This month let's talk about the STOP card. Whenever you skip one or more levels in the bidding, you should use this card. Also, announce "Skip bid, please wait." You don't have to use the card, but if you have one-please do so. Opponents <u>must</u> wait 10 seconds before making their next bid <u>whether or not the card is used.</u> If you make a skip bid, the opponents are entitled to take a pause <u>whether or not you make the announcement or use the card.</u> Do not audibly count off the seconds and pass-the director, if summoned, will not be amused.

Another practice the directors want stopped immediately: Since when did this practice of saying "Play" meaning "play low" come into vogue? NO more. Law 45B: "Declarer plays a card from Dummy by naming the card, after which the Dummy picks up the card and faces it on the table." Two illustrations why: recently a practitioner had Q-8 on dummy and wanted to play to the 4 to the Queen-got a catch in his throat after "Play"-Dummy picked up the 8 and RHO produced the 10 before he could get out "the Queen" (Decide that one) Second illustration: Fifth hand of my first Open KO with Hap and Virginia Shealy at the other table: Declarer is missing A-Q-x_x and leads toward the King-Jack in dummy. He leads, I play low and he says "Play", Dummy goes for the Jack and Joyce produces the Queen. He continues-"The King" That cost us 6 IMPs in a match we lost by 4. Sorry, Hap. Back then I wasn't ready enough to call an Open Flight player on something like that. SO don't you do it!!

Thursday July 10 is the last weekly \$5 seminar on declarer play with Chris Webb.

We will be raising the limit on the Tuesday afternoon game to 1500 master points effective July 1. This is an experiment which will run through the end of September-we would appreciate player feedback on this. We will also give a free play in the 0-1000 game on Friday to any player who tries to play in a 0-100 game that we don't get enough tables to hold.

From the archives of *Bridge World*- a discussion on how to play suit combinations. The ground rules are: Declarer has sufficient transportation and control to operate and nothing is known about opponents' distribution beyond the probabilities of the original deal. The number of card combinations in the two defenders' hands we are dealing with is a power of 2 equal to the number of cards missing. (if missing one card its two to the first or two combinations, missing two cards it's two squared or four combinations, three cards would be two cubed or 8 combinations...)

This month's problem has a little different slant. Two slightly different combinations, but the ratty 6-card suit you'd rebid over your partner's 1 NT response. I can't count how many times I've played 2-level contracts in this kind of situation: North-South need <u>four</u> tricks **and have only <u>one</u> entry to the dummy.**

North 3-2

South a) K-J-7-6-5-4 b) K-J-8-7-6-5

I've been playing this one wrong forever-see if you can do better. Scroll down for the answer.

In each case, the best play is to lead low from the South hand, later using your dummy entry for a second-round play (and using your best guess if necessary).

In (a) either low-first-guess-later or guess-first-and-low-later picks up these 3-2 breaks: East holds Ace-Queen, ace-queen-low, high honor-low, guessed high honor-low or three low. The advantage to leading low first arises from the possibility that West has the singleton ace.

In b) the result is analogous, but the analysis more complex. Suppose you first lead low from dummy and East plays the ten or nine, you an honor, West wins with the next higher honor. On round two, your percentage play would be low, giving up East's ten-nine doubleton, but picking up his other-high honor-plus —ten-or-none- doubleton (two cases) as well as ten-nine tripleton. So, the results in (b) will parallel those in (a), with low first gaining against West's singleton ace. East's ten-nine doubleton is a layout declarer cannot afford to win.
