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

You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90

points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

I held this hand and I thought that there were two problems. One was to get to the correct level. The other was to try to make it as hard as possible for the non-vulnerable opponents to find a good save since I had only two cards in the minors. The two popular bids both have major flaws. 4.4, a splinter showing heart support and club shortness, allows West to double with clubs. There are three other flaws with 4.4. One is that I had a void instead of a singleton. Two is that I had no diamond control. Three is that if partner

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bid 4 ♦. the Last Train. I wouldn't know what he had in diamonds. If I bid 2♠ showing a limit raise or better in hearts, West could slip in a three-of-a-minor bid. What bid could tell partner that I had heart support, slam interest and second round spade control, while making it as difficult as possible for the opponents to find a good save? $3 \spadesuit ! 3 \spadesuit$ is a splinter which shows second round spade control, heart support and slam interest. I did have heart support, slam interest and second round spade control. My second round spade control happened to be the king. I'd expect partner who also has spade shortness to wonder why the non-vulnerable opponents weren't competing in spades. 3 h was the perfect bid. 3♠ would not stop LHO from bidding a minor at the four-level but would stop him from bidding one at the three-level. 3 turned out to be the perfect bid. LHO had the other three spades and doubled. Partner bid 4♦. RHO bid 4♠ and when I bid 5♥. RHO doubled and led the A and we made six. He did not know that his club honors were not defensive tricks.

Five experts bid $2 \clubsuit$. It would be nice if the non-vulnerable opponents always remain silent during your constructive auctions but they are allowed to bid. 2 degives them plenty of room.

Parker: "2 ♠—Shows a strong heart raise,

which I do have. I want partner to start cue bidding if he has first round controls. It would be silly to jump to 4♥ with such a good hand."

Cappelletti: "2♠—I might bid exclusion later. Not quite enough to bid 5. now. 4. is second choice."

LaSota: "2♠—I do not splinter with 4♣ on the hand because the benefits to a splinter do not offset the flaws with the bid. I do not like splinters above three-of-our major without first or secondround control in the two side suits. In this case, I have two little diamonds. Also, a splinter of 4. would not show a void rather than a singleton. The AK may well be useless for hearts if partner does not have the A since the odds that a diamond pitch from partner's hand will be helpful, are close to zero. Partner would need to hold something like ♦ Ax, ♠ Ax for the ♠ K to be a huge card. If we had 2NT available to show four or more hearts with at least limit raise values that would be the call instead of $2 \spadesuit$."

Stauss: "2♠—Not clear yet how many hearts can be bid. Hope partner bids diamonds, after which I'll cue bid clubs. In meantime I want to establish the game force."

2♠ shows a limit raise or better so partner will bid 3♥ with a dead minimum.

Landen: "2 ♠—I don't imagine letting the

opponents declare this hand, so I'll play it straight and show heart support and at least game aspirations. I'm not a big fan of splintering with a void, so won't do that. My spade holding is dangerous, but must let partner have a chance to show slam interest."

Five experts bid 4. There are some hands which are impossible to describe if you don't splinter but 44 has four strikes against it. Strike number one: you have a void instead of a singleton. Two: you don't have a diamond control. Three: bidding 4♣ allows West to double to show clubs. Four: if partner has the A, he'll think it's valuable. It will also tell East that his club honors will not take tricks on defense.

King: "4♣—A splinter seems the best way to describe this hand. Some people require it also show first or second round control in the other suits, but I don't think that is Washington Standard."

Woolsey: "4♣—Why shouldn't I show the club shortness and heart fit? What I will do in the future isn't clear, but this has to be a good way to start."

Hopkins: "4♣—I will splinter and if partner makes a forward going move, continue with a cue-bid of 54 to confirm a void. 54

as exclusion is possible, but you might end up in poor slams when partner has something like ♠x♥Axxxx♦AJx♣Kxxx and you have to go after hearing a two-Key-card response."

Schwartz: "4♣—Playing strength makes up for lack of HCP and leaves an easy cue for partner."

Adams: "4 - Seems normal. Shows short clubs and a game forcing hand. Slamish if we fit well."

There are a lot of situations where you can set trumps and make a slam try by 'splintering' in RHO's suit when holding the King.

You have a strong enough hand that you don't want to sell out to 1♥. The void in diamonds makes this hand awkward to bid. If you double, partner will bid diamonds and then what? So the choice is bidding the strong four-card spade suit or bidding the weak fivecard club suit. If you had to make only one bid, 1♠ would everyone's choice because you certainly want a spade lead. However, this easily could be a two bid hand. Since this is very likely to be a two-bid hand, it makes a lot of sense to bid the suits in length order.

Some bids have different meanings depending on what seat you're in. A jump to 2NT in direct seat show the two lower unbid suits at least fivefive. In pass-out seat a jump to 2NT is natural showing 18-20 balanced. In direct seat a jump to 3♣ is usually weak. In pass-out seat, a jump to 3. shows an opening bid with a good six-card club suit. In pass-out seat, partner should play you for a king less. In pass-out seat, you can make a takeout double with only nine HCP or could bid a suit at the two-level with only nine HCP.

Six experts get their lead director in. However, 1 \(\infty \) shows five and you could easily get to a







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4-3 or even a 4-2 spade fit. The larger problem is that someone might bid a red suit and then bidding clubs would distort your suit lengths. If the auction continues $2 \diamondsuit$ by opener - Pass $-3 \diamondsuit$ by responder, you may never get to show your fivecard club suit. If partner has $\bigstar xx \blacktriangledown Ax \diamondsuit xxx$ $\bigstar AJxxx$, you could miss a cold club slam.

Parker: "1 — If my clubs and diamonds were reversed I could double and do an equal level conversion. Spades are where I live and if partner has some we should do well since he will be short in hearts."

King: "1 ♠—This is the suit I want led. I may let them find a diamond fit, but passing seems a very pessimistic action."

Woolsey: "Î ♠—I don't think our chances of getting a plus score defending 1 ♥ are good enough, so let's get the bidding up to a higher level where maybe we can get a plus score."

Hopkins: "Î • —Get partner off to the right lead if they buy the contract presumably in diamonds. And we can always end up competing in spades."

Schwartz: "1 —No other bid seems close. If they happen to buy the contract, will get the lead I want."

Landen: "1 ♠ —Nothing is perfect, but I must keep the bidding alive. The money is in notrump or spades, so here I go. Looks like a five-card suit."

Four experts join me and bid 2. This will allow you to bid spades if someone bids a red suit and partner will not play you for five spades. By bidding 2. you'll avoid playing in a 4-2 spade fit and find a possible club fit.

Cappelletti: "2♣—If I bid 1♠ now, we might miss a club game or slam."

LaSota: "2♣—Reverse the distribution in the minors and we would have an equal level conversion double. However, this is not available with four spades and five clubs. Four possible calls are: Pass, $1 \spadesuit$, $2 \clubsuit$ and $2 \blacktriangledown$. Pass may be the winning call if partner has three or four hearts, no club fit, and no spade fit. However, this hand is just too strong to pass. If ever there is a chunky four card suit, AKQ10 qualifies. A 1 - overcall could get us to a nice spade fit for a partial or game. However, there are many hands that partner can hold with fewer than three spades where the result may be poor for us if we overcall 1 . Also, opener may make a rebid on your left that places your side in an uncomfortable position if it goes 1♥ - Pass -Pass - 1 ♠ - 2♥ for example. A Michaels bid of 2♥ may work, but if the auction stays open, 2♣ appears to be the best call. If opener rebids twoof-a-red-suit and it goes - Pass - Pass back to us, we can bid $2 \spadesuit$."

If your void was in clubs, it could be scary doubling 1♥ since partner might get carried away in the club suit.

Stauss: "2♣—Don't want to double with void. 1♠ might be right but I have more clubs."

Adams: "2. —They probably have a diamond fit, but diamonds splitting badly, so not terrible if they find it. Bidding clubs before spades helps if this is not the last bid."

If you plan on taking two bids, bid the suits in length order.

Pass or make a game try. Give partner ♠xx ♥QJ10xx♦xx♣Axxx and with a little luck and a non-trump lead you might even make six hearts. Opposite ♠Jx♥xxxx♦KQx♣QJxx, 3NT could easily make. This hand could even make game opposite a weak three-card spade raise if partner has no wasted club honors. Opposite ♠Jxx♥J109♦Kx♣xxxxx, 4♠ is a reasonable contract. If you're going to bid, you should pattern out. By bidding 3 \,vou tell partner that you very likely have five spades, four diamonds, three hearts and one club. The bad news is that you tell the opponents the same thing. The only other reasonable continuation is to treat your spades as six and bid 3 . However, that could cause you to miss a 5-3 heart fit.

Seven experts agree with me and bid 3♥. If partner has four good hearts, 4♥ could be a good contract. Opposite ♠Jx♥AQJx♠xxx ♣xxxx, 4♥ has ten top tricks and will make eleven with a club lead.

Parker: "3♥—Bid out my shape, shows only three hearts and a good hand. If partner has five hearts we should make a game."

Woolsey: "3 ♥—If my rounded suits were reversed I would pass, but the extra possibility of catching partner with five hearts makes

this a worthwhile venture."

Cappelletti: "3 ♥—Game try."

Hopkins "3 ♥—Very close. I don't like to risk a likely plus score, but there is a strong possibility partner has five Hearts or even four good ones in which case I would expect to make game. Vulnerable I think this would be automatic, but non-vulnerable I expect a roughly 50-50 split in the vote."

Holding one club I'd expect partner to have five clubs not five hearts.

Schwartz: "3 ♥—Shows this shape, willing to play the 5-2 spade fit if necessary. Partner could easily have nine HCP so can't pass and spades likely safer than notrump if partner is not accepting."

Adams: "3 ♥—Good primes, will risk being too high opposite a bunch of club garbage and out."

Landen: "3 ♥—A tad too much to pass, so pattern out. The rest is up to partner. I have a lot of sympathy for anyone who passes 2 ♠. It might be the percentage action not vulnerable."

Three experts pass. They take the very likely plus score.

LaSota: "Pass—I pass and take the likely plus score. Partner usually has a doubleton spade, five to not a great ten HCP. Partner may also hold a very weak hand with three spades that was not worth a constructive raise directly to 2♠. We may have a game available in hearts, notrump, or spades on the hand, but there are many more possible hands where we do not want to play above 2♠."

King: "Pass—I don't think this hand is quite strong enough to take another bid, especially non-vulnerable."

Stauss: "Pass—Game seems unlikely and another bid risks a minus score."

Bid out your shape when you have extra values.

You have made a two-over-one on a hand that barely qualifies. While I'm not happy with the 2&-bid, I wouldn't be happy showing a balanced hand with the spade lead through partner's spade holding. By bidding 2&, you could at least get partner to play the hand and protect his spade holding. In theory 3& is forcing and Opener could have a very good hand. Partner could have x v x AKQx AQxwhere 6& is very good contract and he would certainly bid 3& with that hand. He could also have Jx v AKxx Axxxwhere you'd be lucky to make 3&. However, partner is expecting you to keep bidding so it would be wrong to pass.

Five experts agree with me and show where they live. You have clubs and hearts and that's what 3♥ shows.

Parker: "3 ♥ —Must show a stopper and ask partner to bid 3NT with spades stopped. If I had spades stopped I would be 3NT."

Cappelletti: "3♥—Natural bid in game-forcing auction."

LaSota: "3♥—We decided to bid two-overone on a 3=3=3=4 12 count which is questionable. However, the auction has become much more revealing for us when we chose to bid $2 \clubsuit$ and partner has taken a free bid of 3. ittle cooperation, I will continue the cooperation with partner by bidding 3♥. This shows where my values are and allows partner to make the next move. If partner bids 3NT over this, I will gladly pass. If partner bids 3 . I will rebid 4 . which is one of the two-over-one auctions where we can get out in four-of-a-minor. I play that over one-any - twoover-one-in-a-minor - direct raise to three-of-thesame-minor by opener, bids at the three-level probing for 3NT but if neither side ends up bidding 3NT, four-of-the-minor is non-forcing."

This is one auction where two-over-one is not 100% forcing to game. If you try for 3NT and fail, then you could play in four-of-a-minor if neither partner has extra values. If partner bids $4\clubsuit$ over $3\blacktriangledown$, you could and should pass it. If partner bids $3\spadesuit$ and you bid $4\clubsuit$, partner could pass that also. $4\clubsuit$ by either player shows a minimum.

Hopkins: "3♥—I am stuck with my original bid so am trying to get us to 3NT if partner has a spade stopper."

Adams: "3♥—We can get out in 4♣ with no spade stopper. Bid where my values lie. 3♠ shows a spade card."

One expert uses a convention which I despise. Western Cue bid. 3 • is forcing and partner is supposed to do something intelligent. Even if partner has a full stopper, 3NT might not fetch.

Stauss: "3 • — Western cue asking for a full stopper. If partner has it, game looks to be a good bet."

Three experts pass. Why couldn't opener hold ♠-♥xxx♠AKQxx♣AQxxx? +190 would be a great score. Partner would never expect that 3♣ could be passed. Holding that hand, you give partner a chance to show spade values. If partner fails to bid show spade values, you can ask for keycards knowing that he can't hold the ace of spades.

Woolsey: "Pass—Did I really make a twoover-one on this total garbage? Clearly I misssaw my hand, and my best chance for a plus score now is to pass."

King: "Pass—Again we not vulnerable, I have flat shape, one less club than partner expects and an awful holding in spades."

Landen: "Pass—I hate the 24 bid with this trans. If I can't abstain, then I'll pass."

If not 2♣, what do you bid over 1♠?
One expert bids 3♠. 3♠ is forcing but doesn't show where you live which is hearts.

Schwartz: "3 ♦ —Would pass 3 ♣ if it's not forcing in *Washington Standard*. If forcing, need to get to the correct minor if we are not getting to 3NT. 3 ♥ won't do that."

If you pass a forcing bid, you'd better be right.

Where do you want to play this hand? 3NT would be my guess. Who do you want to play 3NT? I would think that 3NT would best be played from partner's side. You certainly don't want the opening spade lead coming through partner's possible Qx. My plan is to bid 2♠ showing a limit raise or better in diamonds. Assuming partner bids three-of-a-minor, which shows a minimum, I plan to bid 3♠, an Eastern cue bid. 3♠ shows a spade stopper so Opener can bid 3NT even if he has nothing in spades. If I did not have a spade stopper, I would bid 3♥ which suggests that partner bid

3NT with a spade stopper. This is called the "Eastern Cue-bid". If partner is very distributional, he'll bypass 3NT which isn't that bad.

Three experts bid 3NT. Partner is going to expect that you have very good spades with at least two stoppers opposite a small singleton. Not only could 3NT be played from the wrong side if partner has ♠Qx ♥ KQx ♠ KJxx ♣ Kxxx, you could miss a good slam if partner has ♠x ♥ Kxx ♠ KJxxxx ♣ AKx.

Parker: "3NT—Shows a balanced hand and around 15 HCP. That's what I have."

I would think that 3NT shows an opening bid with at least two spade stoppers.

Schwartz: "3NT—Would cue bid if my spade King and heart Ace were reversed. As it is, a cue bid risks getting past 3NT if partner is distributional."

If partner is distributional you could have a slam while 3NT goes down.

 \spadesuit - \forall Kxx♦Kxxxx♣KJxxx makes 6♣ but 3NT goes down.

Landen: "3NT—Too bad we don't play 3♠ says I have spades stopped, but prefer you declare. I'm not going to bid clubs or bid 2♠ showing at least four diamonds as partner might jump in a minor."

Seven experts join me and show a limit raise or better with diamond support. AQ10 is good support if partner has an unbalanced hand. If you later do bid 3NT, partner should work out that your spade stoppers are not that strong.

King: "2♠—Let's show our support first. We can get to notrump later if that is where we belong."

Cappelletti: "2♠—Quite likely to bid notrump game next."

LaSota: "2♠—There are many reasons

why I choose 2♠ instead of a direct 3NT.

- 1) Many hands partner holds that are cold for six of a minor that they would pass if we bid 3NT. For example: ♠x♥Kxx♠K9xxx♣AKJx.
- 2) If 3NT is the final contract, there is a good chance we want the overcaller leading into partner's hand.
- 3) Given that we hold three of the top five diamonds, there are many hands partner may hold with five or more diamonds that will not know to move to slam if we do not show a diamond fit.
- 4) Partner may hold distributional minimums where five-of-a-minor makes and 3NT does not
- 5) We can always get to 3NT later if it's right."

Stauss: "2 \(\Limits \) —Let's see what partner does; it's too early to sign off at 3NT which looks like the only other reasonable bid."

Woolsey: "2 —On a good day partner will bid 2NT. If he doesn't, I can bid 3NT next. Should he pull he will be short in spades and long in diamonds, in which case we may well belong in diamonds anyway."

Hopkins: "2 \(\)—I sort of want to play 3NT from partner's side, but am bidding this way to keep our options open."

Adams: "2 — I know Robinson likes to have four-card support for this, but these three are pretty good and we are probably going to play notrump, hopefully from partner's side. Move some honors to clubs and I'd bid my four-card club suit here. I doubt it matters much which minor I bid, the key is to give partner a chance to declare notrump."

When you have two options, both of which are reasonable, pick the lower.





COMMITTEE ACTION #79

This case, from the second qualifying session of the Mitchell Open BAM Teams at the Fall NABC in San Francisco, illustrates what often happens when players fail to get their agreements straight. Here are a couple of questions to test whether you and your partner are on the same wavelength regarding your methods after partner has shown a strong balanced hand. What are your methods when partner opens with a strong notrump? How about when he overcalls with a strong 1NT? How about when he opens with an even stronger 2NT (or rebids 2NT in an auction such as 2 - 2 = 2NT? And finally, how about when he overcalls an opponent's two-level opening with 2NT? That last auction is what threw a monkey wrench into N/S's works on the following deal.

(1) Alerted and explained as one or both fourcard majors.

East led a spade against 3NT and eleven easy tricks were made, +660 for N/S. The Director was summoned at the end of play when E/W were initially concerned about the impact of misinformation on East's opening lead (N/S played puppet Stayman over their 2NT opening bids, e.g., 2NT or 2♣- 2♦: 2NT, but Smolen over their 1NT openings and overcalls). But E/W's concern soon shifted to the unauthorized information (UI) conveyed to North by South's Alert of 3♦. North thought 3♣ was regular Stayman and bid 3♦ accordingly; South thought 34 was puppet Stayman and Alerted and explained 3 ♦ as indicated above. Had 3♦ not been Alerted North would have expected South to be four-five in the majors. With length and strength in both of South's majors it would be normal to bid game in the suit South had shown five of. However, the UI that North possessed demonstrably suggested bidding 3NT rather than 4♠. Accordingly, citing Laws 16B1(a) and 12C1(e), the Director adjusted the result to 4♠ by North down one, -100 for N/S.

Of course N/S appealed the ruling (or we wouldn't be discussing this case here). West did not attend the hearing. North said he thought his 3NT bid was obvious (no ruffing values, diamonds double stopped). South added that the opponents might be able to ruff a diamond in 4♠ and could not run clubs against 3NT. East countered this with the argument that if the defense could ruff a diamond in 4 dummy would be short in clubs and the defense might easily run clubs against 3NT. Okay, it's time for you to decide how you would rule on this case before reading on.

The Committee noted that North possessed UI that demonstrably suggested bidding 3NT rather than game in South's longer major (either 3♠ or 4♥, depending on whether North thought Smolen applied). Therefore, the contract had been appropriately adjusted by the table Director to 4 down one. N/S and their team captain should have recognized that 3♠ and 4♥ were both LAs to 3NT (the bid suggested by the UI) and should not have appealed the Director's rul-

ing. Accordingly, the Appeals Committee upheld the table ruling and assigned N/S an Appeal Without Merit Warning. The Committee also considered assigning a procedural penalty to N/S for North's blatant use of UI but decided the AWMW was sufficient.

I whole-heartedly endorse the Committee's reasoning and final decision, except that I would have assessed the procedural penalty against N/S. There are two important reasons for doing this. First, North was an experienced player (a LM with over 3000 MP) and should have known better than to bid 3NT. Law 73C specifically instructs a player who has UI available from his/her partner to carefully avoid taking any advantage of that information. That means that a player in possession of UI should bend over backwards to avoid any action suggested by that information. Second, I strongly believe that NABC+ events (such as the Open BAM Teams here) require players to adhere to the highest ethical standards. Even players with less experience should be prepared to play by those standards when they enter such events.





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MINOR SUIT BIDDING 4: REVERSES AND JUMP SHIFTS

In previous articles about minor suit openings, we first focused on what strain opener should rebid, the options being to support responder's suit, to rebid the suit opened, to bid some number of NoTrump, or to bid a new suit. We also discussed how high to bid to show various strengths – minimum, invitational or Game Forcing.

There are two specific opener rebids in a NEW SUIT that you need to be familiar with: the Reverse and the Jump Shift. Both of these rebids are forcing and show bigger than average hands. We discuss each below.

Reverses

A Reverse occurs when opener's second bid is not a jump, but is the bid of an unbid suit that is higher in rank than the suit first bid. For example, in the sequence $1 \blacklozenge -P - 1 \spadesuit -P$, opener's rebid of $2 \blacktriangledown$ is a reverse. By definition, a Reverse forces partner to take a preference at the 3-level if partner prefers opener's first bid suit.

The basic characteristics of a Reverse are: Opener's first suit must be longer than his second bid suit; opener should have a good 16 HCP to reverse; and opener usually has a singleton somewhere. Also, a Reverse is forcing for one round. Let's see a typical Reverse hand: x/AQxx/AQJxx/Kxx. Note that the diamonds are longer than the hearts, the hand has 16 HCP, and there is a stiff spade. If the hand were xx/AQxx/AQJx/Kxx, would you open 1 ◆ and rebid 2 ♥? No – you would have opened 1NT. That is why a Reverse generally promises a singleton.

Note that a bid of 2 ♠ in the above auction is NOT a reverse. Spades are not a new suit, because partner has already bid them. Note also that if you open 1 ♣ and partner responds 1 ♥, 1 ♠ is NOT a Reverse since partner can still support clubs (your first bid suit) at the two level.

After opener reverses, responder must bid one more time. Responder can make a non-forcing rebid of her suit, showing five cards in the suit, and at most 8 HCP (for example, 1 ♦ -1 ♠ -

2♥-2♠.) Opener, with a minimum reverse and a tolerance for responder's suit, can pass. So if responder has 9+ HCP, she must force to game.

A popular convention which allows responder to show a bad hand is to play that the cheaper of the fourth suit or 2NT is artificial and asks opener to make the next cheapest bid. After that, responder places the contract. Thus, in our previous example, after 1 • -1 • -2 •, 2NT would be forcing. Opener usually rebids 3 •, and responder can then pass (which would be very unusual) or bid 3 • or 3 •. Opener should not bid again unless his or her hand is too good to pass. After the following Reverse -1 • -1 • -2 •, 2 • is the conventional bid responder uses to show a weak hand and try to end the auction.

Any other bid by responder is forcing to game, which allows responder to set trumps cheaply while still forcing. Thus, 1 ♦ -1 ♣ -2 ♥ -3 ♦ is forcing to game. Responder might have AJT4/K32/Q85/T63. She can't bid NoTrump, as she doesn't have clubs stopped, but she does have support for diamonds and a game forcing hand of 10 HCP opposite about 16 HCP. After the Reverse and responder's second bid, opener bids naturally.

Jump Shifts

A Jump Shift, not surprisingly, consists of a bid that includes a jump in level and a shift to a new suit. It is a bid in a new suit one level higher than is required. All of the following sequences (no opponent bidding) are Jump Shifts:

$$1 \lor -1 \land -3 \lor$$
$$1 \land -1 NT -3 \checkmark$$
$$1 \checkmark -1 \lor -2 \land$$

A Jump Shift generally promises at least 19 HCP (or a great 18 HCP) and a hand strong enough to play in game even if partner has scraped up a response. Opener may be 5-4 or 5-5, and if 5-5, may Jump Shift on slightly less HCP – 17 is sufficient if 5-5, particularly if all of your points are in your suits. Also, opener should have no wasted values – no doubleton queens in the HCP count.

A Jump Shift is 100% forcing to game, so

BRING A FRIEND TO THE 0-20 OR NLM UNIT GAME!

Bring a new player (who has not previously played at the WBL) to the Unit Game to play in the 0-20 or NLM game and you both will play free that evening.

please do not pass partner's Jump Shift. Support one of opener's suits if you can, or rebid your own suit. If you can't support either of opener's suits and your suit is only four cards, then look at your holding in the unbid suit. If you have a stopper in that suit, bid 3NT. Without a stopper, choose one of opener's suits, even with minimal support.

Opener may have the unbid suit stopped and can bid 3NT. Opener may have extra length in his second suit and may rebid that suit. Keep describing, as best you can, until you reach game.

Let's see how these ideas play themselves out. In all of the following, you open $1 \spadesuit$ and partner responds $1 \heartsuit$. You hold:

♦ QT3 ♦ AQJ8 ♦ AKT52 ♣ 8	<i>Bid 2</i> ♥. This is a minimum reverse. If partner bids 2♠, promising 5, you'll be happy to support spades. Otherwise, show your strength and shape. If partner bids $3 \spadesuit$ or $3 \blacktriangledown$, game forcing, you can still show your three card spade support by bidding $3 \spadesuit$ next.
♣ QT3 ♥ QJ84 ♦ AKT52 ♣8	Bid 2 ♠. You would love to bid 2 ♥ to show your shape, but you are not strong enough. Partner might be in a 4-3 spade fit, but you don't have enough diamonds to rebid them, and your small singleton club suggests that NT is wrong. 2 ♠ is the best description of the hand. (Note: discuss with partner ahead of time. Some players never support without 4 cards.)
♦ K3 ♥ 9 ♦ AQJ42 ♣ KQT42	<i>Bid 2</i> ♣. It's a very nice hand, with 15 HCP, good suits and the king of partner's first bid suit, but you can't force to game. If partner has a minimum response with no fit, you want to get out as cheaply as possible. If partner holds ♠QJ852 ♥KJ73 ♦ T73 ♣5, there is no play for game. Over partner's 2 ♦, you will bid 3 ♦, to show some extra values.
♦ AJ ♥ 9 ♦ AKJ93 ♣ AQJT8	Bid 3 ♣. You want to be in game opposite any hand that can scrape up a 1 ♠ response to your 1 ♦ opening bid. You have 20 HCP and two excellent suits. If partner wants to play in 3NT with good hearts, you have two good suits he can set up, and your high card strength will make it a reasonable contract.
