PRESIDENT'S LETTER

I am proud to have been elected as your President for a second term, and look forward to continuing to serve you. I hope to have your support in dealing with a major issue that confronts our Unit.

Steve Schatzow, our Tournament Chair, has announced his intention to resign by the end of the year. We appreciate his service, and acknowledge how hard it will be to replace him. He changed the starting times of the Saturday games, increasing the popularity of the Saturday afternoon game, and attempted to revive the Friday evening by game by instituting a Triple Nickel Swiss, which has been very successful in Northern Virginia, and providing desserts and alcohol for a break when players could socialize. Under his auspices, the sectionals have returned to profitability.

Brad Theurer has agreed to take over from Steve. We welcome him and as a Board are prepared to fully support him.

The need to find a replacement for Steve led the Tournament Committee to review in detail what goes into this job. Traditionally, the Tournament Chair (TC) will:

- 1. Obtain the sanction.
- <u>2</u>. Set the dates (there are a lot of constraints here, including among others conflicts with other tournaments and site availability).
- <u>3</u>. Lease the playing site and make sure the site is used in compliance with the terms of the contract. This includes making sure the site is left in an acceptable condition at the close of every evening and especially at the end of the tournament. Show up at the time on the lease to open up the site on the first day.
- 4. Write the schedule: times, events, stratifications. This is typically done in consultation with the Board, but in the past the Board has ceded authority to the TC.
- <u>5</u>. Arrange publicity. Represent the sponsoring organization as the face of the tournament. Be the point of contact with the ACBL.

Make announcements, drum up attendance.

- 6. Organize the tournament.
- a. Make sure there are adequate supplies
- b. Make sure the tables are there and set up
- c. Hire caddies and oversee them in setting up the tables and hospitality
- d. Arrange hospitality, which includes:
 - i. Planning what to serve
 - ii. Buying what is to be served, buying any necessary hospitality supplies
 - iii. Deciding how the food and drink will be served and instructing the caddies on how to set up
 - iv. Doing the hospitality: putting the food and refreshments out

In Northern Virginia, the TC, Margot Hennings performs all these functions and has done so for a long time. However, we do not, and have not for some time, had a TC that does it all, as she does. Our current operating model is one of distributed responsibility.

Mike Zane is in charge of hospitality, and has done a very good job. With few exceptions, the lines have moved very quickly and the lunches and other refreshments have been well done.

Bill Cole has secured the site (the Margaret Schweinhaut Senior Center, from which we had been banned for a number of years). His name is on the lease and he has been dedicated to making sure we can continue to maintain good relations with the county by keeping the site in good condition each and every day. He has been instrumental in arranging the hospitality and organizing the tournament. He has not accepted any compensation for doing this or any of his other work. It is not fair or realistic to rely on him forever, and he has indicated a wish to step down as soon as possible. We thank him for all he has done.

In the meantime, let me remind you that we should all help out by: putting the chairs under the tables at the close of events on Friday and Saturday, picking up trash from our tables at the end of any event, and stacking chairs and breaking down tables on Sunday evening.

You can pick up a copy of the problems at the WBL Unit Game in Maryland, and can send answers or requests for problems to robinswr@erols.com. You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996. I accept only the first answer from each solver unless it is clear that the solver wants to correct his answer.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times

when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I consider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

Partner has shown a lot of black cards and is vulnerable. He's not saving. He's bidding to make. He didn't bid Michaels so his spades should be longer than his clubs. One should not bid Michaels with six strong spades and five clubs such as ♠KQ109xx ♥- ♦xx ♣AKQxx because partner, with 2-2 in the black suits, would choose clubs. You could bid Michaels with 6-6 when you plan on freely bidding your six-card major. We bid 4 freely so partner knows that we have spade support. What he doesn't know is that we fit his clubs and we

have only one red-suit defensive trick.

Five experts join me and compete to 5 . Someone is making at the five-level and it might as well be us. Maybe nobody is making at the five-level and 5 . is the last to next mistake. (They bid again)

Parker: "5♠—Partner must be void in hearts so maybe 6=0=2=5. Give him ♠KQxxxx♥-♠xx♣AKxxx we make six with a heart lead, if spades split, and if he has less we make five or go down one and they make. Take out insurance especially when it makes."

McGowen: "5 — Partner said four was a good idea opposite a bust. I have three good cards on offense and only one on defense."

Gann: "5♠—I've waffled back and forth between passing and bidding 5♠, and I've decided to go with my initial gut reaction. Partner is pretty clearly void in hearts. If partner has an admittedly unlikely stiff diamond, 5♠ is almost certainly right. If partner has two diamonds, we'll need to pick up one of the black suits for no losers. That isn't necessarily going to happen, but it's not out of the question. Partner has just enough room for something like ♠AQT9xx ♥void ♠xx ♣AQT9x. If that's the situation, 5♠ is not a bad contract at all. And if the 4♣ bid was a search for a sacrifice with ♠KQ10xxx ♥void ♠xx ♣KQ10xx, 5♠ may well be right."

Theurer: "5♠—My hand has become quite good, partner is almost surely void in hearts and is likely to have six spades. With only five spades and long clubs he probably would have bid 2♥ Michaels instead of 1♠. So with a double fit and being vulnerable at matchpoints I will take the push. There is an argument for pass here if it is forcing but I think with partner voluntarily bidding 4♣ vulnerable when my hand could have nothing says we should be able to make 5♠."

Hopkins: "5 ←—I think partner has something akin to a 6-0-2-5 pattern with cards since he didn't make a Michaels cue bid. AK10xxx V-◆Jx KQxxx would be just about right. My hand should match up well with his."

One expert doubles. He has one sure defensive trick and expects partner to have at least two.

Gellis: "Double—I don't think we can make 5 \(\blacktriangle \). Partner probably has no hearts."

Four experts put the ball back in partner's court. Partner knows that you have spade support and very little red-suit defense.

Shi: "Pass—I'm OK with whatever partner wants to do."

Schwartz: "Pass—I have about what partner would expect. Not sure if partner takes pass as forcing in a competitive auction but with the hand I actually have, I don't mind if he does."

Woolsey: "Pass—I don't know why I didn't bid 3 . But now I have no idea whether we should be declaring or defending, so I'll let partner make the last mistake."

Adams: "Pass—Could I have doubled 2 to show a raise? Not happy with my sequence, but I have nothing to say right now. I have a decent hand for the auction, but 4 already said that."

One expert bids 6.4. I see no reason why clubs should play better than spades. Spades pays more and if you're off two sure tricks, you'll go down in 6.4. Since partner did not bid Michaels I would expect that his spades are longer than his clubs.

King: "6♣—My hand keeps getting better and better. I expect partner to have something like ♠AKQxx♥-♠Kxx♣KQxxx or ♠AKQxx ♥-♠xxx♣AKQxx."

Don't bid Michaels when your major is longer than your minor.

2) IMPs You're Vul East dealer

Partner has overcalled vulnerable at the twolevel. He does not have a weak hand. If he has as little as $\clubsuit Jx \Psi Ox \spadesuit AKOxxx \clubsuit Oxx$ and this is a minimum $2 \spadesuit$ overcall, 3NT should be odds on. With ten HCP opposite a two-level overcall, you need to at least invite game. If he's short in hearts he could have a very strong hand. I'd gladly overcall $2 \spadesuit$ with $\spadesuit Kx \blacktriangleleft AQJxxxx \spadesuit Qxx$. Doubling with a singleton heart could lead to a disaster if partner has five hearts.

Three experts pass. A two-level overcall is not Swiss cheese. Passing seems very conservative when seven experts strongly invite. If partner holds $\bigstar x \, \Psi Ax \, \phi AKxxxx \, \Phi QJxx$, $6 \, \Phi Will make unless suits split badly and this is an average <math>2 \, \Phi \,$ overcall.

Parker: "Pass—2NT is my second choice but I don't like to bid notrump with no fit. If they bid on I will double to show cards."

McGowen: "Pass—Hard to see a game, so let's see if the opponents get themselves in trouble."

Schwartz: "Pass—Even with a decent ten count, I have no real spade stopper and no diamond honor. Thus is too much to expect partner to supply running diamonds and a 1/2 spade stopper."

If partner has as little as $\blacktriangle Jx \lor Qxx$ $\blacklozenge AQJ10xx \twoheadleftarrow xx$, 3NT is on the diamond finesse and he should have a lot more.

Five experts join me and invite with 2NT.

Gellis: "2NT—But not real happy. Don't like bidding 2♠. Partner might think I have a diamond fit."

Theurer: "2NT—I can't pass. A cue bid should show support especially by a passed hand and a new suit should be five or more in length. Yes I don't have a full stopper in spades but with no spade raise by RHO, I expect partner to usually have at least two spades and if they contain an honor or the suit blocks I have a stopper. If partner is minimum with short spades he can pull to 3♣ or 3♠ which will be fine."

Hopkins: "2NT—The value bid."

Woolsey: "2NT—Looks perfect on all counts. What alternative is there?"

Adams: "2NT—Right on values. Ten likely enough to block the suit. Partner with a trashy six-card suit overcall can rebid his suit. Partner with a powerhouse can bid more."

One expert cue bids.

Gann: "2 ♠—2NT with 10xxx in their suit

isn't appetizing. I'm clearly not introducing any new suit at the three-level. Partner is going to expect a weaker hand with more diamonds if I bid $3 \spadesuit$. And $3 \spadesuit$ is a clear overbid. I think $2 \spadesuit$ gives me the best chance of soliciting useful information from partner. My guess is that partner's next bid will be $3 \spadesuit$, which I will pass. But if partner has a $3 \clubsuit$ bid, it may get us to a very good $5 \clubsuit$ contract."

Two experts raise diamonds.

Shi: "3 ♦ —I would rather have an actual spade stopper to bid 2NT. 3 ♦ is definitely what I would bid without the ten of spades, with the ten of spades, I would consider 2NT."

King: "3 ♦ —Can't pass as we could miss a vulnerable game. I'll try 3 ♦ as my extra high cards should make up for my lack of a third diamond."

I wonder if they'll bid 3NT with 10xxx if partner continues with $3 \triangleq$ after they cue bid or raise diamonds.

Two-level overcalls can be very strong.

We have a very strong hand but the opponents have made two calls. There is no bid that perfectly describes this hand. We could double but what are we going to do over partner's expected 2 ♦-bid? We could overcall 1 ♣ but that could be the opponent's eight-card fit and 1 ♣ could end the auction and partner could have only one spade. Partner doesn't figure to be strong enough to bid over 1 ♣. We could overcall a strong notrump but that shows 15-18 and we have 20. We could pass and decide what to do after the opponents have made two more bids.

Two experts overcall 1NT. 1NT could end

McGowen: "1NT—Too big to pass, stiff diamond precludes a takeout double."

Theurer: "1NT—Tough hand, if I don't act here. LHO is likely to be rebidding 1NT so I will beat him to the punch, so to speak. This does risk missing 4-4 spade fit but if I double here, partner is all too likely to bid 2♦ and now I have to bid 2NT which could get us too high. If partner has fewer than four spades then this bid should be best and if partner has five spades he should transfer to that suit, of course. If the opponents were vulnerable I might pass and hope to collect +200. If they bid over my 1NT I will be happy to defend."

Three experts double. They intend to rebid 2NT over partner's expected $2 \spadesuit$ -bid.

Gann: "Double—If partner bids spades, I'm happy. If partner bids diamonds, I can bid

2NT to show a hand that was too powerful for a 1NT overcall at my first opportunity. The stiff queen isn't ideal, but when was the last time anyone picked up an ideal hand in the Solver's Club?"

Shi: "Double—Pretty normal. If they were red I might chance a pass."

Woolsey: "Double—Have to see if we have spade fit. I can outbid partner's diamonds with notrump at any level."

Two experts overcall $1 \triangleq$. Partner figures to be weak and $1 \triangleq$ could easily end the auction. $1 \triangleq$ could be a horrible contract.

Gellis: "1 ♠—I want to get partner off to the right lead."

Parker: "1 — What I lack in spades I make up for in points. 1NT might work but my guess is they run diamonds."

Four experts join me and pass for now. By passing we get to see what West rebids and see East's next bid. If somehow they bid diamonds, we can double for takeout. If 1NT gets passed around we can double it for penalties. If it goes $1 - 1 \lor - 1$ NT - $2 \lor ,$ we can double it for penalties. Partner can look at his weak hand, know that you have a strong hand and figure that the reason you didn't double before is that you have hearts.

King: "Pass—Pass for now. Let's see where the opponents end up. Partner clearly has a zero count."

Hopkins: "Pass—The auction should continue. I would prefer to have a chance to make a takeout double of 2 ♦, but I will deal with whatever comes back to me at my next turn."

Schwartz: "Pass—I can play partner for a preemptive spade raise by bidding 1♠ but why take the chance. The hand is unbiddable so it's best to assume the opponents have their bid and we don't have a big spade fit."

Adams: "Pass—Seems a decent chance to get them when 1NT comes back around. Not letting them off by entering with imperfect hand."

Partner has shown a takeout double of $1 \clubsuit$. In other words, if West had opened $1 \clubsuit$, he might have doubled for takeout. He should be something like 1=4=3=5, 1=4=4=4, 0=4=4=5 or 2=4=3=4. If partner has five clubs, they're probably weak since he didn't overcall. If partner has four clubs, this hand should play well since both diamonds and spades are ruff right. Your shortness is over the opponent's shortness. I expect to have good play for $3 \clubsuit$ and +110 is better than +100 defending $2 \spadesuit$. -50 if you go down is better than -110.

Five experts join me and compete with $3 \clubsuit$. Maybe this will push the opponents to $3 \spadesuit$ and we can take a bite out of it. If they were vulnerable it would make sense to double where down one is a top.

Parker: "3.4—Partner has some 1-4-4-4 hand or close to it. I am afraid they can scramble eight tricks in spades and we can scramble nine tricks in clubs."

If they can scramble only six tricks in $2 \clubsuit$, they will score better than $3 \clubsuit$ making.

McGowen: "3♣—Looks good for a cross-ruff."

Gann: "3♣—This could easily make, and it has ways to win even if it doesn't. I'm not sure that we're beating 2♠. I'd much prefer to play 3♣ or push them up a level. If East bids 3♠, I'll let partner choose whether or not to double. I'm marked with spade length, and 3♣ has already overstated my defensive values."

Theurer: "3♣—I have defense but the opponents are not vulnerable and the spades are likely 2-0-6 around the table. 3♣ should play well for us, especially if partner has five clubs which is certainly possible. Maybe the opponents will bid 3♠ so I can double that. Like the previous problem, if the opponents were vulnerable I might choose to defend here but I can't be sure we will set 2♠ more than one trick if at all."

Hopkins: "3♣—Partner should have a variation on a 1-4-4-4 pattern. My cards are in the right suits and probably sufficient to

make 3♣ playable."

Five experts pass. They will either be -110 or get 50 points a trick. Not the way to play matchpoints or even IMPs.

Shi: "Pass—Partner has a takeout double of spades, and I have not enough to do anything."

Gellis: "Pass—Partner isn't 5-5. Looks like the best place to get a plus."

Schwartz: "Pass—Partner has a takeout double of spades, and doesn't need that good a hand with a stiff spade to come in. Partner can always double again with more than a minimum".

Woolsey: "Pass—I need partner to be able to come with another double before I'm confident about beating them."

Adams: "Pass—Don't get the problem. Not bidding this trash unless forced to."

One expert tries to protect his score. If we can make 3 & we need +300. Usually you lead trumps against doubled partscores. However, not sure why leading a trump is best here. I don't expect them to ruff anything in the short hand. You lead a trump if you want to cut down ruffs. I think the forcing game would be best for the defense. If I wasn't going to bid 3 &, I'd double. Both -110 and -470 probably would be the same bad score.

King: "Double—And lead a trump."

It's not winning bridge to allow the opponents to play at the two-level when there is a reasonable alternative.

What does partner's double mean? Partner could have a light takeout double. Partner could have an off-shape takeout double. If you're going to make a takeout double, it's safer to double 2NT where you can play at the

three-level. Or partner could have a penalty double. In real life partner was making what she thought was a penalty double. Four experts including me pulled it to four-of-a-redsuit. LHO had $Ax \bigvee AKQ10x \bigwedge AKJxx \oiint Jx$ and thought it was Christmas.

Four experts join me and think that the reason partner didn't double 2NT is that he doesn't have four hearts. He could have also had a light takeout double.

Gann: "4 ←—This was such an easy auction until partner got involved! I'm not at all confident about beating 3 ♠ doubled, so I'm just bidding my longest suit and hoping for the best. I'm probably being a little too pessimistic here. They haven't doubled me yet, and 4 ♠ could make. I'm mainly worried because East opened vulnerable and West bid Ogust. That suggests that they have at least half the deck."

Parker: "4♦—Again partner has some 1-4-4-4 hand. If he has something like ★x♥Kxxx♦AKxx♣KQxx, we lose two hearts and one club while they lose one spade, one diamond and one club or close to that."

If he has your hand, he should have doubled 2NT.

Gellis: "4 ◆ —Not real happy. Not sure we can beat 3 ♠. Partner would have to have four tricks."

Schwartz: "4♦—With partner unable to act the first time, don't expect to make a four-level contract so want to avoid a double. This will bid the safer and a more solid trump fit.

A game contract, 4∇ , will be easier for them to double."

Seven experts pass. They assume that partner has made a penalty double.

Shi: "Pass—Logically this double should be penalty since partner had the option to double 2NT for takeout. Pretty weird since we hold Ax of spades though."

If the 2NT-bidder is very strong, he can have short spades.

McGowen: "Pass—If we can make $4 \, \mathbf{V}$, we are setting $3 \, \mathbf{A}$ big time."

Theurer: "Pass—Partner must have a pretty good hand to be entering the auction at this level vulnerable. But, his hand is not a moose since he did not bid at his first turn. So even though I have four hearts I don't think I am likely to make game so I will pass, lead my doubleton club and hope for +200 at matchpoints. Would not pass at IMPs where if 3♠ doubled makes it's a disaster. Then I'd need to decide which red suit to bid - probably hearts since 4♥ is game and partner should have four of those."

King: "Pass—This looks like an auction from your *TableTALK* poll this month. This sounds like a penalty double to me."

If you read my TableTALK article, you can see that there is no clear interpretation of the double.

Hopkins: "Pass—I assume partner has some trump tricks and a little on the side, something like a weak notrump with QJ98 of

Spades. I think with a take-out pattern, he should have acted originally or now hold the peace. It's only Matchpoints."

Woolsey: "Pass—This is a pure penalty double. We will soon find out who is crazy."

Adams: "Pass—Looks like a penalty double to me."

It's important to define what double means in this situation. Penalty makes the most sense.



AT THE TABLE: A SURVIVAL MANUAL

—Part 4—

We continue our discussions of common problems at the bridge table. While some discussion may presume a certain amount of experience and sensitivity to the situations being described, even a novice may improve in these areas through exposure to the underlying issues. Discussions include both practical advice on how to cope with problems once they occur as well as procedures to follow to minimize or avoid disruptions in the first place. Every suggestion may not be appropriate for all games or players: some are not intended for novices or events with low MP limits; others may be modified for more socially-oriented or club games. But above all else, please remember that the emphasis of bridge should always be on fun, enjoyment and relaxation. Even in serious competition it is to everyone's advantage to avoid practices which can cause problems or ill-feelings among the contestants.

When the Opponents Alert

Principle: Be consistent when an opponent Alerts: Either always ask about it at your first turn following the Alert (preferred)—regardless of whether you are interested in the answer—or always wait until the end of auction to ask.

When an opponent says "Alert" it is usually to your advantage to ask about it at your side's next turn to call. The proper way to ask is by saying, "Please explain." In some cases the meaning of the Alert will be different than you expected and by asking you will avoid a problem later due to an erroneous assumption. More importantly, if you ask only when you are in doubt or when the answer may affect your next action, you will be conveying unauthorized information to your partner as well tipping off the opponents as to the nature of your hand (i.e., that you cannot tell what the call means from your own hand, that you were considering some action, or that you had some interest in the suit named). If partner later takes an action that was suggested by your question (as by balancing or doubling when your question suggests that you hold useful values, or by leading the suit you asked about) and vou obtain a good result as a consequence, vou will not be allowed to keep it.

The solution I recommend, while not strictly ACBL policy, is for the next player following the Alert to always ask about the Alerted call, whether he is interested in the answer or not. That way no one on either side can draw a valid inference from the question. (Note: if your partner is the next player to call and he does not ask about the Alert, you may not properly ask until it is your turn to call.)

An alternative solution—though not as good as always asking—is to always wait until the end of the auction to ask about Alerts. This approach has several drawbacks. First, there will be times when you will need to ask during the auction because the answer will affect your next call. If you only ask when it matters you will be conveying unauthorized information to your partner—not to mention useful information to the opponents. Second, the information you gain by asking immediately can be put to use while the auction is still in progress. This will permit you to use your time and energy more efficiently to keep up on what is happening in the auction.

If you decide to wait to ask until the end of the auction and end up on defense, there are some additional pitfalls to avoid. First, if partner is on lead don't ask until his lead is face down on the table. If you don't wait and your question suggests a lead which partner then makes, you will not get to keep your good result. Second, the best way to ask is to say something neutral such as "Please explain your Alerts" or "May I have a review with explanations." Refrain from asking about specific calls or naming specific suits as "What was 2♣?" or "Was 3♦ forcing?" or "Does he show four or more hearts?" Such questions will draw attention to the suit named and may compromise your partner's actions—if not on opening lead then possibly later in the defense.

Remember, asking about the opponents' Alerts only when you are interested, asking about a specific call or naming a specific suit, or asking at an inappropriate time (i.e., when it is not your turn to call or play) can make you vulnerable to transmitting unauthorized information and having your score adjusted. I suggest always asking about Alerts at your first legal opportunity (unless

partner has already asked), asking whether you are interested or not (always *appear* interested), and asking in such a way that your reasons for asking remain hidden from everyone at the table.

In 2006, the WBL initiated a new annual award, the **Machlin Trophy** for **Sportsmanship** in honor of Jerry Machlin, whom many of you will remember as one of the greatest directors the game has ever known.

To date, the recipients of the award are: Dr. Charles Stenger, Peter Boyd, James Geist, Rose Berman, Barbara Doran, Millard Nachtwey, Paul Leopold, Bob Bell, Audrey Marbach and Dick Wegman. Each year, a committee of the most recent five winners, (the longest standing to be the Machlin Committee Chair — Barbara Doran) plus the Unit Game Chief Director is appointed to consider this year's nominees. The criteria for awarding the trophy are as follows:

"The candidate should (1) demonstrate strong ethical standards and a commitment to active ethics (i.e., full disclosure of systems and agreements to opponents, etc.); (2) behave graciously at the table after bad results or good results; (3) exhibit exemplary behavior at all times toward partner and opponents; (4) demonstrate an ability to get along with multiple partners; and (5) demonstrate a willingness to help mentor other players in the game. A player wouldn't necessarily have to satisfy all five, but these are the main the criteria that the selection committee will consider."





DEFENSE: SIGNALLING

By far, the most difficult aspect of the game to master is defense. Declarer has a complete view of all of his side's assets. Defenders on the other hand, only see their own hand, and the dummy. Their challenge is to piece together partner's hand and declarer's hand to figure out how best to defend.

The defenders have tools to help them. In a previous article, we discussed opening leads, and the rule of 11. This allows defenders to understand honor holdings in their partner's hand. In addition to the advantage of opening leads, there are three basic signaling tools to help guide the defense.

Attitude signals: When partner leads a card, as third hand, when I am not trying to win the trick, I give my partner an attitude signal. In standard signaling, playing a high card would show strength in the suit led. A low card would show lack of interest in the suit led. In the deal below, West leads the ♥K against a 4♠ contract. East should play the ♥10 to encourage partner to continue with hearts. If West plays another heart, the defense can take three hearts and the ♠A to defeat the contract. If West switches to any other suit, declarer will take all of the remaining tricks.

When West leads a diamond, declarer ducks, and partner wins the ◆K and returns a diamond. Declarer then leads the ♥K, and continues with the ♥Q. West has to decide when to take the ♥A. West can see that there is no further entry to the dummy. They therefore need to hold up the ♥A for the correct number of rounds. If South has two hearts, West should win the second heart. If South has a third heart, West should hold up twice. How does West know?

The answer is that East needs to give a count signal. In standard signaling, a high card followed by a low card shows an even number of cards. Playing cards from low to high in a suit shows an odd number. In the diagrammed deal, East will play the ♥8 followed by the ♥2. West will know to hold their ♥A until the third round.



Now, when hearts are led, East will follow with the ♥2 followed by the ♥3. West will therefore know to win the second round of hearts. If West ducks two rounds of hearts, declarer will have nine tricks – three spades, two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs. If West takes the second heart and plays either black suit, 3NT will go down.

Suit Preference: This is by far the rarest signal given by defenders. On this deal, West has shows ten cards in the minor suits. When West leads a heart, it is fairly obviously a singleton. East knows to win the ♥A and return a heart for partner to ruff. If East can get partner to lead a diamond back, East can give a

second ruff to defeat the contract. How do you tell partner what to lead?



None Vulnerable: Lead ♥10

The answer is a suit preference signal. If East plays their highest heart, they wish West to return the higher remaining suit -- diamonds. Similarly, if they lead they lowest heart, they are asking for the lower remaining suit — clubs. In our example deal, East should return the ♥9 to get a diamond return, and ensure setting the contract.
