PRESIDENT'S LETTER

The January sectional yielded many positive results but also highlighted problems which need to be addressed in the future. On the plus side, the new Friday evening event - IMP pairs/teams - was a big success! Players attended who had not been to a Friday night sectional in years. Feedback was universally positive. At the same time, the NLM game nearly doubled in size, perhaps in response to the discount being offered. We had stepped up efforts to advertise the sectional, including the description of the new event and the discount, and believe the publicity blitz was instrumental in increasing attendance. These efforts should be continued with future sectionals. On the minus side, difficulties arose in fulfilling our promise of guaranteed teammates when the pair slated to take on this role became unavailable a few days before the event. We need a process to make sure we have guaranteed teammates in place; if someone shows up without a partner, we will try to find that player someone to play with, but we will not guarantee a person both a partner and teammates.

Financial results are not yet in, but we believe that the sectional showed a loss, though considerably less than the one for the October sectional. The main reason for this is the lack of revenue from the Saturday morning game. Because of the snow, the county cancelled all activities in county buildings until 12:00 pm. We only found out about this at 8:15 am, and posted the cancellation on the website (more on this later) as soon as possible, but there really wasn't time to warn players that the game would not take place, and roughly 120 people showed up. The person in charge at the Senior Center authorized us to use the facility for an informal bridge game, but on the condition that we not charge an entry fee. So the game was held, and we were grateful not to have had to turn people away. Thanks to Bill Cole for negotiating this compromise, as well as working with the county to reduce the charge for rental to reflect a starting time of 2:00 pm.

We are starting to see the payoff for showing respect for our playing area. At close on Friday and Saturday, players volunteered to pick up their trash and push chairs neatly under the tables. Because of that, participants in the Saturday and Sunday morning games were greeted by neat, orderly playing conditions, and were inspired to help maintain them. Sunday closing went faster than ever, with more people aiding in folding up their tables, stacking chairs, and disposing of trash. Thanks to all who cooperated in these efforts. It is always more difficult to change a culture than to build one, and as a group we can be proud of successfully changing the culture of our sectionals so that we keep our wonderful playing site, which took so much effort to regain, in top shape.

Finally, a note about the website. An attempted upgrade by the WBL web service provider actually resulted in the frustrating loss of the database for the last two months.

People didn't know the url through which WBL information could be reached. or had gotten used to not being able to access it. This impeded our efforts to let players know the Saturday game had been cancelled, not to mention our efforts to publicize the sectional through this medium. The District 6 website can now be accessed via www.districtsixbridge.org; the WBL site can be reached through a link on the D6 home page. In addition, the WBL website (washingtonbridgeleague.org) should be fully operational by the time you read this with the same address as before.

You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL website. WBL Solvers club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

Partner has responded 1 ♥ and you have four-card heart support. Holding four-card heart support, you must make a bid which shows four hearts. With 11-14 support points you bid 2 ♥. With 15-17 support points you bid 3 ♥. With 18+ support points you jump to 4 ♥. With distributional strong hands you jump to $3 \clubsuit$ to show spade shortness, jump to $4 \clubsuit$ to show club shortness or jump to 4 ♦ to show four hearts and six good diamonds. If you have a strong freak, you could bid above 4 . All other bids deny holding four hearts. Which of these options comes closest to describing this hand? I like $3 \clubsuit$. Shows short spades and four-card heart support. If LHO bids 4♠, partner will be in a better position to decide what to do.

Five experts join me and jump to $3 \triangleq$ which shows spade shortness and four-card heart support. If the opponents bid $4 \triangleq$, partner will know that you have spade shortness.

Korbel: "3♠—This doesn't have to work out but I'm a 3♠ bidder."

Poe: "3♠—With a void in spades and such good texture in hearts and diamonds this hand is certainly worth a splinter. In the event that the opponents make a vulnerable 4♠-bid I have told my story and will respect partner's decision. I know of no rule that you have to have first or second round control in all suits, and if there was such a rule I would probably violate it on this hand."

Schwartz: "3♠—Admittedly light in HCP but can't bid 2♠ as that doesn't show support, and 4♥ doesn't solve the problem as partner will expect a different sort of hand."

Shi: "3 .— Is that a spade void I have? I'm going to overbid a bit with 3 . I have such great trumps and a source of tricks. It is nice to set up a force over the inevitable 4 .— bid."

Wookey: "3♠—This hand has enough playing strength to justify the splinter. Also, West might be about to bid 4♠, and if he does it will be important for me to have described this hand type to partner so he can make an intelligent decision."

Five experts raise hearts. Partner won't know that you have spade shortness.

Three of the five jump to $4 \, \checkmark$. They don't say what they will do over $4 \, \spadesuit$.

Parker: "4♥—Since partner is a passed hand I am willing to take the plunge for game, he should not move knowing that I know he is a passed hand."

Shimshak: "4♥—I bid 4♥ as the spade void makes this hand worth more than its 14 HCP and the honors in the other suits are likely to be well situated."

Adams: "4♥—Who knows who can make what. I'd like to be a bit beefier for a 3♠-splinter. This is essentially a preempt with some hope of making it."

Two of the five make a conservative $3 \ \nabla$ -jump. What are you going to do if LHO bids $3 \ A$?

Theurer: "3 ♥—Perhaps I'd shoot out 4 ♥ or splinter with 3 ♠ at IMPs, but at matchpoints I think inviting is enough. Partner is still there and if my LHO bids 3 ♠, he'll know I'm short in spades and can evaluate his hand appropriately. Guessing Stevie makes a "game try" with this hand (bid game and try to make it), however partner may take me for more stuff and bid on when it's wrong, or he makes the wrong decision if my LHO bids 4 ♠."

Hopkins: "3♥—The value call."

One expert cue bids. A cue bid in this situation denies holding support for partner and is usually used when you have strong minor oriented hand. Either a diamond one-suiter or a very strong diamond-club hand.

Lahut: "2 — I want to force to game and give partner the maximum amount of time to look deep into his soul and find a club cue bid. With partner being a passed hand, I don't plan to bypass 4 ♥ unless I hear partner bid clubs."

Showing shortness will help partner do the right thing if the opponents keep bidding.

Partner opened $1 \blacklozenge$ and we have five-card support and a fair hand. We also have a singleton spade which means that the opponents have at least an eight-card spade fit. We could bid $2 \blacktriangledown$ which shows a limit raise in diamonds or better. However, this will allow LHO to bid $2 \spadesuit$. We could also bid $3 \spadesuit$ which is a preemptive raise. This makes it a little harder for LHO to bid spades. Or we could bid $4 \spadesuit$ which means that LHO has to bid $4 \spadesuit$ if he wants to show spades. The problem with $4 \spadesuit$ is that partner could have a 2NT-rebid with the AKQJ of spades and we could easily make 3NT.

Four experts cue bid which shows a limit raise or better with diamond support. If partner re-cue bids, are you going to bid 3NT or bid $4 \spadesuit$ to show a weak limit raise?

Parker: "2♥—Limit raise or better in diamonds. Since partner is sure to be short in hearts, he must have at least four diamonds. Let's see what he does next."

Poe: "2♥—I have limit raise values in diamonds. Partner is not likely to be bidding no-

trump, but if he invites with 2NT I can bid 3 ♦."

Schwartz: "2 ♥—Admittedly light in HCP but raising diamonds which is the only other possible bid, allows the opponents to make a responsive double. If partner is distributional, my hand isn't that bad, otherwise, I just sign off in diamonds."

Hopkins: "2 ♥ —I probably have a limit raise for diamonds. I am going to discourage notrump if partner seems to be heading in that direction."

One expert is more concerned about the opponents finding a spade fit, than us getting to 3NT.

Korbel: "4 ♦ — They have a spade fit and I don't really want them to find it; partner often has a stiff heart here and we might have a great save or make in 5 ♦ anyway."

Six experts join me and preempt in diamonds.

Theurer: "3 ♦ —How many diamonds to bid? 2 ♦ is reasonable on strength, but it doesn't do as much to block the opponents' spade fit as 3 ♦ does. Since the heart queen is of very questionable value on offense, I'm going to make a bit of a heavy preempt here and make life more difficult for the opponents. Also 3 ♦ gets across the fifth diamond, which 2 ♦ does not."

Lahut: "3 ♦ —I want to try to break up the opponents' spade fit, but jamming 5 ♦ might be too painful and there's no guarantee the opponents can make game. These heart spots aren't juicy enough to try for a penalty pass."

Shi: "3 ♦—They haven't found their spade fit yet".

Shimshak: "3 ◆ —I bid 3 ♦ as this hand is preemptive and partner likely has no more than a heart or two."

Woolsey: "3 ♦—Seems on target for playing value, and shuts out the enemy spade fit."

Adams: "3 ♦ —They have an eight-card spade fit and have not found it yet. Close to a 2 ♥-limit raise, but that leaves 2 ♠ and I don't want to do that."

More and more experts are playing jumps to show mixed raises which is 7-9 with 4-card support rather than preemptive raises.

This is a nightmare hand. Partner made a takeout double and your only four-card suit is hearts. You have a choice of three three-card suits and 1NT. 1NT has the advantage that they can't double you if they have a trump stack. The disadvantage is that is shows a constructive hand.

The worst continuation that could happen is for partner to cue bid. Suppose you bid $1 \triangleq$ and partner punishes you with a $2 \checkmark$ -bid. Now what? You either have to rebid your three-card spade suit or bid a three-card minor at the three-level. However, if you respond $2 \triangleq$ and partner cue bids, you can bid $2 \triangleq$ which shows exactly three spades and you're still at the two-level. What you don't want to do is to encourage partner. If you bid $1 \triangleq$ and partner has four spades and a good hand, he'll say we've found a strain, the question is how high?

Six experts make the cheapest call.

Parker: "1 ♠—I can't bid anything less, I expect to get too high."

Korbel: "1 ♠. I know Stevie bid 2 ♣ in real life with this hand, and that actually has a lot of appeal to me."

Shi: "1♠—I know Stevie likes 2♣ but. can't imagine being brave enough to do it. Maybe partner will rebid 1NT."

If you're brave enough to bid a three-card spade suit, why aren't you brave enough to bid a three-card minor?

Poe: "1 ♠ — Only alternative is to pretend that I have a four card-minor, and I think that is equally dangerous as bidding 1 ♠, and more deceptive. Partner knows that I do not always have four spades with this bid when I am forced to bid."

I think that when you bid $1 \clubsuit$, partner assumes that you have four.

Lahut: "1 — Hoping to not get hung too badly. "Sorry partner, the crawl-under-the-table card was missing from my box." I've read that some players like to bid two-of-a-minor in this situation to try to be the noise that partner isn't excited to hear, but I don't think that gains enough to voluntarily eat bidding space."

The noise that partner isn't excited to hear

is the reason why I bid $2 \clubsuit$.

Shimshak: "1 —I must bid so will try 1 •, the cheapest bid I can make."

The following experts join me and make the bid least likely to encourage partner. If partner's next bid is $2 \heartsuit$ we can bid $2 \spadesuit$ which shows exactly three spades and denies a heart stopper. It also denies rebiddable clubs. The object is to get out as low as possible.

Theurer: "2♣—My hand is so bad that I don't want to bid 1♠ which would potentially encourage partner more; even though it doesn't guarantee four or more spades, partner will assume that I do have a real spade suit. The biggest disadvantage of 2♣ vs. 1♠ is that the latter might allow partner to rebid 1NT with his balanced 19-21 HCP hand. But if he has that hand with four spades he won't rebid 1NT, he'll probably bid 3♠ and we'll be too high. Over 2♣ he can rebid 2NT with that hand type and I can pass and hopefully partner will make it."

Schwartz: "2♣— The bid least likely to excite partner."

Hopkins: "2.—I am trying for the call least likely to encourage partner. If they were non vulnerable, I would probably pass the double."

Woolsey: "2♣—The goal isn't to get to the right contract. It is to avoid going for a number. Partner figures to have a big hand, and he will get less excited over a 2♣ response than over a 1♠ or 1NT response."

Adams: "2 — Haven't we done this one a bunch? 1 • promises four. clubs only promises three (ever read the alert chart?)"

Don't encourage partner.

Partner has made a takeout double of 3 ♠ and we have a very good hand. However, we have no clear continuation. We don't have a whole spade stopper to bid 3NT, four hearts to bid $4 \, \Psi$, five clubs to bid $5 \clubsuit$ or four diamonds to support diamonds. We do have enough strength so it could easily be right to pass the double. To bid we need partner to have a very good hand. Suppose partner has $AK \bigvee AJxx \bigwedge AQJx \bigwedge Jxxx$, a 1=4=4=4 16-count. *In* 5 **%** *we lose one spade and one club for sure and* we need the diamond finesse to work. That's assuming no ruff. Partner could have an extreme hand such as ♠- ♥AJxx ♦AKQxxx ♣Axx where 7 ♦ is a very good contract but that would mean that the opponents have ten spades between them. What I do have going for me is that the opponents are favorable and therefore tend to over preempt. Since they're not in $4 \clubsuit$, I'd expect partner to have at least one spade and maybe two. This makes passing the percentage action.

Seven experts force partner to make a choice. It makes no difference if you bid 4 \clubsuit or 4NT. If you had four hearts and enough strength to bid 4 \spadesuit , you would have made a negative double. Partner should never bid 5 \heartsuit .

Parker: "4NT—I would never have passed last time, I would have made a negative double and played a 4-3 heart fit. Now I am willing to play five-of-a-minor. 4NT asks for a minor, where 4♠ would ask for four hearts from partner if he had four."

Korbel: "4NT—Just guessing. Even though they are white they could still be making it on an extreme day even into our slam, if partner has something like ♠-♥AJxx♠AKQxxx♣xxx. I'd rather take the partnership action of not passing."

Schwartz: "4NT—At matchpoints, I could pass but that won't work well opposite a stiff small spade. At least this will get me to the right strain."

At matchpoints +500 against 4♠ loses to +600 playing in five-of-a-minor. At IMPs it loses very little. It gains when your only plus score is defending.

Shi: "4NT. Pick a minor partner."

Woolsey: "4NT—Assuming partner has a stiff spade, which is likely, we probably belong in five or six-of-a-minor. This call is clearly choice of minors. No other interpretation makes any sense considering my pass over 3 \(\blacktriant{\pi} \)."

Theurer: "4. —Ouch... a nightmare hand - not only do I have significant values that I haven't

yet shown, but I have no clear action. If I make a simple suit response here partner will not take me for this much strength. He should have at least some extras for forcing us to at least the four-level, so it's likely we have a game. And with it being vulnerable at IMPs we'd better not miss that game. So I will cuebid here which should show a good hand that couldn't bid earlier, probably with no spade stop, not four hearts and not great diamond support. 3NT might work but partner, with a small stiff spade, will pass most of the time and be assuming I have better than Jxx of spades."

Hopkins: "4♠—I hope partner bids clubs or diamonds at the appropriate level or 4NT letting me show clubs, but probably suggesting alternatives such as a 5-3 diamond fit."

One expert jumps to $5 \spadesuit$. Partner could be 1=4=4=4 and we'd be playing in a 4-3 fit.

Poe: "5♦—3NT is a possibility but there is an excellent chance that partner has a singleton spade. 4♣ and 4♥ are out of the question. Pass seems silly when we are vulnerable, and we may have a slam. 5♦ clues partner in on the fact that I have some values in case he has a real big hand. We want to be in game and 5♦ seems more likely to be it than 3NT, and it might encourage partner to bid six with a big hand."

One expert tries to play the 3-4 heart fit. The opponents, not knowing that you only have three hearts, might not continue spades which shortens the long hand. Of course it could be a 3-3 heart fit.

Lahut: "4♥—I sense the underlying question is "are you man enough to bid 3NT", to which I cheerfully say that I am not. Giving partner a singleton spade, pass and 3NT both look extremely dangerous. Even if 4♥ brings back - 100 to the teammates, at least I didn't pick the decision to immediately lose the match."

One expert tries 3NT. While Γ d bet on partner having a spade honor, there's no guarantee. If partner has a spade honor, passing 3 \spadesuit doubled will be a bonanza.

Shimshak: "3NT—I hope partner has at least the queen of spades so will try 3NT with my jack third in the suit."

One expert joins me and takes a plus score. On good days partner has $AQ \bigvee AJxx \bigwedge AQxxx$ Axx. The king of diamonds is off sides so you

can make 5 ♦ and you get 500 since declarer can't bet to dummy to lead towards his king.

Adams: "Pass—We probably will beat this. Sorry if we are cold for a club slam. 4 his my alternative, forcing to our better minor. Preempts work."

If you're not sure about the correct strain, play for penalties.

Partner has shown a good hand with at least five spades. He had three choices on how to show a strong hand with spades over $1 \, \checkmark$. With $AQJxxxx \, \checkmark x \, AK \, Axx$, he could have overcalled $4 \, \land$. A four-loser hand needing only one trick from partner. He could double $1 \, \checkmark$ and then jump to $4 \, \land$. However, if the opponents bid up to $4 \, \checkmark$, $4 \, \land$ is not a jump. In this auction bidding $3 \, \land$ allows for other strains. With real good spades, he could have jumped to $4 \, \land$ over $3 \, \checkmark$. He could have something like $AJxxx \, \checkmark x \, \land AKx \, \blacktriangleleft AQxx$ where $6 \, \diamond$ is a favorite. Partner only promises five spades and is looking for the eight-card spade fit.

Four experts raise spades. They could easily be playing in a 5-1 fit.

Parker: "4♠—He has shown a strong hand which is too good for an overcall. I don't have any spade losers."

He has shown a good hand but hasn't shown long spades.

Poe: "4♠—Partner has good spades and my singleton king should be enough opposite most spade holdings. I don't want to play 3NT opposite partner's singleton or void in hearts and 4♠ scores better than 5♠. I am expecting zero or one

spade losers. If partner has a big hand I have about equivalent to what he would expect, a little less in spades but good useful high cards."

Hopkins: "4 —I hope partner has a sense of humor. He should have too much to overcall hopefully with good spades."

Shimshak: "4♠—Partner is likely void in hearts and has a good spade suit so will bid 4♠."

Four experts join me and investigate. While we might belong in spades, we could easily belong in diamonds.

Korbel: "4♥—I can't pass and have enough for game, but I hate the idea of raising directly to 4♠. Partner could have something like ♠ AQJxx ♥x♠ AKx♣ Axxx and 6♠ could just be laydown. I'm not sure if 4♠ is forcing or not, and it would make me feel sick to watch it go pass-pass-pass. I guess I'll try 4♥, if we have a slam partner will hopefully remember to check back with 5NT pick a slam if his spades aren't robust."

Theurer: "4♥—What's going on here? The opponents are competing to the three-level vulnerable so they aren't bidding on junk or psyching. Is partner showing a hand with long spades, too good to overcall 1♠ initially? Or is he 'punting' with his 3♠, trying to get me to bid 3NT with a heart stopper? Since I have a very useful hand opposite either a long spade suit or a hand with good diamond support, I'll cuebid and let partner clarify what he's doing. I want to be in slam opposite either ♠ AQJ10xxx ♥-♠ Kx ♣ Axxx or ♠ AQJxx ♥-♠ Kxxx ♣ Axxx, not too much to ask for."

Schwartz "4♥—Choice of games. I am heavy for my previous bid so this is the least I can do."

Shi: "4♥—I think that 4♥ should be a choice of games rather than a good spade raise, but I don't know if I want to spring this one out undiscussed. Ok I will do it. Second choice is just a guess, I think partner may give up on spades with good diamonds and only five spades so I'd bid 4♠."

One expert bids another suit. I don't see how 4.4 can be passed so he'll find out if partner has good spades or diamond support. Makes sense to me. It's like new minor.

Lahut: "4.—I am very close to trying 3NT here; if one of my heart spots was the ten, I'd bid 3NT. But against a known 5-3 or 6-3 fit, too many layouts look like I lose the first five tricks."

Two experts rebid their diamonds. One expert jumps to $5 \spadesuit$. He shows long diamonds and a reasonable hand. If partner $\spadesuit AJxxx \heartsuit - \spadesuit AKxx \clubsuit AQxx$ he might cue bid on the way to $6 \spadesuit$ and you might get to seven.

Woolsey: "5 ← —Partner must have at least three-card diamond support, or he would have overcalled 1 ♠ or Michaels if 5-5 in the blacks instead of doubling. 5 ♦ looks like what we can make, and if we have a slam it will be up to partner to bid it."

One expert bids $4 \spadesuit$. Wouldn't you bid $4 \spadesuit$ if you didn't have the black kings? If partner bids five are you going to bid six?

Adams: "4 ♦ —3 ♠ was game-forcing. 3NT seems wrong. 4 ♦ is all that is left."

When there are two ways to show a good hand, the indirect way is more flexible.



University of Maryland's Collegiate **BRIDGE BOWL ADVENTURES**

The University of Maryland competed for the first time in the Collegiate Bridge Bowl this year. The tournament was held on the weekend of October 22nd and October 23rd and would send four colleges to an all-expense paid trip to the Toronto NABC to compete for \$20,000 worth in scholarships. There is another qualification event in February that will send four more teams. We hope to compete and qualify then since we were unable to qualify in this tournament.

I founded the University of Maryland duplicate bridge club last fall, and it was too soon to compete. I was still finding those interested in learning bridge and building up the base of the club. We started by having between 1-1.5 tables last fall to averaging between 4-5 tables this fall. The growth is very encouraging for the future of bridge at Maryland. This fall I decided to assemble a team to compete in the collegiates. Most of the team had not competed in a bridge tournament before, so the realistic expectation was not necessarily to win but make a splash at our first tournament and get UMD on the collegiate bridge map. The team was comprised of five members. It made me happy that we had a variety of age, field of study, and gender on our team. Here is a little bit about each of the members:

Hakan Berk – sophomore engineering student **Chen Zhao** – computer science grad student **Teddy Corrales** – sophomore math student **Sedef Berk** – sophomore government and sociology student

Ellen Visscher – junior engineering exchange student from Australia

The format of the competition on Saturday was the following: 16 teams would be split into four groups of four. We would pay three 12 board matches inside our group of four, and the 8 teams with the most VPs move onto Sunday. The first match of Saturday was against Columbia, which we unfortunately lost by a lot. It wasn't the greatest of starts but I told everyone to keep their head up against Berkeley, one of the top teams against the nation. We were able to come back strong and we beat a top-ranked Berkelev team by 1 IMP. That was the only match they lost all weekend and they never won by less than 10! Our final match was against Rice whom we swept. 32 VPs on a 30 VP average was just enough to sneak into 7th. For those interested in the leaderboard:



READING THE RECAP SHEET

In a previous series, we discussed how to matchpoint boards. The purpose of this article is to help you read the score recap sheet.

This sheet, which is posted after the game, as well as online shows the final standings as well as your score on each board. Below is a sample recap sheet with names changed. Let's look at each section in greater detail.

Section 1: Header

The very top section of the sheet gives information about the tournament. It includes the name of the tournament, date and time of the session and section. At a larger tournament, make sure that you are looking at the scores for the current session, and your section. The next line shows you what the average score is for the session. In this case it is 31.5. That would mean that the best possible total score is double that amount or 63 matchpoints. Your score is going to be expressed further down the sheet as a percentage of 63.

Section 2: Standings

The next section gives the standings. Looking from left to right, the columns are as follows – pair number, percentage (expressed as a percentage of 63), raw score. In this instance you can derive the percentage by dividing your raw score by 63. For example, Mickey and Donald's percentage is 71.30 which is 44.92/63. In this particular event, there are multiple flights. Each pair is placed into a flight based on their masterpoint holdings. In this case, there are two flights - A & B. Pairs 6, 8, and 9 are in flight B. All of the others are in flight A. The next four columns indicate the standings. The first two of those is for your section. The next two columns are for the overall, considering all sections. In this instance, pair 1, Mickey and Donald are in first place followed by pair 4, George and Louise. Note that there are two columns for the standings. For the pairs who are in flight B, they can place in that flight or overall. For this session, Dick and Bruce came in first place out the B flight pairs. The final column indicates the master point winnings for the game. Mickey and Donald won .81 masterpoints as the overall winners for flight A. George and Louise were in second place in flight A for .61 Masterpoints. Finally, Dick and Bruce won .12 masterpoints for coming in first in flight B.

Section 3: Matchpoints

The final section of the recap sheet shows the scores for each individual board. I have only included the first five boards here. To read your scores, find your pair number across the top and read that column. We will read the scores for pair 3 (bolded). The list of boards is down the left hand side. For each board, there are two lines of information. The first line indicates your matchpointed score on the board. A dash (-) refers to a half point. On board one, pair three got 1- (one and a half) points. In a previous article, in the November/December 2015 WBL Bulletin, I showed how this is calculated. The second number is the result vou achieved on the board. In this case, pair three scored -140. Likely, the result was their opponents bidding to a partscore in spades, and making nine tricks. Similarly, for board two, pair 3 was +650 for 5 matchpoints. Your total score is the sum of your matchpoints on each board.

Understanding the recap sheet can only enhance your ability to enjoy the game. You can figure out which boards you did well or poorly on, and analyze those. This insight will help to improve your game.
