The Long Haul Starts Here

Forty percent of the Round Robin matches are now completed. **India** are heading the standings in three of the four events - it is just the Women Teams where they are behind the leaders. They had a fantastic session in the Open Teams scoring 57 VPs out of a possible 60. They are already more than a match ahead of second-placed **UAE** but there is still plenty to play for as four teams go forward to the semi-finals. **Bangladesh** are only eight VPs behind **India** in the Senior Teams with **Pakistan** in third, **UAE** and **Jordan** are within a point of each other contesting the fourth semi-final berth. **UAE** top the Women Team with **Jordan** half a match behind and **India** have a similar lead over **Jordan** in the Mixed Team but **UAE** are still in the hunt in third place, less than nine points adrift.

Make sure you alert all bids that require it - one team had a 1 VP procedural penalty today, make sure you are not the next.

Seniors please note (see page 11) there will be an adjustment to the score at the end of the Round Robin



Round Up

Day 1

decided to look at a couple of deals that did not make it into one of my reports yesterday. The very first deal in the Seniors Team produced some 'interesting' results.

Board 1. Dealer North. None Vul.



The first surprise was that at one table the deal was passed out. The next had this auction.


Did West really pass over Two Spades? He has a ninth trump and a singleton opposite an opening bid, a monster hand, I would have cue-bid Three Spades. However his Pass over Four Spades was masterful as we shall see from his defence because the damage would have been even worse had he risked doubling a contract that should fail by three tricks. The lead of the jack of hearts was overtaken by East and a second high honour cashed. East now gave up on taking the contract off three by returning a trump, I am not sure what the cunning plan behind this was, but declarer drew trumps finishing in hand. A diamond persuaded West to rise with his ace and looking at the cards remaining in his hand he had a choice of cashing a club honour to beat the contract or give a ruff and discard by leading a heart. I will leave it to you, dear reader, to guess which choice was made. Why did East overtake the initial lead? Had he left it West may well have worked out that East had a singleton diamond, after all North's Double probably shows four diamonds, there are five in dummy and three in his hand and when I use my state of the art calculator I surmise that East has a

singleton so if I cash the ace I can give partner a ruff and I can get back in with a club to give a second ruff.

At the other tables, no one came close to reaching the pretty solid slam, only in one case did East splinter over West's opening bid of One Heart and then West subsided into Four Hearts. If there was no interference from North I think bidding Two Clubs then jumping in Hearts gets the message across about a maximum passed hand and maybe then there is a chance of going further.

This hand comes from the second match in the first Round Robin of the Open Teams

Board 25. Dealer North. E/W Vul.



At all tables the contract of Six Spades was reached. Three times when played by North East led the singleton eight of diamonds handing declarer the contract at trick one. In one case declarer at trick two declarer cashed the ace of diamonds and played another only to see it ruffed by East and with the club king offside and no squeeze he was down. The contract comes down to the diamond suit: the two methods used by declarers on this hand was to cash the ace and king and lead a third round, the other is to take the diamond finesse after cashing the king. Both of these work when diamonds are 3-3 or West had the doubleton queen. Cashing the ace and king guard against doubleton queen in the East hand whereas the finesse guards against any queen in the West hand and that is at least twice as likely, if anyone wishes to correspond with me about how I calculated that I will glad to explain in long and dreary detail. There is also another prime reason for taking the finesse, if it fails and the diamonds are not 3-3 you still have the club finesse in reserve. If you play three rounds of diamonds and you are unlucky they can immediately cash a second diamond and then you would look foolish if the club finesse was right all along.

General Instructions

1. Home & Visiting teams

When you log in to the RealBridge game (using the game link), you will find your team name written on one of the Tables.

All team members are required to sit at their table (all together / all team at same table) in Pairs N/S and E/W, later on, when we start the session, the software will automatically move the E/W pairs between the tables according to the schedule of play.

In the schedule of play you will find Home team (the team mentioned first) and Visiting team (the team mentioned second)

NO LINE-UP will be needed from the teams, the visiting team has to sit first at their table (in Pairs N/S and E/W), minimum 10 min before the official start time, and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.

2. Time delay and hesitation

It is very important to know that the TDs have the tools to produce a board report which includes the time for each bid / play by each player, so please be bare that in mind when calling the TD for a possible hesitation or before denying it.

It is also very important to know that the TDs also have the tools to produce a session time report which includes the exact time taken by each player in a session, in case of time delay, the penalty will be given according to this report.

3. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

It is strongly recommended that each player has his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play

Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.

Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.

You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD

4. Kibitzers

Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at the playing venue or the RealBridge online playing room.

All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.

All the matches will be broadcasted via RealBridge kibitzer website...

At the RealBridge kibitzer website, you can find the live broadcasted matches and also all the other matches scheduled for broadcast.

For security reasons, all broadcasted matches will be delayed by 30-45 min.

5. Smoking, Eating and Alcohol, Mobile and electronic devices

We must act as if we were playing these championships "live", therefore, the following is strictly forbidden during play:

Mobile phones and any other electronic devices, Mobile phones will be collected and there will be a regular check each session by the monitor.

Eating (even if only biscuits) or Drinking Alcohol

Smoking

Going to the WC without permission

Talking loudly during or at the end of any board if the player is unhappy about his/her partner's bid, hand play or defence.

The 21st BFAME Championship will start Wednesday 8th December, we would like to stress on some important points.

Play Format

Open & Senior Teams: 6 teams (BAN, IND, JOR, PAK, KSA & UAE)

All teams will play 3 complete Round Robin, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first and second Round Robin will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The third Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 2 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 4 teams will qualify to the Semi-Final stage which will be as follows:

The top ranked team after the 3 complete Round Robin stage will chose its opponent in the semi-final match; opponent must be one of the teams ranked 3rd or 4th and the remaining 2 teams will play against each other

.The semi-final match will be played in 4 Sessions, 16 boards each in IMPs.

The final match between the semi-final winners will be played in 2 Sessions, 16 Boards each.

In all the knock out stages, there shall be a carry-over of only 0.5 IMP to the team who scored more VPs in the Round Robin stage.

The team ranked higher after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semi-final match.

The team ranked lower after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the Semi-Final match.

The team ranked higher after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final.

Women Teams: 4 Teams (IND, JOR, PAL & UAE)

All teams will play 5 complete Round Robins, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first 4 Round Robins will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The last Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 4 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 2 teams will qualify to World championship and will play the final between each other on DEC. 13th, to determine the title winner.

Mixed Teams: 4 Teams (IND, JOR, PAK & UAE)

All teams will play 5 complete Round Robins, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first 4 Round Robins will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The last Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 4 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 2 teams will qualify to World championship and will play the final between each other on DEC. 13th, to determine the title winner.

Special Online Policies

1. General

All players must be present at the playing spot determined by the local NBO and approved by BFAME and will play under the supervision of a monitor appointed by the BFAME in agreement with the local NBO.

WBF 20 VP "continues scale" will be used in the RR Stage

KO stage-if any - will be calculated in IMPs

Butler ranking will be posted after each RR session.

In the event that there is confusion, lack of clarity, or a difference in the interpretation of one of the technical clauses in these regulations, the interpretation of the Head TD is the final interpretation of this confusion / wording.

In the event there is confusion, lack of clarity, or a difference in the interpretation of one of the non-technical items in these regulations, the interpretation of the Chairman of the organizing Committee shall be final interpretation of this confusion / wording.

Playing with mobile phones are completely restricted, only Laptops / tablets shall be allowed.

It is the responsibility of each NBO to provide a good and stable internet connection in the playing area for the players, BFAME monitor, BFAME Officials and BFAME IT.

Two Surveillance cameras with an internet connection and zoom capability controlled by the TD will be placed inside the playing area to monitor it.

It is the responsibility of each NBO to provide playing table's screens in the playing area, in case needed by the appointed monitor.

2. Alert

All ALERTABLE bids must be self-alerted (press the alert button before making the bid). And give a full writing disclosure of the bidding, vocal explanation won't be taken into the TD consideration.

NOTE: - Players will not be allowed to alert their partner's bid, only self-alert will be allowed and the written explanation will be shown to both opponents but not to partner.

3. Undo

Undoes are allowed only during bidding and according to the followings:

The undo button is activated from the beginning.

Click the undo button to stop the bidding.

Call the TD

No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.

The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not, the TD will accept only the obvious miss-click requests but not the change of mind requests.

The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.

If the opponents accept—before the TD arrival - , bidding continue. but all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.


If the opponents don't accept–before the TD arrival -, bidding stops and the TD decide what is to be done.

The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.

Undo is not allowed under any circumstances during playing the deals and if a player request an undo during play, the TD has to be summoned immediately to take an action and he might adjust the score.

fter two matches not much can be read into the score, but since I wished to report on a Mixed Team I chose Jordan as they were at the top of the standings, but the UAE were not far behind.



By now most of you will know my opinion of doubles on hands such as West's, particularly when vulnerable. I suspect the earth shuddered when North doubled One Spade for penalties but South was oblivious to her partner's wishes. On best defence the contract fails by three tricks. It is an interesting defensive problem. The ending could well come down to



With West on lead and if he plays ace and jack of spades North must unblock a high honour on the ace and then duck the jack!!! If not West will make two club tricks, but if North ducks then West must play clubs from hand and thus South gets the lead and can cash a heart, so by ducking the defence gives up one trick but makes two clubs and a heart instead of just one club.


In 3NT after a diamond lead declarer minded his work as he knew where the majority of points were situated and so West was continually under pressure of what to lead when he won a trick, but an escape for West–will the lesson be learnt about doubles?

In this room West kept his powder dry and refrained from entering the auction so South had little or no information as to the distribution of the opponents' cards. The club lead went to declarer's queen and a spade led towards dummy allowing the queen to win. The ten of hearts ran to the king and West cleared the club suit. Declarer now played for either the jack of hearts to drop or the diamonds to break 3-3, unfortunately neither of these possibilities came to pass and so the contract failed, ten IMPs to Jordan.


The contract can be beaten but not after the lead of the queen of hearts, but 110 is scant reward compared to 800.

Well bid. On the lead of the four of diamonds declarer won in dummy with the ace. The ace of clubs was followed by seven of clubs to the king exposing the unfavourable trump split. The ace of hearts was cashed and a small one ruffed with


the jack but when the ♣9 was led South refused to cover and now declarer was marooned in dummy and so ungracefully failed by a trick. To succeed at trick three lead the nine of clubs to hand and now you do not have the entry problem. It is a play that cannot cost. Of course you could ruff a heart before tackling trumps and that would succeed as well in a much simpler fashion.

I am not sure if either side knew who was sacrificing against whom as there is no game contract available for either pair. The auction screams for a trump lead and continuation (where else is declarer making tricks?) which should lead to a four trick defeat but the defence started with the ace of clubs, this should now allow declarer to escape for two off but the end game defeated declarer and an unnecessary trick was lost.

A seemingly reasonable auction to a no-hope contract and with the trumps breaking 3-0 it was two off and so 12 IMPs to UAE. At the end of a session where the score could have been mightily different in either direction an honourable draw was the result and ten VPs to each team.

Note from Head TD

In the Senior Teams in the first match of the first Round Robin Saudi Arabia withdrew against India. This has been scored as 12-0, however this score may well change depending on how both teams perform over the rest of the Round Robins. The score will be updated at the end of the second Round Robin and published in the Bulletin but be aware they could change further when all the Round Robins are completed. The rules for such adjustments are repeated below.

According to the conditions of contest

-The team in forfeit shall score zero Victory Points and zero IMPs for that match. The team winning the forfeited match will receive the best score between:

- (a) 12 VP using the 20-0 VP continues scale, or the equivalent according to the VP scale adopted,
 - (b) The team's average
- (c) The average score obtained by all the other opponents against the team at fault.

Whichever is the greater.
