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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Convention Savvy

How many bridge conventions do you play? Are you the vanilla type or the crepe suzette type? Do you try to learn every new gadget someone tells you about or do you say KISS (Keep It Simple Stupid). Me, I'm somewhere in between. My friend Ellen loves gadgets and she's always encouraging me to try something new. Some I do, some I don't. Most I forget at least once. My husband is far more cautious and says, "I've played for 50 some odd years and have gotten along just fine without such and such."

Why are there so many conventions? Quite honestly, I believe they all are the result of one hand someone couldn't bid, so they devised a systematic way or convention to handle it the next time. The conventions that have lasted and have found themselves part of the mainstream are those whose situations arise again and again such as take out doubles or Stayman. Each of these conventions were first somebody's brainchild, which explains why most conventions are named for someone.

Sometimes there is controversy over who invented a particular convention. One example is Hamilton/Capelletti. This convention is usually known as Hamilton in the west and as Capelletti in the east. I once asked Freddie Hamilton what he called it. He told

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Field Awards and MPs

When attending a tournament have you ever wondered when looking at the recap sheet what it means when it says the masterpoint awards for a 25-table event (the one you are playing in) are based upon 60 tables or maybe 40 tables? Or what if on two consecutive days you are playing in a stratified open pairs and on both days it is an 18 table game yet on one day the event pays more masterpoints than the other. Do you wonder why? Masterpoint awards are based upon the number of tables in an event. However, the answer can be found by the way the "tables" in your event are counted and whether or not you are playing in a restricted or unrestricted event. Currently, an unrestricted event can count the number of tables in that event and then can get credit for the tables being played in a different event and even at different times. To me that does not make sense.

Simply stated, the ACBL Handbook provides for an "unrestricted event," one which is "completely open" at a regional or sectional to be credited with all tables in play in totally concurrent events (pairs, teams, or individual) for the purposes of computing overall awards. The Handbook further states that for flighted, stratified, or stratiflighted events all tables are counted to determine the number of tables in the unrestricted event. Additionally, the guidelines further state that for the purpose of awarding masterpoints, a restricted event that is a two-session morning and afternoon, is deemed to be totally concurrent with a two session event that is afternoon and evening. This again does not make sense to me.

With these inconsistencies that I see, the innovation of awarding masterpoints based upon strength of field makes sense. The ACBL committee on Strength of Field (SOF) has developed a formula for awarding

masterpoints that is more consistent in evaluating the competition that you are playing against rather than the number of tables in play in a different event or a different time.

The main argument that I have heard about not adopting SOF is that the masterpoint awards will be less than currently awarded or that the system is not broke, why fix it. I think that with mastepoint awards being determined by the number of tables in other events or being played at different times, this system is not fair and it needs to be corrected. I believe that if the tables from other events and different play times were to be eliminated from the unrestricted event, the masterpoint awards for SOF would be greater than with the elimination of these "ghost" tables. I have asked the SOF Committee to run some test results comparing the SOF masterpoint awards to a restricted event without the ghost tables and to report back prior to the Board voting on this issue in Memphis.

I am sure many of our players have questions about this matter. Please contact me soon, as I leave for Memphis on March 11 with our board meetings beginning on the 12th. Again, my email address is pinsky4bridge@earthlink.net.

Bridge Regulations: It might be helpful for players to know the Laws of Duplicate Bridge as published by the ACBL. So the first installment of this educational feature of the column is the question: When Is It Legal To Ask? (I am quoting from Director's Quick Reference Companion by Larry Harris.)

Calls which were not heard or auction reviews are virtually eliminated thanks to the use of bidding boxes. However, after the final pass when the bidding cards are returned to the box, a player may ask for a review at his first turn to play. After a player's first turn to play, a player can only ask what the contract is, but not who may have doubled it. This can be done at the player's subsequent turns to play.

Any time it is declarer's or either defender's turn to play, he may ask for an explanation of the opponents' calls (for example, the meaning of an alertable bid which was used during the auction) or he may ask for an explanation of the opponents' carding.

So, quick review, I can ask for a review of the auction at my first turn to play. At my later turns to play, I can ask what the contract is. At any turn to play, I can →

ask for an explanation of the opponents' conventions, systems, agreements regarding bidding or carding.

As a glance at the column heading will confirm, this month's unit game falls on the fourth Saturday of the month, not on the usual third. As you can imagine, a RKCB 4NT makes it fairly simple to locate 13 cold top tricks. Nothing special here, you say. Except when she took out trump we found that I had two and my partner had one, too! We were apparently playing with a 15 card heart suit! It turns out the lady had done it again. She had opened 1♥ on:

Declarer in this hand realized that RHO was endplayed at trick 2, so he pitched his heart loser. Unfortunately, the endplay proved to be an illusion when LHO won the trick with the spade ace and led another diamond. There's no way to avoid the loss of a second diamond and a club (LHO has the stiff 9 so the marked finesse brings the suit home for one loser), ending up -100 for a poor result. LHO reasoned that since you needed some values to compete, it was extremely unlikely that you had bypassed 3NT looking at the spade king, so he thought this was a good time to underlead an ace. Be honest — would you have known to play the king at trick one?

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Problem Solvers' Panel

To promote the First Annual LA Scholastic competition on March 31, our panelists this month are the young stars of LA bridge (although some of them no longer live in LA). Our panelists range in age from 15 to about 40. See the end of the column for their biographies. There are five problems in this set, six questions since problem one has a two-part answer. Problems 1a, 1b and 2 will be in this month's issue, while problems 3, 4, and 5 will be in the April issue. Because of the conflict with last names (two Meyersons, a panelist named Jones, and a moderator named Jones), the panelists will be identified by their first names this month.

- a) Do you agree with your double?
b) What now?

The double from this problem was in the Bridge World several years ago in a different context. There were world class players in favor of 3NT, but even more world class players in favor of double because the hand is too good for 3NT. I found that surprising for a couple of reasons. First, 3NT looks like Goldilocks' Baby Bear's bid – "just right!" Second, the hand is a very soft 20 HCP; it has only one ace and a devalued ♥KQ.

1a) Do you agree with your double?

partner a problem this way.

Four panelists choose double. One of them intended to double and bid again, much like the Bridge World panel.

Dan: Yes, I agree with the double. The only other call I'd consider in its place is 3NT, but my hand is so good that I can just bid 3NT later anyways if my partner chooses anything but spades. The thing that worries me most about double is that I don't convey the diamond stopper, but I feel like my partner is a lot more likely to be holding a 5-card major or an intermediate hand that could generate a slam than a balanced hand with no 4-card major and no diamond stopper, so I think I'm a lot less likely to give my

Three other panelists choose double because they don't like their prospects in 3NT.

Brad: Yes. I don't think it is strong enough to bid 3NT vulnerable in that position. I don't have a good source of tricks.

Nolan: Yes. There really is no other bid except 3NT and that is risky because you are relying on partner to have something

Yichi: Yes. Double is the only good choice. A 3♣ overcall with four (not particularly good) spades? Bid 3NT with only 4 winners? No thanks! →

The rest of the panel choose 3NT. Let's hear their reasons.

Adam: No. I would've bid 3NT initially.

Aaron: No. With a balanced 20-count, opposite an unpassed partner, and a double stop in diamonds, I'm bidding 3NT the first time around.

Yehudit: No. I expect partner to bid a 4 card heart suit, and not necessarily at the 3-level, and 3♦-double-pass-4♥ can get pretty awkward. I would bid 3NT, which for me shows about 18-20 HCP balanced. *[Most experts would have a somewhat lower minimum, especially if the hand contained a decent suit]* In my opinion, it is useful to play transfers and Stayman over 3NT in this position. *[I agree, I play these methods with Yehudit and my other expert partners]*

Becca: No. So many points, yet so few fast winners! I like 3NT with this hand instead of double. I should find partner with enough points to make that, and if partner has substantially more, they should bid on (and they would need to have substantially more for us to make slam).

Chien-Yao: No, I don't agree with the double. I would bid 3NT in the first round. Even if we have a 4-4 spade fit, it is still very likely that 3NT is a superior contract. Furthermore, slam is very far away with this hand.

Some feel very strongly the double is wrong.

Roger: No, absolutely not. We have the world's most normal 3NT bid. Making a 3-level takeout double with a doubleton heart and KQx of their suit is not bridge.

Elianna: No, absolutely not. I would have bid 3NT, and avoided this problem (or at least, been in a different one).

Mike: No. I would classify double as a blunder. I prefer 3NT, which could be best even when partner has five spades if diamond ruffs are lurking. LHO, who preempted vulnerable missing the KQ of his suit, is likely to have an outside ace as an entry to give a second ruff.

1b) What now?

The panelist who liked his hand before still does.

Dan: Double again. Apart from not holding 3 hearts, this bid seems about right on both shape and points. I doubt it will get left in, but if it does then it's probably right. Any suit my partner picks is one that I'm happy with, and I have such a strong hand that my partner can probably make 4♥ in a 7-card fit, if that's what it comes too. I regrettably still haven't shown the diamond stopper, but my partner probably even has reasonable chances in 5♣ in a 4-4 fit. And since it's IMPs I think that's good enough.

Others double again, hoping something good will occur.

Elianna: Double. If I'm not allowed to stand on the table and yell "double" so that partner will leave it in *[that might get you a zero tolerance penalty, and probably would be unauthorized information for partner anyway]*, I guess that I'll just double meekly, and hope to not place partner in a 4-2 or worse heart fit.

Yichi: Double again. 4♦ doesn't seem likely to make, even if they have a 10-card fit. I see 2 diamond tricks, assuming opener is not the kind of person who opens 3♦ with JTxxxxx. *[Yichi apparently plays the second double as co-operative, or semi-penalty. That's not the American style; it's mostly takeout in most American expert partnerships. Beating it will be less of a problem than getting partner to put a green card on the table.]* Maybe you have 4♠ but it seems too risky to bid, especially with the strong hand on your left.

Some panelists double, but aren't passing 4♥.

Mike: Double. If partner responds 4♥, I'll bid 4♠. Seriously, unless partner has six hearts, how bad can this be? He can always correct to clubs with length there, since I could have just jumped to 4♠ directly over 3♦ if I was truly one-suited. I did have a very famous partner pass with a void once in a similar auction unfortunately.

Chien-Yao: Double. If partner bids 4♥, I will correct to 4♠. It is impossible that I have single-suited spade hand because I would have already bid 4♠ instead of double for the second time. Therefore, this 4♠ bid should →

imply spades and clubs.

Other panelists pass, with varying degrees of confidence.

Yehudit: Pass.

Yehudit included a long analysis of the IMP mathematics involved in doubling versus passing. The decision hinged on whether partner holding a near yarborough would bid or pass. Since the American style is to remove a 4-level double with shortness and no values, I registered her answer as a pass. American experts are influenced by the great Edgar Kaplan who said "takeout doubles are meant to be taken out". In Europe, I think the second double would be treated as more co-operative than in North America.

Adam: Pass. I'm stuck; if I double again I'm likely going to hear 4♥ from partner and I don't want to play a 4-2 fit. This is one of the reasons I'd have bid 3NT the first time. I'm going to pass but very unhappy about it.

Becca: Pass. I'd like to double for penalties, but suspect partner will take it out [*very likely, he has short diamonds and not many HCPs*].

Aaron: Pass. Double is begging partner to bid 4♥, and while it's likely partner has at least something, I'll just be happy that I can go plus against 4♦.

Two panelists that didn't like the hand for 3NT in the first place still don't like the hand for offense.

Brad: Pass. I would pass and take the positive score. I imagine my

partner's hand is terrible, with no aces, and a couple of jacks. If my partner had anything at all he would have bid something, because his distribution is almost certainly excellent after hearing my takeout double. He probably has at most one diamond (and my diamond values are wasted and look better on defense). I think it's a red flag that partner stayed quiet when he is known to have great distribution [*excellent point*]. I'm also a little bit worried that we would miss a spade game if my partner has ♠Kxxx ♥T9xx ♦x ♣Axxx.

Nolan: Pass. You have already told partner your hand, if he doesn't want to bid, respect his decision [*if we discount the ♦KQx then we are left with a soft, off shape, 15 HCP, - count me among the passers*].

Finally, one panelist flipped a mental coin and it wouldn't come down.

Roger: Abstain. It's not surprising that we have put ourselves in a position where we have no bid that describes our hand.

A smorgasbord of possible bids: Pass, double, 1♦ and 1♠ would all be the choice of some respected experts. It's important to note that partner is not a passed hand. If partner were passed, 1♠ would look more attractive than it did to the panel. Let's hear from the passers first.

Becca: Pass. Honestly, in a real game I would pass without thinking too hard about this one. I'll enthusiastically support anything partner bids.

Dan: Pass. I mean which options are realistic here? Only pass, double, and 1♦ seem to be that good. My spades are ALMOST good enough to make the 4-card overcall, but even if they were KQJT I don't think I like this bid when I have another longer suit, so I rule that out. 1♦ has pretty few ways to win and a lot of ways to lose too. It could deter my partner from making the winning lead, it can tell the opponents how to play their contract, and it certainly doesn't consume any of their bidding space. I like my 1-level overcalls to be backed either by a reasonable hand or a reasonable suit, and while I'm not too far from the first criterion I'm nowhere near the second. Also consider that almost any hand partner has that generates a game between us is one where he can come into the auction himself. This brings me down to pass and double. Double doesn't strike me as awful, but given that I'm doing it a wee bit light I'd really like to offer my partner 4 cards in both majors. So I'm down to just pass, and I'm happy to go with that.

Some double and think it's aggressive.

Adam: Double. Non-vulnerable in a low-level auction is a good time to be aggressive.

Brad: Double. It's a little light but I would probably not get in trouble with this bid.

Some are a little happier with double.

Elianna: Double. This seems pretty clear. If not double, then pass. I don't really want to bid diamonds, because I don't want partner thinking that's my strong suit, and go after it on lead. I know some people will bid spades, but I am too used to playing opposite partners that like to raise me on doubletons.

Yichi: Double. If my partner complains that I had a 5-card suit, I'll pretend that I mis-sorted my hand. I wouldn't want to play with Jxxxx as a trump suit without 4 card support.

Chien-Yao: Double. Double is the most flexible way to find the best contract we could have. 1♦ overcall is not good because partner would lead diamond if opponents win the contract. 1♠ overcall is also possible, but we might land in the wrong 4-3 fit contract and get the longer trumps tapped.

And some think double is the Baby Bear bid.

Mike: Double. I'm not sure what secrets you are trying to uncover here. It is strong enough to compete, but bidding diamonds would be dumb and 1♠ preempts two other playable strains. Double is the call that is right in front of your nose.

Aaron: Double. I can pass from here to eternity after, and the shape is right to act at these colors.

Yehudit: Double. What's the problem?

Nolan: Double. This is a perfect hand for a double, you have support for both majors and the unbid minor. Also, your points are spread out so any suit will be fine with you.

→

Roger: Double seems perfect. I'm okay with overcalling on chunky 4 card suits, but not with such an attractive alternative available.

When this hand came up in an American team trial several years ago, one player holding these cards passed. The other player holding this hand was Peter Weichsel, and he overcalled 1♦. This looks very wrong to me, for reasons my panelists have already covered. My rank order of the bids is double (I would double at any vulnerability or conditions), 1♠ (Marshall Miles choice, I would guess), pass, with 1♦ being a distant fourth choice (we don't even want a diamond lead). Yet 1♦ was the big winner for a strange reason. The 1♣ opening bidder was Chip Martel, who held AQTxx of diamonds to go along with his six clubs and his very strong hand. Having heard the 1♦ overcall behind him, Martel bid conservatively and missed a slam).

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me that if it worked, it was Hamilton but if it didn't, it was Capelletti. Our friend Lee Barton from Edmonton claims he invented what we know as Smolen, but that Smolen got credit for it because he was better known.

So what conventions are essential? Have you learned all of Barbara Seagram's 25 Bridge Conventions You Should Know? Have you learned her 25 More Bridge Conventions You Should Know? Do you need all of these? I believe you need what you can handle. By that I mean what your memory can handle. If you're anything like me, before a new convention becomes mine and I own it, I forget it at least once. Roger and I try to practice new conventions online or in the local bridge club, but not at a tournament where we have teammates. Bridge Baron (software available from Baron Barclay Bridge Supplies) allows you set the parameters to include the conventions you want to practice and it will spew forth many hands so you can practice bidding the new convention. Bridge Base Online (BBO) also has a bidding room where you

and a partner can practice bidding.

So, what conventions are a must? I think you can do well if you play the eight listed below. I play many more conventions, most of which rarely come up. I asked my husband what his list would be, and we agreed on seven out of eight of them. My list is:

Take out doubles	Negative doubles
Stayman	Jacoby Transfers
New minor forcing	Unusual No Trump
Michaels	Some form of Blackwood

You should sit down with your partner and come to agreement about your conventions. If you don't use and understand the ones on my list, there are resources available to assist you. If you don't have Bridge Baron or Barbara Seagram's books, go to Google. Put the name of the convention in and press enter. Wow! There is lots of help out there. How many new conventions should you add? I think you should add as many as you can handle. By that I mean, how many you can remember. Memory is a problem for many of us however the doctor is always encouraging us to exercise and bridge is exercise for your mind. Have fun.
