Mixed and Women Teams Chosen

Firstly congratulations to **India** who triumphed in all four Round Robin events.

In the Women Team, **India** and **UAE** are qualified to represent BFAME at the world championships to be held in Salsamaggiore early next year. Likewise **India** and **Jordan** qualified in the Mixed Team. Both these events will have a 32 board final tomorrow to crown the BFAME champions.

In the Open Team an amazing performance by **India** saw them lead the table by more than three matches, **UAE** came second with **Pakistan** and **Jordan** finishing third and fourth respectively. These four teams will play a 64 board semi-final to determine which two teams head for the world championships and then a 32 board final to determine the champions.

In the Senior, who will have a similar schedule to the Open, we saw **India** win ahead of **Pakistan** with **Bangladesh** and **Jordan** taking the other two semi-final places. One cannot but have sympathy for **UAE** who were playing **Jordan** in the very last match and with four boards to play they held the fourth spot but **Jordan** came back with a slam swing to steal the fourth position at the eleventh hour.



The only event where there is a real uncertainty as to who will qualify for the World Championships, so I am going to report on the current leader–UAE–playing Jordan. A substantial win for either team could see them well placed for a berth to Salsamaggiore.


To beat the contract South has to get North on lead to push a heart through. To achieve this he needs to lead a small club! Unlikely unless he has a direct line to the Great Shuffler. As expected the lead was a the king of clubs and East should duck this so as North cannot win a trick but she rose with the ace. Declarer then took a losing trump finesse. South again needs to play his partner for the jack of clubs but she cashed the club king and so when the diamonds broke 3-3 and the trumps 2-2 declarer brought the contract home.

While technically 44 can be beaten but as we have seen it is quite likely to succeed so why did the bidding die at the one-level, both parties were slightly reticent but it meant ten IMPs to Jordan.


East led a heart won by declarer's king. Five rounds of clubs were cashed, East discarding two hearts and a spade, declarer now elected to exit with a heart and after East cashed two tricks he took his ace of diamonds and declarer now had nine tricks.

Two hearts was not alerted, but what could South do, I could find nothing about this situation in the convention card but to pass with an eight count opposite a strong no-trump does not seem the optimum strategy. Two hearts drifted two off but it was ten IMPs to UAE.


On the lead of the queen of diamonds declarer played with a straight bat right down the middle of the pitch and drew trumps cashed his winners and ruffed a club for ten easy tricks.

Declarer fell asleep at the wheel and when she received a club lead took only two rounds of trumps and then cashed the other club honour and was quickly disabused of her contract when she tried to ruff a club with the nine to watch in horror as North overruffed and the contract now one down. Ten IMPs to Jordan.


I do not like East's 4♠ bid, I know he is minimum but still has an excellent hand in support of spades, my bid would have been Pass, partner then redoubles to show first round club control, you cue-bid in diamonds, she in hearts and after 4♠ from you she can bid on or pass as she sees fit. Declarer won the opening diamond lead and played ace of hearts and ruffed another, drew trumps in two rounds finishing in hand and hoped the queen of hearts would fall, no cigar and so the contract the contract failed. The chances of the hearts coming good for four tricks with one ruff is slightly over 50%, so not a hopeless slam but it also required the trumps to behave so that reduces its chances.

I suspect West was probably the most surprised when the contract came home and it was worth ten IMPs to India. Another high-scoring encounter 47-33 to India or 13.75-6.25 VPs.

General Instructions

1. Home & Visiting teams

When you log in to the RealBridge game (using the game link), you will find your team name written on one of the Tables.

All team members are required to sit at their table (all together / all team at same table) in Pairs N/S and E/W, later on, when we start the session, the software will automatically move the E/W pairs between the tables according to the schedule of play.

In the schedule of play you will find Home team (the team mentioned first) and Visiting team (the team mentioned second)

NO LINE-UP will be needed from the teams, the visiting team has to sit first at their table (in Pairs N/S and E/W), minimum 10 min before the official start time, and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.

2. Time delay and hesitation

It is very important to know that the TDs have the tools to produce a board report which includes the time for each bid / play by each player, so please be bare that in mind when calling the TD for a possible hesitation or before denying it.

It is also very important to know that the TDs also have the tools to produce a session time report which includes the exact time taken by each player in a session, in case of time delay, the penalty will be given according to this report.

3. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

It is strongly recommended that each player has his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play

Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.

Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.

You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD

4. Kibitzers

Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at the playing venue or the RealBridge online playing room.

All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.

All the matches will be broadcasted via RealBridge kibitzer website...

At the RealBridge kibitzer website, you can find the live broadcasted matches and also all the other matches scheduled for broadcast.

For security reasons, all broadcasted matches will be delayed by 30-45 min.

5. Smoking, Eating and Alcohol, Mobile and electronic devices

We must act as if we were playing these championships "live", therefore, the following is strictly forbidden during play:

Mobile phones and any other electronic devices, Mobile phones will be collected and there will be a regular check each session by the monitor.

Eating (even if only biscuits) or Drinking Alcohol

Smoking

Going to the WC without permission

Talking loudly during or at the end of any board if the player is unhappy about his/her partner's bid, hand play or defence.

The 21st BFAME Championship will start Wednesday 8th December, we would like to stress on some important points.

Play Format

Open & Senior Teams: 6 teams (BAN, IND, JOR, PAK, KSA & UAE)

All teams will play 3 complete Round Robin, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first and second Round Robin will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The third Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 2 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 4 teams will qualify to the Semi-Final stage which will be as follows:

The top ranked team after the 3 complete Round Robin stage will chose its opponent in the semi-final match; opponent must be one of the teams ranked 3rd or 4th and the remaining 2 teams will play against each other

.The semi-final match will be played in 4 Sessions, 16 boards each in IMPs.

The final match between the semi-final winners will be played in 2 Sessions, 16 Boards each.

In all the knock out stages, there shall be a carry-over of only 0.5 IMP to the team who scored more VPs in the Round Robin stage.

The team ranked higher after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in sessions 2 and 4 in the Semi-final match.

The team ranked lower after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in sessions 1 and 3 in the Semi-Final match.

The team ranked higher after the Round Robin stage will be the Home team in session 2 in the Final.

Women Teams: 4 Teams (IND, JOR, PAL & UAE)

All teams will play 5 complete Round Robins, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first 4 Round Robins will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The last Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 4 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 2 teams will qualify to World championship and will play the final between each other on DEC. 13th, to determine the title winner.

Mixed Teams: 4 Teams (IND, JOR, PAK & UAE)

All teams will play 5 complete Round Robins, 15 matches in 5 days from 8-12 DEC.

The first 4 Round Robins will be done according to pre-defined draw by the OC.

The last Round Robin will be done according to the team rank in the previous played 4 Round Robins.

After the Round Robin stage, the top 2 teams will qualify to World championship and will play the final between each other on DEC. 13th, to determine the title winner.

Special Online Policies

1. General

All players must be present at the playing spot determined by the local NBO and approved by BFAME and will play under the supervision of a monitor appointed by the BFAME in agreement with the local NBO.

WBF 20 VP "continues scale" will be used in the RR Stage

KO stage-if any - will be calculated in IMPs

Butler ranking will be posted after each RR session.

In the event that there is confusion, lack of clarity, or a difference in the interpretation of one of the technical clauses in these regulations, the interpretation of the Head TD is the final interpretation of this confusion / wording.

In the event there is confusion, lack of clarity, or a difference in the interpretation of one of the non-technical items in these regulations, the interpretation of the Chairman of the organizing Committee shall be final interpretation of this confusion / wording.

Playing with mobile phones are completely restricted, only Laptops / tablets shall be allowed.

It is the responsibility of each NBO to provide a good and stable internet connection in the playing area for the players, BFAME monitor, BFAME Officials and BFAME IT.

Two Surveillance cameras with an internet connection and zoom capability controlled by the TD will be placed inside the playing area to monitor it.

It is the responsibility of each NBO to provide playing table's screens in the playing area, in case needed by the appointed monitor.

2. Alert

All ALERTABLE bids must be self-alerted (press the alert button before making the bid). And give a full writing disclosure of the bidding, vocal explanation won't be taken into the TD consideration.

NOTE: - Players will not be allowed to alert their partner's bid, only self-alert will be allowed and the written explanation will be shown to both opponents but not to partner.

3. Undo

Undoes are allowed only during bidding and according to the followings:

The undo button is activated from the beginning.

Click the undo button to stop the bidding.

Call the TD

No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.

The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not, the TD will accept only the obvious miss-click requests but not the change of mind requests.

The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.

If the opponents accept—before the TD arrival - , bidding continue. but all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.


If the opponents don't accept–before the TD arrival -, bidding stops and the TD decide what is to be done.

The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.

Undo is not allowed under any circumstances during playing the deals and if a player request an undo during play, the TD has to be summoned immediately to take an action and he might adjust the score.

oping for a quiet end to a busy and tiring day I decided to watch India against Pakistan in the Open Teams. I think you will find my wish was not granted.


I thought we were playing Teams and not Pairs so I cannot understand North's desire to play in notrumps, it is not as though it is his partner who would be playing the heart contract. Surely South's cue-bid of 44 shows a singleton, he also has a singleton in partner's longest suit—these do not seem reasons to play in no-trumps rather than a suit. The difference between the two contracts is that one can make and one cannot. And I suspect, dear reader, that you are not surprised that bit is the no-trump contract which fails. Six Hearts is not laydown (in fact not a good contract) and requires some good card-reading and some fortune but 6NT needs a lot, lot more and if 6NT is making then so is Six Hearts and with a lot less worry and stress.

A much more sedate auction arriving at a reasonable contract. West led the unbid suit, a diamond and when dummy played low East inserted the jack and declarer won with his queen. The two top club honours were cashed which got rid of one of declarer's diamonds, the \$\Delta J\$ followed and away went the other diamond. West won and continued with diamonds but declarer ruffed and when the trump finesse succeeded he had twelve tricks. Who would have thought looking at the four hands that declarer would make twelve tricks and the one he lost was a club. First blood to Pakistan and eleven IMPs.



I will wager a small sum that not every East will pass quietly with that hand, but the green card is what gets my vote. A heart was led and the defence took the first three tricks with the ace of hearts and two top diamonds. When the trumps broke 2-2 declarer very quickly had ten tricks and his game.

Maybe South did not have a red card in his bidding box. The carnage of 3NT doubled is four off or 1100. Somehow North seemed to think that West had length in spades and took a losing finesse and so managed to go one down and give eleven IMPs back to India.



Whilst a rebid by West of 3♦ may not be absolutely forcing it paints a more accurate picture of the hand and maybe you have a chance of progressing past 3NT. Even with the actual auction West does have nine tricks in his hand and could ne consider a further bid, perhaps of 4♦? Whatever the possibilities there may have been in the auction declarer took his eleven top tricks after a club lead.

There is one fundamental flaw in opening the West hand is that it is almost certain that partner will play the hand. Having accepted that inconvenience the opening bid does get the essence of the hand across to partner, who in this case has little difficulty in going on to the slam. On the lead of a heart declarer could establish the spades simply for the overtrick. Declarer won the opening heart lead with the ace and cashed a top trump, noting the fall of the jack. He now cashed two top spades and ruffed one high. This catered for a 4-2 spade break as the ◆10 was an additional entry to dummy if required. Obviously on a non-club lead it is a very good contract but what about an initial club. The slam is still over 50% as there is the chance of the ♠Q being singleton or doubleton and if that does not arrive then the king of hearts may be onside. The successful bidding of the slam was worth ten IMPs to India.

It appears as though there was some confusion as to which bids were actually Blackwood but no harm was done as a good contract was reached. North led the ace of clubs and continued with the king which was ruffed in dummy. A small diamond to the ace brought the ♦10 from South. A knowledge of restricted choice and the play in the club suit persuaded declarer to play North for four trumps and so he successfully finessed against the jack in North's hand. He then came to hand with the queen of spades to draw the last trump and then staked all on the spades breaking, and as we can see, that failed to materialise so bad luck, or was it? Watch what happens if you cash the ace and king of hearts before returning to hand to extract the last trump. What does South do? He is the sole guardian of the major suits and if West keeps a count of the heart suit the contract falls into his lap. Now it was not very likely that there would be a squeeze but if you do not prepare for it you cannot benefit from it.

When South led a heart into declarer's tenace it solved his problems and in spite of the bad breaks he only had one loser in each suit and so he made his game contract and gained twelve IMPs for India

Did North believe there might a game for his side and/or did he believe that the opponents had game and if so were they going to bid it. There is an old adage that the pre-emptor never speaks again. Four Diamonds would fail by three tricks. You have described your hand, it is now up to partner to decide what to do. The defence started with the ten of diamonds taken by the ace. A heart towards the king saw East take he ace and continue the diamond attack. Declarer ruffed in hand and played queen and another heart ruffed in dummy. A club from dummy to the king held the trick and dropped the ten from East. All declarer needed to do now was to play another club to pin the jack and claim his contract but a heart was played, perhaps with the idea that West held all the remaining trumps, but if that was the case he was in for a severe bruising so go for gold. To compound North's misery when the heart was ruffed by East's jack he overruffed with the queen and played ace another spade which he ruffed in hand. When he led a trump he only made one of the last four tricks, yes if the last two outstanding trumps had been split 1-1 he would have made his contract but in what universe would East have another trump when he had played the jack and ten previously, no lead a heart and graciously accept one off. Of course, most of this disquisition would not have been necessary if East had made the obvious, well obvious to me, lead of a trump.






UAE vs. Jordan




