From The Washington Post by Don Colburn. Playing bridge may bid up your immunity. "New findings suggest that brainy card games such as contract bridge may at least temporarily raise production of a key blood cell involved in fighting off illness. After 90 minutes of play, bridge players had increased levels of immune cells.....

Marian Cleeves Diamond, a neuroscientist the University of California, Berkeley, presented the findings at the annual meeting of the Society for Neuroscience in New Orleans. Diamond studied bridge players from a California Women's bridge club. She chose bridge players because the game involves skills stimulating a part of the brain called the dorsolateral cortex, part of the frontal lobe that earlier animal research suggests may play a role in the immune system.

Contract bridge is an ideal activity to study in humans, Diamond said. Bridge players must plan ahead, use working memory, show initiative, sort cards and keep many items in sequence – mental challenges involving the dorsolateral cortex.

The new findings are based on blood samples drawn before, and after 90 minutes of bridge from 12 players...... Afterward, the blood samples showed a rise in levels of white blood cells called T cells, which are produced by the thymus gland and deployed by the immune system against viruses and other threats. The T cell count jumped significantly in eight of the bridge players, slightly in the other four."

So there you have it folks!!! Not only are we bridge players at lower risk for Alzheimer's, but also immune disorders!!! *Positive proof* I think that we all need to play *more Bridge*!!!

Director's Note: In talking to a director after an evening Open game, the director made the observation that a certain hand was bid to a sound 6 Diamond contract, but after a couple rounds that same hand was being bid to 6 NT and making due to the favorable lie of cards. A few weeks later it had been noticed that pairs were bidding close games and finding deadly opening leads late in the game that were generally not being found earlier in the evening. Maybe curious, and maybe not so curious! After round 4 at table 5 near the coffee pot, an EW pair was engaged in lively analysis of all 3 boards played that round, and the light dawns. Remember: Allowing other pairs

to avoid your mistakes is not very likely to enhance your game, and constantly arguing or analyzing that allows other pairs to do better than the pair you are currently playing against is unethical. In either case, if you consistently overrun your time each round, expect to have the director take action.
