then bid exactly as you would have over a non-forcing 1NT. If you have six or more cards in your major, rebid your major, at the appropriate level based on the strength of your hand. If you have a second suit, bid it jump-shifting if your hand is worth 17+ points. Make the same bid you would have made over a non-forcing 1NT response.

Holding ♠AKxxx ♥xx ♦AKxx ♣xx, open 1♠ and rebid 2♠ just like you would over a non-forcing 1NT. Holding ♠x ♥AKxxxx ♦xxx ♣AQx, open 1♥ and rebid 2♥ just like you would over a non-forcing 1NT.

However, suppose that you hold the common 5-3-3-2 distribution hand where you would have passed 1NT? Then, rebid two-of-your-lowest three-card minor suit.

Open 1♠ and rebid 2♠ holding ♠AKxxx ♥xxx ♠Axx ♣Qx. Open 1♠ and rebid 2♣ holding ♠AKxxx ♥xxx ♠Ax ♣Qxx. The problem hand is when you hold ♠AJxx ♥AKxxx ♠xx ♣xx. You have to open $1 \, \mathbf{V}$ and rebid $2 \, \mathbf{A}$ over partner's forcing 1NT.

Remember, as Opener, keep in mind after partner's 1 NT response that he has disclosed a hand that could have limited or invitational values. In addition, while partner definitely does not have four-card trump support, partner could still have an invitational hand with three—card support for your major. From your point of view, game in either a suit or notrump is not out of the question, particularly if your opening bid was solid. Also remember: partner could still have five or more hearts when you open 1 \(\black\), again, with either limited or invitational values.
