People with a passion for the game. Several of these players don't play at the club - a couple more only play occasionally or seasonally. If you want to discuss a bridge, ethics or club problem, catch one of the other 11. We're happy to do it. Some of my recent discussions:

- 1) How do we find out about conventions and other things besides talking to you if we can't make the lessons all the time? Your ACBL bulletin has whole sections of just that kind of article. Go through your back issues-they do a great job! 2) What's the big deal about why a 1NT response to a major opening is forcing or not? The answer alludes to something I said last month about what happens when you find a better way to handle some hands: you can't do just one thing. If you make that change, you have a lot of bids that are now 'out of work' that you can assign new, more precise meanings. That goes for any other conventional call. Again, the ACBL Bulletin just did a series on 2/1 that was very helpful.
- 3) You play with Mr. X who leans back on his right shoulder and shows the right side of his hand to his Left Hand opponent and Mrs. Y who has a tendency to lay her hand flat: But you don't get after these people for their bad habits anymore like you used to. Why? Hmm... Well I guess it's because I'm their opponent more than I am their partner. Sooner (I hope) or later (I fear) it will dawn on these two (and others) "Hey, I know I should score better than this! Why do the opponents always make the best switch (or bid)? Why do they never throw the wrong card when I run a suit? Why do they always find the missing Queen? Why do these players never make a mistake at my table?" And they'll fix it.
- 4) You look at their hands? I don't need to, (but my partner might@) the bidding and play to the first couple tricks settle most hands-peeking also ruins your stroke. That crutch won't be there when you are playing the people you have to beat in order to win. 5) Isn't it cheating? When I started, a club director/owner told me "If they are showing you their cards, they're showing everyone else-better look or you'll lose out. Actively trying to get a look is unethical-but if they show you-it's OK. But like I said, it's a crutch you can't depend on-better to develop analytical skills. 6) You sort your cards funny. No, I just don't use the alternating reds and blacks and rank order. Usually both reds are together and both blacks are together (if you DO inadvertently tip your hand, it's harder to count distribution.). Keep the honors and short suits to the interior with the small cards and long suits to the outside. I also fold and re-fan the hand a lot so there isn't obviously one card here, three cards there and two on the other end after 7 tricks. At least make opponent work to count the hand! 7) Hey! I think the club should...can you get the Board to ...? I direct a lot of games and I write this letter, but I'm not on the Board any more. I'll be glad to take your suggestions, complaints, whatever to an appropriate officer or Board member though. The officers and at large directors are very approachable-their pictures are on the Web site maintained by Ed Young. There is probably at least one Board member in the game you're playing in-they come from all strata of the club. Let them hear from you directly-they will appreciate it!
