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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Summer Nationals

Roger and I just returned home from the 2014 Summer Nationals in Las Vegas. Except for the final Sunday, the weather was typically hot, hot, hot, but the playing sites were well regulated—neither too hot, nor too cold, most of the time.

The tournament ran from Wednesday, July 16, 2014 through Sunday, July 27, 2014. There were a total of 16,616 total tables in play and 237 separate events from which to choose during the week. Players attended from all over the United States, Canada, Mexico and 25 other countries worldwide. 118,695 master points were awarded.

There is something exciting about playing in a National Tournament. There are always many new systems and conventions to hear about and/or learn and bridge talk is universal. "What do you do when you hold AKxxx...etc." There are events geared for players at every level from rank beginners to the world's best, and it is one of the few sports in which novices can play against the top players. To me the best part of the nationals is the opportunity to see friends who live in other states or countries.

I was interested in how District 23 fared in the tournament. This information is easily obtainable on the new ACBL website, but I'm including it here for you. Notable finishers in NABC events were our Grand

National Board Issues

by Rand Pinsky, District Director



In reviewing the Board Journal for Las Vegas I found some items that should be of interest to our general membership and some items that will only be of interest to some of our membership. I will highlight these items in this report.

Please note, as this report is due on July 15 for the August Southern California Bridge News and our board meetings will be over on July 17, some of it may be old news.

The first item of interest is the approval of a new format for collegiate competition where the qualifying will be based on a participation basis and not on a one day online qualifying event. The scholarship will be increased to \$20,000 to be split among the four teams going to the finals. I will support this as anything ACBL can do to promote bridge at the college level can only be a good thing.

The next item is a motion initiated by the Board of Governors which wanted screens to be used for the Flight B GNT at the same time screens are used for the Championship and A Flights. This will give Flight B players experience with screens before they move up to a higher flight and will bring more prestige to the event.

Another item is a motion to increase the entry fees for NABC+ Team Events/Screens. The increase will be \$5/per player per session. This increase will cover the additional costs it takes to use screens at a table. These expenses include more directors, additional playing space, and set up and take down of the room. I support this increase only for the sessions with screens.

One matter that directly impacts me as an ACBL Board Member is a discussion item that all board members must disclose on the annual ACBL Board conflict policy all non-financial matters. Presently we must disclose all financial matters. Adding non-financial matters is appropriate and long overdue.

Finally, the Masterpoint Committee will be

Chris Larsen 1941-2014

Chris Larsen of Laguna Woods passed away on June 23rd. He was 73. For the past number of years he had emphysema, copd, and other pulmonary disorders. which had been getting worse over the past several months, but it never affected his bridge skills.

As far as bridge performance went, Chris was a Grand Life Master with over 14,000 master points. He won the first ever Senior Team World Championship in Paris in 2001 (teammates were Grant Baze, Gene Freed, Gary Hayden, Joe Kivel and John Onstodt). He nearly repeated it the following year in Montreal losing in the finals by only 8 imps. In addition, he had 6 seconds in NABC events. The latest was the Silidor Open Pair in Reno, which he competed in after driving at high altitudes to get there, and becoming hospitalized for two weeks upon his return. In addition, he had over a dozen district 22 Grand National Teams wins, plus a number of other high overall finishes in major NABC events, several with his late wife, Kay.

Chris was a very devoted family man, but apart from that, bridge was his full-time life. Chris was selected as the ACBL's Goodwill Member of the Year in 2009. Even though he was a fierce competitor at the table, he was always the gentleman, never talking down to beginner players, and treating them with respect. He will be missed.

Chris is survived by his 3 sons, and his companion, Salle Martinis.

PARTNERSHIP. In 1992, about a year and a half after I came back to bridge following an absence of some 25 years, I was approached by Stan, one of the more experienced players at our club. He suggested we try playing together. I was flattered... he'd been playing at the club long before I began there, and had substantially more points than I had. Of course, I quickly agreed, and thus began my longest bridge partnership.

We had lots of good results over the next couple of years, at the club and in tournaments. I was learning fast, and my master point total soon surpassed Stan's. Truth be told, I think I was getting quite full of myself. I did not hesitate to let Stan know whenever I felt he had goofed a bid or a play.

One day, playing at a regional event in N.J., Stan messed up a hand... or a bid... whatever, and I really tore into him. Of course, besides being rotten, I was also stupid, because he was so upset that we blew the next two boards.

That evening, at home, I thought about how dreadfully I had behaved, and called Stan to apologize. He was still profoundly upset, and suggested we end our partnership or at least suspend it for a while. That would have broken my heart and I told him so. "Let's go back to the tournament tomorrow" I said, "And you will be playing with a different Marty." With some reluctance, he agreed.

The next morning, we met at the event, and sat down at our table, I placed before me my amended convention card. It was our usual card, with the addition of the letters B L A M, in bold black marker script across the top. Of course, we were asked at virtually every table, "What's BLAM?" My reply, then, and always since, "Behave Like a 'Mensch!'" Mensch, of course, is German/Yiddish. Literally it means man; Colloquially, it means "a decent human being." →

Partnership guide: when you think partner goofed, before saying anything:

A. First consider the possibility, however remote, that **you** might be wrong

B. Having discarded the above, consider that if partner has, in fact, goofed, he may already feel bad enough without you piling on.

After last month's plethora of interesting hands, this month was rather tame. Maybe it was all those boring computer-dealt hands at Bridge Week. Anyway, here goes – you judge whether it was a brilliancy or a luck idiocy. As dealer, vulnerable, playing match points, you pick up ♠Axx ♥KT8x ♦AKx ♣Axx. No problem there; playing Standard, you open 1♦. There is no opposition bidding, and partner responds 1♥. And it's your turn again.

You surely have enough to bid 4♥. If you do, you are likely to play it there. One iconoclast decided to try 2NT, risking a pass if partner responded with a real dog, but leaving room for bigger and better things. Pard comes back with 4♣, ace asking. You show your three aces, and partner signs off in 6NT. Hmmmmmm, you were planning to support the hearts some point, but too late now. Oh well.

Dummy flops with ♠Qx ♥AJxx ♦QJxx ♣Kxx. Like the contract? In 6♥, all you have to do is find the trump queen, since you can ruff your third spade in dummy. Or pitch it on your long diamond, for that matter. Now you need to find the ♠K on side and find the trump queen. Not so good, is it?

But wait: by suppressing your heart holding, you induced LHO to lead... the ♥9! Through strength and up to weakness, I guess. End of problems in the trump suit. Now if the ♠K cooperates... it does, and you score 1440, a cold top. One other pair bid the heart slam, and made it, 1430.

So... was Mr. Wise-Guy 2NT brilliant... or the →

second coming of the Rueful Rabbit? (With perhaps a little Mr. Smug mixed in...)

You, South, hold: ♠Q953 ♥74 ♦AJT8 ♣Q64
What call do you make?

Mealymouth: 4♠. How much easier this auction would be if, instead of holding a gun to my head and insisting that we play 1♣ as Stayman, my partner had agreed to play bridge, in which case I could have responded 1♦. Now I must guess whether we belong in diamonds, spades, or notrumps. I'll guess to bid 4♠, hoping partner's major suits are ♠AK6 and ♥8 rather than ♠K86 and ♥A. Dare partner have bid 3♠ with any poorer support when my suits might have been ♠5432 and ♦AJT876543? (I'm crediting partner with ♦KQxx for his reverse.)

Meyerson: 4♦.

Kantar: 4♣. After this I play 4♦ is keycard and 4NT, if not the next step, asks for specific kings. Partner should be able to work out where to land.

Wittes: 4♣. Partner could have as good as ♠AKx ♥x ♦KQxx ♣AKxxx, in which case slam is nearly a laydown. Even if partner holds something like ♠AJx

♥x ♦KQxx ♣AKJxx, slam is going to be on little more than a spade finesse.

Bell: 4♣. It was criminal not to raise clubs at my previous turn. I always suspect a 1♣ opening and a 2♦ reverse may not contain four diamonds. Now, I hope partner can recover.

Swanson: 4♣, almost good enough for 5♣. For that descriptive call I would like the spade king rather than the queen.

Does a reverse promise four cards in the reverse suit? Not in my partnerships! Too many hands are impossible to describe if you can't reverse into a three card suit (occasionally even two). A reverse should promise five cards in the opening bid suit. We raised diamonds, now it's time to show club support. Like Swanson, I think the decision is 4♣ or the more encouraging 5♣. I like 4♣.

What call do you make?

Swanson: 3NT. Four losers in spades opposite many favorable vulnerability preempts is a distinct possibility.

Kantar: 5♠. Bid six if your spades can play opposite a singleton, KQxxxxx = no, KQJxxxx = yes.

Bell: 5♠. I'm not sure what partner will consider as good trump, but I want to be in slam opposite as little as KQJxxx. I would like to have more room to explore a better fit, but sometimes partner preempts you.

Wittes: 5♠. Even at this vulnerability, I would not expect partner to have a total dog in first seat. 5♠ should say I have everything else under control. Do you have a suit that rates to make a slam opposite a singleton?

Mealymouth: 4♣. At first I thought to bid 5♠, hoping that partner would take it as an invitation to 6♠ hinging on the quality of partner's suit. However, with so many players nowadays trying to shut out and steal from opponents when woefully weak instead of seeking to reach their own good games and slams, partner is too likely to read 5♠ as "continuing the preempt" (and shouldn't it be?), I must reject 5♠. To try for 6♠, therefore, I'll start with 4♣, which partner will know is forcing, and bid 5♠ over his anticipated 4♠ rebid. Now he'll surely take 5♠ as invitational, and as a bonus, we may reach 6♣ when partner has some 7=1=1=4 hand. Second choice: a timid 4♠. Not 4NT, even if playing some form of Roman Key-Card Blackwood, which would that risk confusion after a 5♣ or 5♦ reply (even players as able as Marshall Miles and Mark Bartusek might forget whether they play standard or "1430" replies.) [This is a reference to Marshall's

preference to play different Blackwood responses depending on what suit was trump, which hand had shown more values, and which hand did the asking. It amounted to a lot of rules that could occasionally get the partnership off track. Mark might have been the only one of Marshall's partners who consented to his full set of rules.] Nobody I know has adopted the "Jack Ask" published in The Bridge World several years ago, and here the difference between ♠KQ76542 and ♠KQJ6542 is crucial.

Meyerson: 4♣. If 4♣ is keycard I'll try that (bidding slam in spades opposite two, or one with queen). If not, 4NT opposite most partners (same plan). If partner is John Jones I bid 4♠ and hope spades break well enough that we can make it. [Making fun of the moderator's wide-range preempts ...grrrrr].

Mealymouth has a good point about 5♠ being a preemptive bid for many partnerships in today's aggressive world. I agree that after a natural 4♣, 5♠ asks good trumps. Meyerson is correct that 4♣ is modified Keycard for many expert partnerships, including most of mine. A Keycard 4♣ does even better on this hand than a natural 4♣. It allows stopping at 4♠ when slam is hopeless, and having a 5♠ bid available as a jack of trumps ask.

This is the only problem from this month's set that is a real table problem. The problem occurred in the Monday Caltech game and neither partnership had much in terms of agreements. One bidder went low in 4♠. His counterpart aggressively tried Keycard, getting to 6♠. Partner had ♠AQ8xxxx, so slam was under 50%, but luck was with them. It's better to be lucky than good!

What call do you make?

Bell: Pass. There are so many different hands partner could have and I don't have enough to bid opposite some, so I'll be content with a presumed plus score. Hearts isn't an option since partner could easily have a solid diamond suit and shortness in hearts.

Mealymouth: Pass. My partner is a genius who realized that the notrumps had to be played from his side holding ♠K108 ♥A ♦KQJT963 ♣Q2, lest a singleton club lead wreck 3NT when played from my

side.

Kantar: Pass. I refuse to torture myself any longer over this one. It seems like transfers are the best way to play over this.

Meyerson: Pass. Partner could have many unbalanced hands (long diamonds, for example) and also a wide range of values. We are also due some bad breaks (LHO will be very short in clubs) and 3NT may well outscore 4♥ even if partner has a fit.

Swanson: 4♦, transfer, to be followed by 4NT. 3NT, in any position, after an opponent's three-level preempt has a wide range. I have sufficient controls and potential winners to risk the four-level. There are some sophisticated conventions available in this situation (such as TONTO), but I am contents to use 'system on'. A transfer into the opponents is shortness. *[TONTO is Transfers Over No Trump Overcalls. It's better than system on, but more complex. TONTO would play 4♣ as a transfer to hearts. The antithesis of TONTO is natural, no transfers at all. The esteemed John Sutherlin calls playing no transfers "The Lone Ranger".]*

Wittes: 4♦. Playing with Grabel, we play slam invitational transfers over 3NT overcalls. Partner can bid 4♥ accepting or bid 4♠ (keycard) or bid 4NT if his 3NT bid was based on a long running diamond suit, a few side cards, and no heart fit.

I like transferring to hearts and then bidding 4NT quantitative. I wouldn't transfer if I didn't have enough to bid again because hearts could easily be the wrong strain. I think those aces are huge if partner has a long diamond suit.

Swanson: Pass, intending to bid clubs on the next round. 1NT now is possible, but I want to emphasize clubs. I don't expect clubs to run in a notrump contract.

Bell: Pass. I'll have an opportunity to bid when the auction comes back around and I can show clubs naturally.

Meyerson: Pass. I think 2♣ is a strength-showing call here and not a suit. I can back in later with 2♣ or double if it seems right.

Kantar: Pass. Bid clubs later if possible. This problem needs a prior agreement. You don't want to throw 2♣ at partner without one.

Mealymouth: 2♣. Trusting partner to know that it

cannot be anything but natural, as the only Alphonse-Gaston ("You take it, Alphonse!"---"No, you take it Gaston!") Cue Bid is 2♥ (which cannot show hearts, as a double of 1♥ would show hearts). *[Double of a new suit response after a takeout double should be penalties. This is necessary to prevent psychs.]*

Wittes: 3♣. This should be natural and invitational.

Kantar sent me an email and said that this problem needs a partnership agreement. This is certainly correct. Meyerson stated specifically that he thinks 2♣ is artificial. The other panelists who passed are avoiding the theoretical question, because this hand is strong enough to bid 3♣ next time. I am with the club bidders here. 2♣ and 3♣ should both be natural. I prefer 3♣.

Swanson: Pass. With some partners a minor suit three-level preempt at these colors promises the world - in this case seven tricks. With others, not so much. Without discussion I keep quiet and hope the preempt has done good work for our side.

Meyerson: Pass. Not enough clubs to raise, too much defense to psych. Redouble is a possibility at MP (trying to get partner to cooperate on a penalty double) but at IMPs it's pushy to double them for a one-trick set. 3NT is possible but seven solid clubs are a 1♣ opening *[for a Gambling 3NT for pairs that play it]* so my odds don't seem great.

Kantar: Pass. I can always bid 3NT later. If I bid it later, I am showing doubt about clubs, otherwise why didn't I bid it directly?

Bell: 4♣. I have just enough to be willing to defend at the four level, so I'll try to push them there. I considered a lead-directing 3♦, but some partners can't take a joke.

Wittes: 3NT. I would take a chance and bid 3NT. It may not make, depending on partner's club suit, but with a likely spade lead, it probably will have a play. Second choice would be to pass.

Mealymouth: 3NT. At this vulnerability, I expect partner to have seven tricks for his three-bid. Surely I can supply two. I won't pussyfoot around with a redouble or anything else, for if the opponents have a profitable save, I want them to have to guess which suit to bid at the four-level instead of letting one bid at the three-level and the other then raise to four.

I like redouble, activating partner. If he doubles the opponents, he will be right.
