OK, you've had the basic bridge lessons (or equivalent) on Saturday mornings and seminars on Thursday nights and supervised play on Wednesday. Maybe dipped into a few club games. At this point you have Bridge 2.0. You have enough to play the game and have a good time-your learning curve is taking off. Now for the warning-in order to advance, you're going to have to at least modify, if not discard some of what you were taught to get you started. Bridge isn't a straightjacket or a 'cookbook' game, but a game of judgment and adaptation. You're going to be re-tooling the system as you see how the parts can work more efficiently. Just a for instance: Most of you were taught to ignore interference and just bid a four-card major if your partner opened. This is what programmers would call a 'quick and dirty' solution. If you ask any of the columnists at the Bulletin, from Eric Kokish to Larry Cohen to Jerry Helms, they will tell you that bidding a major after your partner opens and opponent doubles or overcalls, that is a five card suit or at least AK(Q)x if it's four cards. Sometimes four works out-but very often it's critical that partner knows you have five-or not. Then there is the concept of 'right-siding' a contract to protect vulnerable partnership assets. A guiding principle is that you want opening lead coming into rather than through the strong hand-the basic idea behind transfer bids. (Jacoby estimated his transfers were worth a trick every fourth time it was used-he may have under estimated it.) There's always a 'However...' Consider strong hands opened an artificial 2. The first system response you learn is 2\psi 'waiting or negative' with any suit response as 2 of the top three honors and a five card suit. This minimizes the chance the weak hand will play the contract. The 2NT response is usually given the value of 8-10 HCP with scattered values. Sometimes it's right for the strong hand to go down to protect 'soft' values and tenaces in the weak hand on opening lead. Let's take a look at other response systems to strong 2 4-Steps showing High card points (2♦ 0-3, 2♥ 4-6 etc). This is like programming in Cobol-mostly useless. This maximizes the chance the wrong hand goes down for no corresponding advantage. Immediate 2♥ double negative (or just no ace or King) with 2♦ showing a control card(s) (A or K) and 2NT showing hearts. Workable but no improvement on your basic system. Step responses showing key controls (A=2 controls K=1 control-2♦ no control 2♥-1, 2♠-2, 2NT-3 kings, 3♣ an ace and a king, 3♦-4..) Usually it's a lot more important to know controls than the gross point count. If you hold ♠AQxxxx ♥ AQJ ♦Kxx ♣A would you rather hear '2NT (scattered values) or 2♠ (6-9 HCP) or 2♦ (I have at least one control) Or would you like a nice crisp 2NT (I hold three Kings)? An immediate clarification of the key card situation. In an interview after winning his last North American Championship (six session event) at age 88, Commodore Waldamar Von Zedwitz commented "I feel I am still learning." So should we all. Good luck.
