The ACBL is changing the rules: You are no longer necessarily barring your partner from the auction if your insufficient bid if made sufficient would be a conventional call. Call the director of course-he'll explain the options. If your partner asks a question during the bidding or while on opening lead, you may not ask a follow-up question until it is your turn. If the question you ask is answered in a way that you feel has put unauthorized information into the auction, you will get little sympathy from the directors of this club. After all, especially in an uncontested auction, hey, you just had to ask. Wait till it's over. Irregular tempo during the auction: It is no longer necessary to call the director at the point of irregularity-merely say "I reserve the right to call the director at a later time." If there is any disagreement, call immediately. An opponent is not automatically barred by his partner's slow call.

To end the month here's tips from Kantar. 50) When fortunate enough to have a powerful trump suit and being forced to ruff, tend not to ruff with your lowest trump. That tiny trump might be your only way to get to dummy. 51) When drawing trumps, try to keep a flexible entry position after trumps are drawn. (Ideally you want to be able to enter dummy in the trump suit and also be able to enter your hand with a trump. Say you have the K-Q-J 4-3-2 and dummy has the A-10-5. If you play the ace and king, you have an entry to dummy with the 10 and you can get back to your hand by overtaking the 10. If you play the k-Q you block the trump suit. You can get to dummy with the ace, but you can't get back to your hand in trump.)

**December brings us our Winter STaC event.** Games will be held starting Monday the 15<sup>th</sup> through Sunday the 21<sup>st</sup>. Events will also be at Batesburg on the evening of the 16<sup>th</sup> and TriCity the afternoon of the 21<sup>st</sup>. All events of STaC week will be open except **Friday the 19<sup>th</sup>**. That game is tentatively scheduled to be 0-1000 and 0-100. Entry will be \$7/person for this Silver point event.

Musings of an idle mind: I was watching a House re-run the other night when a line of dialogue jumped at me: "Life isn't about how good a hand you hold, it's about playing well the cards you're dealt." Amazing how life imitates bridge isn't it? I remember my Epiphany on defense: I was holding a near Yarborough (couple of 10's) defending 3NT. I gave my partner count-kept four to the 10 where declarer might have length, partner knew to take the second round of dummy's long suit and we held the contract to 4. It was only an 8 on a 12 top (9 way tie)-but lose interest and it could have been a 2 if partner is out there by himself. Defense, once you're into it, is just as interesting as declarer play. It is harder work though-which is why the return on good defense is so high. (In this case 4-1) Likewise sharpening up your bidding with new conventions will pay off. Some say "I won't remember and we'll get a bottom." Well, how're you doing now? Trust me-you'll have a few glitches-but you will be able to make them part of your system if you choose. There are many fine players who use a minimum of conventions-but they still know many more than they use. Knowing conventions used against you gives you a leg up on defense-and in judging a competitive auction.
