You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer. and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

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Do you double 2 ♦ holding a singleton heart which is an unbid major? If you don't double, the other choices are not very good. Six experts think that double is as good as any call. The two other reasonable choices, 2 A and 3NT are also in the ballpark. If you overcalled  $1 \spadesuit$  over  $1 \spadesuit$ , there is more chance that someone would bid over 1♠ since there are three opponents that could bid. However, the 2 ♦-opener will not reopen which means that only two opponents could bid. Over 1 A partner would do something with seven points but needs more points to do something over 2 . The other choice 3NT makes a lot of sense. You have two diamond stoppers and 20 points. The two negatives are that you have a singleton heart and five spades. If partner has his expected six HCP, some of which are in hearts, 3NT will have play.

Six experts double. If you double, partner will jump to  $4 \checkmark holding \land x \checkmark KQJ10xxx \checkmark xx$  \*xxx and \$\delta Jx \sqrt KQxxx \dot xx \delta xxx. You have to pass the first example and bid  $4 \radsigma$  on the second example. Which example will you play him for? If you overcall 3NT, partner will make the correct decision.

Theurer: "Double—What else? I'm far too strong for 2♠, and I can correct hearts to spades at the same level. Who knows, partner might even bid clubs! Would be a bit tougher if my majors were reversed, but I'd still double because no other call makes sense."

**Parker:** "Double—I can bid spades over hearts. Just too good a hand to overcall in spades and I don't want to bid notrump now."

**Hughes:** "Double—Maybe West will raise, and then I'll bid spades. If not, I'll bid notrump after the expected heart bid from partner."

**Woolsey:** "Double—Spades outrank hearts, so I think I can survive most auc-

tions. I can't think of any other intelligent approach."

**Schwartz:** "Double—Hate doubling with a stiff major, but at least here it's not the master suit. I can follow a 2♥-bid by partner with 2NT to show my approximate strength. When the opponents make these doubles, their partners never jump to game in the stiff."

**King:** "Double—I am a big believer in not doubling without the right shape, but at some point hands are too strong not to start with a double and this 20 point hand is one of them."

Two experts join men and jump to 3NT. 3NT shows more than 18 HCP. Since 3NT could be a hand with long running clubs, partner will need a good reason to bid over it. A jump to 3NT denies support for both majors. With at least 3-3 in the majors, you double first and then bid 3NT. The only drawback is that you could miss your ten-card spade fit. Opposite  $Axxxx \forall xx \forall xx xxxx$ , 3NT would not play well.

**Hopkins:** "3NT—This is likely to be best whenever partner has a Heart stopper or they don't lead Hearts and we can run nine tricks. We will miss 4♠ when it is the best contract except when partner has both Majors particularly four spades and five hearts or four spades and six hearts and chooses to Stayman over 3NT."

Adams: "3NT—Tempting to try 4 has which shows clubs and a major. 3NT is right on values and stopper. Double or some number of spades wrong on all accounts, so will go with the bid that at least is not a lie."

A 4.4-jump shows five or more clubs and a five-card major. It's not good to fib about Michaels type bids.

Don't make a takeout double with a sin-

gleton in an unbid major unless there is no other choice.

What does partner's 4 ♥ mean? If you had a one-suited heart hand, you wouldn't start with 2 . All one-suited heart hands start with  $2 \blacklozenge \text{ or } 4 \blacklozenge, \text{ transfers. Therefore } 4 \blacktriangledown \text{ is not an}$ offer to play. 4 \(\nabla\) has to be a spade slam try. If partner is making a spade slam try with at best the jack of spades, he must have significant strength in the other three suits. How can he have less then  $\triangle Jxxx \forall AKxx \Rightarrow x \angle KQJx? 6 \triangle$ is cold opposite  $\blacktriangle Jxxx \lor Axx \blacklozenge x \clubsuit KQJxx$ which is a minimum 4 ♥-bid. The only two things that I'm sure of, is that partner has spade support and he has diamond shortness. He could be 4=5=1=3, 4=3=1=5 or 4=4=1=4. He could easily be void in diamonds. I like the K-I-S-S system. Keep-It-Simple-Steve! Bid RKC and bid a slam unless we're off two keycards. If partner has two keys, I can show him all the keys and maybe he can bid seven.

Three experts signoff in  $4 \clubsuit$ . Unless partner has enough to make seven, he'll pass  $4 \clubsuit$  since from his perspective  $5 \clubsuit$  could be down in the trump suit.

**Parker:** "4♠—4♥ must be a slam try but my two small diamonds is the worst."

Woolsey: "4♠—Partners 4♥-call must be a slam try in spades. My spade holding is nice, but my diamond holding and the 3-3 in the rounded suits are about as bad as they can be. Something like ♠J10xx♥AKxxx♦x ♣KQx is what might be expected."

**King:** "4♠—I don't think the ♠Q is pulling its full weight and even with a fifth spade. I will just bid 4♠."

It's not the five spades. It's the AKQ.

**Theurer:** "5♠—Interesting auction. Partner clearly has a good hand, so the opponents must have a slew of diamonds and some shape to be bidding vulnerable into the teeth of our strong notrump. Can partner's 4♥ be natural? Not likely! I've denied four hearts and partner can't have just hearts else he'd have transferred. So he must have a spade fit and 4♥ is a cuebid or Last Train with at least mild slam interest. Even with my wasted diamond queen, I have fantastic spades plus an outside ace and since partner probably has some heart length, even my good heart spot cards could help. Can't partner have something like ★Jxxx♥AKx◆x♣KQxxx? So I'll ask partner to bid a slam with a diamond control, and he can bid 6 ♦ with first round control reaching a grand if he has  $A J \times X A K Q \times A G \times$ ♦-♣KQxxxx. My 5♠ implies the black suit honors I have."

Four experts cuebid. Is partner going to bid a slam if his trumps are 7654? Will you bid a slam if he cuebids back? Keycard has the effect of not needing judgment.

**Hopkins:** "5. —Partner is likely to have a 4-5+ or perhaps a 4=4=1=4 pattern type of hand and be making a slam try. My hand is actually very good opposite these and I can show my control and await developments."

**Hughes:** "5♣—Partner is showing slam

interest. He certainly has a singleton diamond and Jxxx of spades. If he has AKQxx in hearts and Kxx in clubs or AKxx and KQJx, I want to be in 6.

**Adams:** "5♣—4♥ is a last-train slam try for spades. I have the nuts in spades. 5♣ should send the message about the diamond problem."

**Schwartz:** "5♣—Partner should have a spade slam try as if he bid 3♥ over 2♠ not in competition. Even with my minimum, my spades are good so I need to cooperate."

When partner makes a slam try and you have the AKQ of trumps, there has to be a good reason not to accept.

What does partner's double followed by  $4 \vee -bid$  mean? There are two possible hand types that partner could have when he doubles and bids  $4 \vee .$  One hand type is a good hand with very good hearts.  $Ax \vee AKQJxxx \wedge Ax \wedge Axx$  for instance. Another hand type is a good hand with five hearts or possibly six bad hearts such as  $Ax \vee AQ10xx \wedge Axx \wedge AQxx$ . If you hold the problem hand, do you pass  $4 \vee and$  play in a 5-1 fit if partner has the second example? The answer is that you have to jump to  $4 \vee and$  with example

one and double and bid 4  $\forall$  with example two. Since the opponents will very likely raise spades, you want to get the type of hand off your chest as soon as possible.

Three experts rebid their seven-card suit. The diamond suit should be much better than partner's heart suit. Also, playing in diamonds, you don't have losing spades to worry about which you might have playing in hearts.  $\triangle Axx \lor AJxxx \lor Jx & Q10x$  would be enough to make  $5 \lor$  and partner should have a lot more. Boost his hand to  $\triangle AJx \lor AKQJx \lor Jx & Qxx$  and  $4 \lor$  could go down with  $5 \lor$  cold.

Theurer: "5 ←—Partner's sequence should show a good hand but not self-sufficient hearts where partner could have bid 4 ♥ directly over 2 ♠. Partner must have some spade length since RHO didn't bounce at favorable vulnerability, so I don't expect too many minor suit cards in his hand.it since this hand may not take too many tricks in a heart contract. It would be nice if I could show long diamonds with secondary clubs but I don't think I can do that. 4♠ here should be Kickback with 4NT being a spade cuebid for hearts."

Schwartz: "5 ♦ —Partner should have only five hearts for this bid and just offering another place to play. With a three-card difference, I don't want to introduce clubs as partner did not make a leaping Michaels bid."

One expert thinks there's slam. However you could be off two aces.

Parker: "6 ♦ —I know he has a good hand but he could have bid 4♥ the first time if he just had a good hand and a solid suit. Let's give him ♠xx♥AKxxxx♠Ax♣AQx or something close. He must have a very good hand outside of hearts or he would just have overcalled to start with. I would have bid 4NT the last time."

Four experts bid  $5 \clubsuit$ . If partner's minor holding is  $\blacklozenge Jx \clubsuit Qxxx$ ,  $5 \spadesuit$  would be a better contract.

Since partner could have jumped to  $4 \, \$$  if he had five clubs and five hearts, I would not expect partner to have five clubs.

**Hughes:** "5♣—It doesn't sound like partner felt he was too strong for 4♥ over 2♠, because he wouldn't make a non-forcing bid over 4♠. So I'll try 5♣ and hope he doesn't pass with fewer than four."

Woolsey: "5 - Partner has at least two places to play when he starts with a takeout double, and one of those places might be clubs."

**Hopkins:** "5♣—I would not do this with a 5-4 or 4-4 pattern since I would cue bid instead of bidding 4♦ so partner should play me for longer Diamonds and at least a 6-4 pattern. We respond 4♠ originally with 5-5, 5-6, and 6-6 patterns."

**King:** "5.—North shouldn't have a onesuited hand and double. He should have a second place to play so I will show a strong preference for clubs."

One expert makes an I-hope-partnerknows-what-this-bid-means bid. I bet lots would take 4NT as RKC for hearts.

Adams: "4NT—This will be taken as pick a minor, but I will correct Clubs to Diamonds and hopefully partner will know I meant it as last train for a diamond slam. Partner should have tolerance for diamonds for the double, and if partner is seriously strong then 6♦ might make opposite stiff Ace. I would take 4♠ as keycard for hearts, and then I doubt I can get back to diamonds."

If you have a one-suited hand, don't make a takeout double.

Four experts join me and temporize. If partner bids over  $2 \, \clubsuit \,$  we'll be in great shape.

Theurer: "2♣—The hand is marginally good enough for a more aggressive action such as 3♥ with the aces and spot cards, but the heart suit is poor. Being non-vulnerable I will take a lower road here. The main question is whether to rebid 2♥ or bid an Al Roth "if I can just get by this round" 2♣, planning on bidding 2♥ over 2♦ or 3♥ over 2♥. Other possibilities are, 2NT or 3♣. If partner passes 2♣ he will either have a stiff heart or two hearts with at least four clubs and a bad hand. With a decent

hand he will bid  $2 \, \Psi$  false preference to keep the bidding alive. I like my hand enough to follow the latter plan."

**Hughes:** "2♣—The most flexible bid. If it doesn't get passed out I'll rebid hearts."

**Adams:** "2 - 2 or 2 Close. At matchpoints would bid 2 At IMPs, 2 has a better chance at getting us to game if partner is invitational, or to clubs if partner is short in hearts."

**Schwartz:** "2♣—Don't like jumping to 3♥ with a Queen high suit. I can always bid them later if partner has enough to keep the auction open."

Four experts rebid their hearts.

**Woolsey:** "3 ♥—I must show the good six-bagger, and 2 ♥ is too much of an underbid."

Three experts go low.

**Hopkins:** "2♥—I might worry more if I were vulnerable. At least partner will know Heart honors are valuable when deciding whether or not to proceed. If my Spades and Diamond were reversed, I might try 2♣ with the vig of allowing a 2♠ bid by partner which I would raise.d pass 2♠ so why bother?"

**Parker:** "2♥—Good hand for playing a system where 2♣ is forcing."

Good hand for playing a system where  $2 \clubsuit$  is non-forcing.

**King:** "2 ♥—A slight underbid, but I would like better hearts to jump to 3 ♥."

If you bid 2. and then raise hearts, you have a weak heart suit but a good hand.

What's going on here? If partner has at least ten HCP, he'd double  $2 \spadesuit$ . So partner has fewer than ten HCP. The only reason partner would bid  $2 \spadesuit$  here is that he has spades. This makes sense since I have one spade and East preferred hearts. Partner must have a weak hand with six or seven spades. I don't think we're in the cuebid what you have situation which we would have been in had North shown strength. Suppose instead of passing, North bid  $2 \spadesuit$  showing a limit raise or better in diamonds. If South now bids a major, he shows values in that suit.

**Theurer:** "Pass—I've indicated extra values and probably some club length, but partner chose to bid spades so he clearly has a long spade suit and few minor suit cards (6-2-2-3, 7-2-2-2, 7-2-1-3, 7-1-2-3, etc.) so I will respect his decision - at least my singleton support is the best I can have! If partner had a good hand with a club fit he would cuebid hearts, not spades."

He would have doubled  $2 \spadesuit$  if he had a good hand.

**Hughes:** "Pass—Partner was too weak to double 2♦ showing a desire to punish the opponents. He has no more than two diamonds and three clubs. Seems like a good time to get out."

Woolsey: "Pass—Assuming my agreements are that I can have this shape for the takeout double, partner will be ready for this. He is saying that he wants to play 2♠ regardless, so he gets his wish."

Regardless is too strong a term here. Better would be — strongly desires to play in  $2 \spadesuit$ .

**King:** "Pass—I am not sure what my double was supposed to be. Penalty? Take out? Just extra values? I don't think I have any of those and a pass would have been more appropriate. I think partner has five or six spades and wants to play there.

I agree about the questionable meaning of your double. Double here should probably just show a strong hand hoping that you can land on your feet. **Adams:** "Pass—I think partner has Spades."

Three experts think that  $2 \spadesuit$  is forcing.

**Parker:** "3.—Good hand with no source of tricks in notrump. Don't want to play a spade fit with a bad break. Maybe he has four clubs or three diamonds."

It's not that bad to play in 2 • when you know that RHO is going to have five of them. Bad breaks are worse when you don't expect them.

**Hopkins:** "2NT—I think this is the least likely contract to get doubled. Clubs may be our 4-4 fit, but I worry about a bad split. I sound as if I have 18/19, and maybe opponents will believe me."

**Schwartz:** "2NT—Overbidding by a few points. I would not have doubled 2♥. I have the heart stoppers and partner should have spades."

There are rare exceptions where cuebids are non-forcing but you have to be careful.



Time for a few more BridgeMate trivia. Since we started using BridgeMates in September 2009, I have electronic records of 136 sessions with a total of 134,145 board results recorded.

Not surprisingly, the most popular contracts are:

- 3NT played 22,085 times undoubled with a 72% success rate, 125 times doubled with a 40% success rate, and 3 times redoubled, making once
- 4 16161 undoubled, 70% success; 1291 doubled, 22% success; 8 redoubled, 25% success
- $4 \nabla 14484, 71\%; 751, 32\%; 5, 60\%$

Every possible contract has been played undoubled and doubled. 18 out of the 35 possible redoubled contracts have been played at least once, with  $2 \blacklozenge XX$  by far the most popular (making 9 out of 13 times).

A final oddity: 4NT has made 83% of the time. If anyone is thus tempted to raise their partner's 3NT to 4 so as to improve their chances of success by 11%, I can line up a high-stake rubber bridge game for you.

#### COMMITTEE ACTION #82

The following case involving unauthorized information (UI) arose during the first qualifying session of the Mitchell Open BAM Teams at the 2012 Fall NABC in San Francisco.

South led the \$4 against  $4 \, \forall x$  and declarer, East, made four, +590 for E/W. The Director was called after East's  $4 \, \forall$  bid. N/S stated that there was a 10-15 second pause

before West passed 4♦. West claimed the hesitation was closer to two seconds. E/W's agreement was that over a weak 2♦ bid 2NT was a natural, strong notrump hand, E/W had no agreement concerning other 2♦ openings. There was no discussion or agreement regarding East's 3♥ bid. After the event E/W said that over a strong notrump overcall, 3 v would have been forcing. The Directors believed that since East had the chance to force his side to game in hearts during the auction and had not done so, there was some doubt about the firmness of E/W's agreement concerning whether 3♥ had been forcing. Thus, West's BIT suggested bidding as opposed to passing. Accordingly, per Law 16B1, the result was adjusted to 4 ♦ by South making four, +130 for N/S. E/W appealed the ruling.

E/W told the Committee that they had no clear bidding agreements over an intermediate 2♦ opening; both assumed that their defensive agreements over a weak 2♦ opener applied. Those agreements were, after an auction such as  $(2 \diamondsuit)$ -2NT- $(3 \diamondsuit)$ , that a double showed both majors, 3♥ and 3♠ were natural and forcing, and 4♦ was a transfer. Therefore, because 3♥ was forcing East could not pass 4 ♦. West passed 4 ♦ planning to pull a double to  $4 \heartsuit$  to show a weaker hand (in their methods) than bidding 4♥ directly. N/S contended that East did not have the values for a game-forcing bid of 3♥ so he might well have meant 3♥ as competitive. If East wanted to force to game he could have bid **4♥** or **4♦** initially. The two pairs also disagreed as to when the Director was called. E/W claimed it was at the end of the auction while N/S claimed it was immediately after the 4♥ bid. E/W had no system notes avail-

able. Okay, if you were on the Appeal Committee how would you decide this case? When you're ready read on.

The Committee members found that the BIT was agreed to by both sides. The question facing them then was whether the UI from the BIT demonstrably suggested bidding over other logical alternatives (LAs). East had a diamond void, so from his perspective his partner could have been thinking about doubling and decided against it. However, partner could also have been thinking about bidding. They therefore decided that the UI demonstrably suggested bidding over passing. Next, was pass a LA? Half the Committee members believed that 3♥ constituted a game force but that even if it were not passing 4♦ at BAM scoring after partner failed to double was unthinkable. The other half believed that since partner was limited and East had only a five-count, he might pass hoping that no four-level contract would make. One piece of evidence in their favor was that the screening Director had polled three players, each with about 6000 MPs (the same as the actual East player had), asking what call they would make with the East hand over  $3 \spadesuit$ . None of them bid  $3 \heartsuit$  (two bid  $4 \spadesuit$  and one doubled). However, when then asked what they would do over (4♦)-Pass-(Pass) (one was okay with having bid 3♥) all three passed. The Committee was ultimately persuaded by the argument that if West could pass 4♦, so could East. Since those actions seemed about equally poor, and since East and West appeared to be peers, they decided that for this East passing 4♦ was a LA. The Committee therefore ruled as the Director had to adjusted the result to 4♦ by South making four, +130 for N/S. They noted, however, that for players of different skill levels this decision could have gone the other way.

I have a problem with the Committee's reasoning here. Law 16B1(a) states: "After a player makes available to his partner ex-

traneous information that may suggest a call or play...the partner may not choose from among logical alternatives one that could demonstrably have been suggested over another by the extraneous information." The word "demonstrably" (my italics) means that the UI must make one action more likely to be the winning one than any of the others — not that it just could have suggested that action among several alternatives. Here the Committee plainly states in their decision that they believed the UI from West's BIT over 4♦ indicated that he could have been thinking about either doubling 4♦ or bidding 4♥ and finally decided not to take any action. Clearly, then, the UI here does not "demonstrably" suggest which action (Pass or 4♥) is more likely to be the winner. What it does suggest, however, is that West was considering some forward-going action over 4♦ and that therefore East cannot be allowed to bid if his hand is a clear pass or to make a bid that caters to whatever action West was considering (such as doubling  $4 \spadesuit$ , after which West can take whichever course he was considering over  $4 \spadesuit$ ). As long as East takes a committal action, by passing or bidding, he undertakes a risk that he has done the wrong thing — at least as far as West's intentions were concerned. As long as the UI does not clearly suggest which action he should take he is free to take a committal action as he sees fit.

In other words, since West's BIT suggests "extras" in one form or another (a desire to double or compete to  $3 \, \Psi$ ) East cannot be allowed to cater to West's wishes either with a hand that was a clear stretch to bid  $3 \, \Psi$  over  $3 \, \Phi$  last time or to give West a "fielder's choice" via a double, allowing him to express the reason for his hesitation over  $4 \, \Phi$  by either passing or pulling to  $4 \, \Psi$ . Several Committee members said they believed that passing  $4 \, \Phi$  with the East hand once West failed to double was unthinkable. I agree. I'd allow East to take what I believe is a clear-cut action over  $4 \, \Phi$  but would not allow him to take a two-way shot after the BIT by doubling.

The only thing that gives me pause is

that all three players polled passed  $4 \spadesuit$  (after having a  $3 \blacktriangledown$  bid imposed on them over  $3 \spadesuit$ ), suggesting that perhaps passing  $4 \spadesuit$  was the clear-cut action for this level of player. But my intuition tells me to discount the results of the poll somewhat. I think the fact that none of the players polled wanted to bid  $3 \blacktriangledown$  over  $3 \spadesuit$  skewed the result. A more appropriate poll would have found players who would have bid  $3 \blacktriangledown$  freely over  $3 \spadesuit$  and then asked them what they would do over  $4 \spadesuit$  with the East hand. I believe a substantial number of such players would bid  $4 \blacktriangledown$ .



To be eligible, a player: (1) Must be a member (or pending member) of either the NVBA or the WBL; (2) Must attend all but one NVBA sectional and all but one WBL sectional\* during the contest period (August, 2013 through May, 2014). Points won on Tournament Thursday evenings are included in the totals, but do not count towards eligibility; (3) Must be a member in good standing of the ACBL and a local affiliate throughout the contest period and remain so through the award presentation.

**Awards:** Two trophies will be awarded at the July 4th Regional: Open and Non-Life Master.

#### MINUTES OF THE 2014 **WASHINGTON BRIDGE LEAGUE** ANNUAL MEETING

The 2014 WBL Annual Meeting was called to order by President, Richard Ferrin at 7:15 p.m.

The minutes of the 2013 WBL Annual Meeting were approved without change.

#### Treasurer's Report

Treasurer, Rose Berman announced that the WBL is in sound financial condition, with approximately \$47,000 in funds. The year-to-date net income of WBL is \$419. Copies of WBL's profit and loss statement for 2013 were available at the meeting. Rose announced that a WBL Educational Foundation has been created and is accepting donations. 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# Double Trouble: Takeout Doubles, Part 3: Takeout Doubler's Second Bid

We have been discussing defensive bidding, specifically takeout doubles. Now we turn to the question of what happens after partner responds to our takeout double.

### 1. After a minimum response by partner, what does a raise show?

In a non-competitive auction (opponents do not bid again), the raise of a minimum response shows 15-17 support points and four trump, while a jump raise shows 18-20 support points and four trump.

In a competitive auction, where opener bids again or his partner has bid, then a raise is just competitive (known as a courtesy raise.) In competition, the Takeout Doubler must double again to show a big hand. Compare these three auctions:

### 2. What does a Takeout Double followed by 1NT show?

A Takeout Double followed by 1NT shows a balanced 19-21 HCP. Remember that with 15-18, the overcaller could have bid 1NT.

### 3. What does a Takeout Double followed by another double show?
