September is Club Championship Month. During July and August we ran the NAOP games as our special games and saved all our club Championships-all 8 of them-for September. Make sure you get your favorite partner out for these. No extra sanction fee-just the Championship points!!

A Unit Game will be held on Tuesday Evening September 17th. Entry is \$9/pair.

Yes!!! We will be holding the scheduled games over Labor day weekend including Labor Day. There will be no games on the last weekend, Sept 27-29 because of the Aiken Sectional.

<u>Spotlight event for September</u> is the September 12th *Instant Matchpoints* game. Preduplicated. Analysis books. Beat the pros on hands from European and World Championships. My favorite event, looking forward to it all year.

We will be completing a series game on Monday nights on the first two Mondays of September. We will be starting a Series event for Tuesday night players on Tuesday September 10th. The event will run 6 weeks with two categories, over and under 1500 points. Prizes will be free plays for the first three finishers. 5 for first, 4 for second and 3 for third in each category. Use your four best percentage games, each with a different partner for your best score. If you play with the same partner more than once during the event, your first percentage score will be used.

Warning on open containers: I'm not the only one who's had to clean the fridge (and all those individual cans) because some one left an open can of pop on the top shelf. Some one comes along and shoves something into the shelf and the can goes over making a cold, sticky mess.

Don't do that anymore!!

Some have been asking about failure to alert and misinformation on alerts. I can't believe how many of these calls I'm getting lately. 1) If there is a failure to alert or misinformation by the pair on defense, say nothing until the play of the hand is completed. Then inform declarer of the omission or misinformation. If you inform Declarer (and thus your partner on defense) before the play of the hand is completed, that IS unauthorized information. 2) If Declarer or Dummy failed to alert or gave misinformation, inform the defense before the opening lead and call the director. Call right then. 3) Things you won't get any sympathy on: Asking questions in live uncontested auctions- 1H-P-3H-P-4NT-P-5H "What kind of Ace asking are you using?" (This is why there are no alerts in the Ace-asking conventions.) If the person answers-"We didn't talk about it so I guess it's Blackwood" that is not unauthorized information. You are allowed to forget your agreements, you are not allowed to misinform your opponents as to what those agreements are.

The question was hand evaluation: "How much is the void worth when partner opens one spade?" The hand I was shown was Sp. 983, Hearts.-void, D-KT642 Clubs K9853. The questioner said the conventional answer was 5 points and the hand was worth, by that yardstick, a limit raise. I disagreed. I believe that your void is worth only as many points as the number of trumps you hold, in this case 3 points. After all, even if the opening lead isn't a trump, an alert defender will lead trump when he sees the void. Also, declarer can't ruff very many losers and handle the trump situation. That makes the hand a very good 2 spade raise. Note: Declarer's void is not as valuable as responder's. Ruffing with the trumps in the "short" hand is always more valuable. There could also be duplicated values to watch for.
