You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote

for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

What does a jump to 4♠ look like? 4♠ should be a hand like ♠KQJxxxxx ♥x ♠x♣xxx, a preemptive hand with no defense. Partner would never expect that you have the AK of spades, the queen of diamonds and a singleton in his opening bid suit. Rather than bid 4♠, South should have bid 3♥ which shows at least five spades and at least ten points. This is part of the convention called Unusual over Unusual. Over 2NT, 3♣ would be a simple raise, 3♠ would be a limit raise or better in clubs and 3♠ would be natural and non-forcing like a weak two. You can't pass, since partner doesn't know that you have defense. If you pass, 5♠ could end the auction. So the question is, do you double 5♠ or do you bid 5♠?

I'd expect to get at least four tricks against 5 ♦ doubled. If it was the 2NT-bidder who bid at the five-level, I'd expect him to be more distributional than the normal 5-5. However, it is very likely that you will get three black tricks and at least one red trick for +300. If you could get +300 neither vul-

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nerable or +500 when unfavorable at IMPs when they save you'd be way ahead of the game. Sometimes you get more then the value of your game and sometimes you can't make game. At matchpoints, you can't afford to be +300 when everyone else is +450. Plus 300 loses only four IMPs to +450 but wins eight IMPs if game doesn't make.

Five experts bid five over five. While 5♠ should make more often than not, getting +300 is amble compensation at IMPs. Why can't partner have ♠x ♥x ♠ Kxxx ♣ AKJxxxx? You never gave partner a chance to describe his hand. Opposite that hand, 5♠ could easily go down. The clue to not bidding 5♠ is your holding of four hearts. If you assume that the 4NT bidder is equal in the red suits, then partner has either one heart and four diamonds or no hearts and three diamonds. I'd guess the former since if the 4NT bidder was 4-4 in the red suits, he wouldn't be asking for partner's opinion. If partner has some strength in diamonds, they could be hurting.

**Landen:** "5♠—No idea who can make what. When in doubt, buy the contract."

When in doubt, don't bid five over five. Do you really think they will make 5♠?

**Hopkins:** "5♠—Partner did not double 4NT suggesting primarily defensive values. Also,

the 4NT bid suggests length in both red suits so partner may be short in Hearts. A typical hand for partner is ♠xxx♥x♠Kxx♣AKJxxx."

Parker: "5♠—Partner's pass must be forcing. He could have doubled 4NT to say he wanted to defend, so with no defense I bid on. If I did not like the opponents I would bid 6♠ just to tick them off."

Why must partner's pass be forcing? You have not shown a single defensive trick. I don't think a preemptive raise to game creates a force.

Woolsey: "5 ♠ —This is simply a bet that somebody can make 11 tricks. If I'm right I'll win around eight IMPs, while if I'm wrong I'll lose around four IMPs. That's good enough odds for me with this hand and this auction."

Woolsey assumes that 5♦ will go down only one. If it goes down two, his IMP odds are backwards.

Adams: "5 ——Pass not forcing as 4 & could have been same hand missing Ace. 4NT suggests they have double fit. Partners pass suggests he does not want to double them unilaterally. Some play double of 4NT as "please bid" but that takes a specific non-standard understanding."

One expert passes. If 4 h told your story, then pass would be reasonable.

**Frankel:** "Pass—I told my story when I bid 4♠. Let partner decide what to do."

When in doubt, don't bid five over five. (I wonder if I've ever said this before.)

There are many options — Pass, and all bids between 1NT and 3♦ and all have at least one flaw. With two little hearts and partner having at most three hearts, notrump from our side seems flawed. The system you are playing makes a difference in your answer. If you are bidding suits up the line, then partner could be 4=3=3=3. If partner could be 4=3=3=3, 3♣ is flawed unless you like playing 3-3 fits. If you're playing Walsh, where 1♦ denies a four-card major unless you have a game force, 1 h promises at least four clubs. If partner promises at least four clubs, 3. is reasonable. In Washington Standard, you bid 1♠ if you're 4=3=3=3. If partner could have three clubs, 34 could be a disaster. The object of IMPs is to get plus scores. Unless there's game any plus score works.

Three experts join me and make a minimum bid. 2♣ and 2♠ are minimum bids and each should make.

**Landen:** "2 .—No good bid, so try to stay low and go plus."

Adams: "2♣—I like two-way check back, but I think in Washington Standard 2♣ is just a natural preference so I still bid it. Partner must have four clubs unless 4=3=3=3, in which case he will correct to diamonds. Sometimes I have extras when no direct invite makes sense. Note that with Walsh style, partner has to have five clubs. His likely shape is 4=3=1=5 or 4=2=2=5. We might

make 3NT, but 2. might also be high enough."

**Frankel:** " $2 \blacklozenge - Pass$ , 1NT,  $2 \clubsuit$ ,  $2 \diamondsuit$ ,  $2 \diamondsuit$ , 2NT,  $3 \diamondsuit$  all have at least one flaw. I'll try the underbid of  $2 \diamondsuit$ , we probably don't have a game."

Three experts invite.

**Hopkins:** "3.—In my regular partnerships, partner has guaranteed four spades and longer clubs so this is easy. But even in Washington Standard, I can't think of a better call. At least my points are about right and they do match up to the suits I bid."

Woolsey: "3.4—On target value-wise, and partner will usually have five clubs for this sequence. Even if it is a 4-3 fit, that might not be so bad."

The following expert will not play in a 3-3 fit. I'd love to play 3NT with xx opposite xx in hearts.

Parker: "2NT—Wrong siding it, but no other bid works to show this hand. I would like to bid 2♣ forcing for one round and then over 2♠, bid 2♠ which should show three

If you don't have a fit, stay low.

It is unclear how many spades partner has and therefore how many hearts. Would partner raise spades with only three instead of bidding 2. If partner would never raise spades with only three, then he could have three spades. If partner would

always raise spades directly with three then we don't have an eight-card spade fit. What would he bid over 2♥ holding ★Kx♥xx ♦ AQxxx ★Kxxx? Most would bid 2♠. What other choice do you have? I would hope that he would bid 2♠ in tempo. If partner thought for 15 seconds and then bid 2♠, you must assume that he has three spades and bid accordingly. A good problem would be what is the lowest value of YZ in the following hand -♠YZx♥x ♦ AKxxx♣KJxx - where you would raise spades directly. Would you raise spades directly holding ♠xxx♥x♠AKxxx♣KJxx?

You have an eight-card club fit. Slam in clubs needs partner to have aces and kings and a singleton heart. If you raise clubs, you can go back to spades. If you set spades as trump, it will be difficult to get to clubs.

Five experts support clubs. They assume that partner is 3=1=5=4. I think he's more likely to be 2=2=5=4.

**Parker:** "3♣—How can I not support partner and look for our best strain? Partner should be 3-1-5-4, so give him as little as ♠Kxx♥x♠AKxxx♣Kxxx, we are cold for 6♣ with decent breaks. Over 3♠ I will bid 3♥ and hope he shows some life."

**Frankel:** "3♣—We are in slam territory.

Let partner know of the double fit."

BTW, after 3♣, which set clubs as trump, I play that 4♦ by either player is RKC for clubs. Using 4♦ as RKC for clubs gives you the same steps as 4NT does for 4♠.

**Landen:** "3♣—We might end in 4♠, but we might have a slam and clubs is the slam suit. We can always play 4♠. Let's see how partner reacts."

Hopkins: "3 ——Isn't this what fourth-suitforcing is all about? Your immediate subsequent call should make it clear why you employed fourth-suit forcing. Partner should have three Spades, but you can elect to play there later."

Woolsey: "3. Set the trump suit first, and things will take care of themselves. If I don't show that we have a playable club fit right now, we can never get to clubs."

One expert joins me and makes a sensible bid, telling partner that we have five spades. If partner is 2=2=5=4, he needs lots of extra values in order to make a club slam. Opposite ♠Kx ♥xx ♠ AQxxx ♣Kxxx a club slam needs good breaks and luck. If partner bids 4♠ over 3♠, which denies slam values, slam will be anti-percentage and 4♠ figures to be the best game contract.

**Adams:** "3 ♠ —Tempting to try for club slam, but that risks losing the spade suit, and partner sounds like 3=1=5=4, so no point in trying to play the 4-4.3 ♠ confirms trump and is stronger than 4 ♠."

I play jumping to 4 h over 2 h shows a very bad hand saying if you want to bid again you're on your own.

Don't assume that partner has the perfect hand.

We certainly have enough strength for game. There's a chance we could even have a slam. 6 ♦ is cold opposite ♠ Ax ♥ Jx ♠ AK Qxxx ♣ Kxx. In order to explore for slam a trump suit has to be established. As soon as the trump suit has been established, we can then figure out at what level we belong. Trumps then level. On the other hand, we might belong in game. The problem is that there is no way to ask partner if he has a spade stopper. The way I see it, it's either 3NT hoping partner has a spade stopper or some number of diamonds.

Two experts think we belong in 3NT. If I wanted to be in 3NT I would bid 3NT.

**Parker:** "3 ♠—I would bid 3NT with spades stopped so this must ask for a stopper. No one worries about clubs. I can't have the major since if I had five hearts I would rebid them and we can't have a spade fit once partner bids 3 ♠."

What if your black suits were reversed? Would you bid 3NT assuming that partner had a club stopper? 3 h shows something in spades.

**Frankel:** "3NT—It is possible that partner does not have a spade stopper but I will chance it. Often the suit breaks 4-4 when they don't bid it."

Two experts bid 4**.** I wonder what they would they would say about 4**.** if they were dealt 4  $\times$  4  $\times$ 

**Landen:** "4♣—Too bad we didn't bid our longest suit first. Now, I'll cue 4♣ and hope to bid to five or 6♦. At least it's IMPs, so playing the lower paying game won't be so costly."

1 ♦ - 2 ♣ is a bad auction in standard. I don't like bidding 2 ♣ over 1 ♦ with a fourcard major unless I'm very strong. Suppose you hold ♠x ♥ AKx ♦ xxx ♣ AKxxxx. Partner opens 1 ♦ and rebids 2NT over your 2 ♣ response. Now you'd want to bid 3 ♥ to avoid playing 3NT opposite Jxx of spades. However, what is opener supposed to do over 3 ♥ if he holds ♠ KJ10 ♥ Jxxx ♠ KQJx ♣ Qx?

**Hopkins:** "4. — Diamonds are trumps and I am going slamming, starting with a cue bid. I don't expect to quit unless it becomes obvious we are off two Spade controls."

Two experts join me and support diamonds. Jx is good support opposite a  $3 \diamondsuit$  jump.  $4 \diamondsuit$  is forcing and sets diamonds as trump. His only problem would be what level we belong.

The only way you can play in four-of-aminor is if you've supported the minor and tried for 3NT and failed.

**Woolsey:** "4♦—Setting trumps, and showing slam interest. Hopefully partner's next

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**Adams:** "4♦—We have a slam. Set trumps. 4♦ not some subtle invite, since partner's hand is boxed."

Set trumps clearly and as soon as possible in slam auctions.

There aren't any bids which describe this hand. We could bid 2. but 2. is forcing to game. Do we want to force to game? We could invite game. There are only two invitational bids which are available, 2NT and 3 and there are problems with both bids. 3♠ shows four spades and it doesn't seem right to bid 2NT with a void. The third option is to make a non-game forcing, non-invitational bid such as 1NT or 2♠. We can still get to game if partner has extras.

The following two experts seem to be worlds apart. One forces to game, the other stops at the one-level.

**Parker:** "2♣—Forcing. I am willing to get to at least the three-level so let's hear what partner bids next. Over  $2 \diamondsuit$ , I will bid  $2 \diamondsuit$ , over 2♥ I will bid 4♥."

2♣ followed by 2♠ shows a game-forcing hand setting spades as trump. You can't make up a system based on your current hand.

**Adams:** "Pass—It's matchpoints, anything can work. Maybe my opponents will balance. Many will say, "what if partner holds.." skip the what if's. You can win a board by going plus when everyone else guesses badly. If we miss a heart slam I will apologize to partner. At IMPs, I would not risk passing."

Passing is extreme. Opposite ♠AJ10x  $\forall$  AQx  $\Rightarrow$  109xxx  $\Rightarrow$  A, you could be +260.

Two experts agree with me and keep the bidding open. 2♠ is unlikely to go down and if partner has extras 4 \( \infty \) would probably be as good a contract as any. The extra values make up for the lack of the fourth spade. The rule is that you don't raise partner's second suit with only three. This hand shows why the verb is don't rather than never.

**Frankel:** "2♠—I won't bid notrump with a void in partner's first bid minor. My hand is not strong enough for fourth suit forcing. KQx and ruffing value is adequate spade support."

Woolsey: "2 ♠—This has an excellent chance to be the top-scoring contract if North passes. Nothing else is appealing."

Two experts invite. 11 HCP is usually enough to invite opposite an opening bid but the lack of the fourth spade and the void in partner's first bid suit are big negatives.

**Landen:** "3 ♠—Eccentric with only three spades, but ten tricks on a crossruff likely. My other choices aren't any better."

**Hopkins:** "3 ♠—I can see taking about six tricks on a cross ruff and three on the side if partner is minimum and quits here and similarly at least ten tricks when partner carries on. Even on the inspired lead of a trump, one of my suits may set up for our extra tricks. I would rather be out a trump than this much out of range in HCP by bidding 2♠ or 1NT."

Stay low when there is a potential misfit.

membership, board or staff when corrective action may be warranted. If an investigation is unwarranted, the ombudsman may still choose to provide helpful advice to the WBL board or staff in order to improve conditions for the membership. The ombudsman may seek opinions from members regarding a complaint received, but the ombudsman should take care to protect the privacy of complainants.

The WBL ombudsman will not specifically identify any members who provide feedback to the ombudsman. The ombudsman's job is to improve conditions for all WBL members, so the source of the feedback is immaterial to the ombudsman's recommendations. (For specific complaints about player conduct at WBL events, members may file a Recorder form with the WBL Recorder, Barry Bragin.)

As your WBL ombudsman, I will listen when members have concerns, and I will report to the WBL membership, board or staff as needed. This may include explanations of why the WBL does some of the things it does, and how decisions are made.

Ombudsman Feedback Forms are available at the WBL Unit Games with instructions

on where to send them, or hand the form to me at the Unit Game. —Adrienne Kuehneman



#### MAJOR SUIT RAISES, PART 3: THE GAME FORCING RAISE

The first two parts of this series on Major Suit Raises focused on evaluating hands after partner opened 1 ♥ or 1 ♠. We divided hands with support for partner's suit as game forcing, invitational, constructive or simple raises. Now we want to look at how to bid when we have support and a game forcing hand.

When partner opens 1M (1 of a Major) and you, as responder, also have an opening hand, and you have extra trump support, you can best describe your hand by using *Jacoby 2N*. This is a popular conventional bid that conveys a hand with these characteristics:

- 13+ support points;
- No singleton or void in a side suit (assuming you also play Splinter Bids); and,
- FOUR OR MORE card support for opener's major.

The last point is very important. Jacoby 2N is a specific bid that promises 4+ cards in Opener's major. The bid should not be used with only 3 card support. We'll discuss what to do with 3 card support at the end of this article.

#### Benefits of Jacoby 2N:

In some auctions, you and partner may not know until the 4th bid that together you have game values. And even after that 4th bid, you still may not know the best strain to play the hand. The beauty of Jacoby 2N is that both of you know after only 2 bids that you will play in no less than 4 of your Major.

#### **Value of Nine Card Fit:**

Volumes have been written about the value of 9+ card trump fits. In a nutshell, having at least nine cards in a suit roughly triples your chance of getting a good trump break. Consider this trump suit:

AQ873 opposite K54

You play this suit by taking the top three honors. With eight cards, you will get a favorable (3-2) break 68% of the time. (See March-April WBL Bulletin for more on dis-

tribution and probabilities.) That means that 32% of the time you will lose a trump trick.

Now add a 4th trump to responder's hand, giving her K542. The addition of the lowly "2" reduces the probability of losing a trump trick to a mere 10% (the chance of a 4-0 break), substantially lowering the risk of a bad trump break. Additionally, after pulling trump, declarer may be able to use one or more trumps in dummy to ruff side suit losers. For all of these reasons, a *Jacoby 2N* raise will always promise 4+ card support.

#### **Opener's Second Bid:**

Another significant benefit of the *Jacoby 2N* convention is the wealth of information that Opener can convey about her hand with her second bid. Opener can show a good second five-card suit (4-level bids); Opener can show a singleton or void (3-level bids); or Opener can show relatively balanced hands and pinpoint her HCP range. Here are the specific bids:

Bid	Shows
4♣, 4♦ (or 4♥ if trump suit is spades)	A good (2 of the top 3 honors) 5 card suit
3♣, 3♦ or 3 of the OTHER major	A singleton or void in the suit bid
4 of the agreed major	12-14 points, no singleton or void *
3 of the agreed major	8+ points, no singleton or void *

\*these are suggested ranges that can be tweaked by partnership agreement.

Responder can now bid either game or slam with suitable hands, cuebid to show an ace and ask about slam tolerance, especially after a bid that neither showed nor denied extra values, such as a 3-level bid showing shortness, or bid 4NT (Blackwood) if she has sufficient values no suits with two fast losers (i.e., no suit with Ox or worse).

To see how this works, let's look at a few hands for opener. You open 1 \( \black \) and partner responds 2NT. You hold:

<b>♦</b> AQ853 <b>♥</b> KQT42 <b>♦</b> K9 <b>♣</b> 5	Bid 4♥, promising a 5 card suit. Since partner knows about 10 of your cards, she is sure that you hold a singleton or void in a minor. Partner will know immediately how to evaluate her hand and will downgrade with wasted values in the minors such as ◆ KJx or ♣QJxx
<b>♦</b> AJT84 <b>♥</b> T <b>♦</b> KT53 <b>♣</b> KQ6	Bid 3 ♥, showing your heart shortness. Partner, with as little as ♠ KQ53 ♥ 9732 ♠ A84 ♣ A8, can envision a 6 ♠ slam being very possible. With ♠ 9732 ♥ KQ53 ♠ A84 ♣ A8, partner knows that the ♥ KQ are not as valuable, and will stop in game. You want low cards opposite partner's short suits; high cards other than the ace are wasted.
♦98643 ♥KQ5 ♦A7 •K42	Bid 4. You have a minimum hand with bad trumps and no distributional points. Partner, with a very big hand, can still bid on, but you need to warn her not to expect more than a bare opening bid from you.
A8643 ♥KQ5 ◆A7 ♣K42	Bid 3NT. You still have mediocre trumps and no shortness, but you have a very good hand with 16 HCP. Slam would be very good opposite ♠KQ75 ♥J862 ♦K94 ♣AT, losing only a heart if trumps are 3-1 or 2-2 (90%).
<b>♦</b> AQJ43 <b>♥</b> KQ5 <b>♦</b> A7 <b>♣</b> K42	Bid 3♠. You have 19 HCP. If partner has almost anything useful, you will want to be in 6♠, and 7♠ is not out of the question. Blackwood will keep you out of slam if partner holds ♠KT87 ♥JT ♠KQJ5 ♣QJ8. Even though she has 13 high card points, you are missing two aces. But most other game forcing hands will make slam.

*NOTE:* both the *Jacoby 2N* bid and the follow up bids are alertable. Make sure to alert the bids and explain their meaning to opponents if asked.

Finally, what do we do if we do not have 4 card support for partner, but do have 13 or more high card points and 3 card support? We bid another suit, and then jump to game in partner's suit if you are playing Standard American. If you are playing 2/1 Game Forc-

ing, you bid a side suit at the two level, and then show support for partner, since you are in a game forcing auction. Opener will know you have only 3 card support since you did not use *Jacoby 2N*.
