In the last 30 days I've had 6 A partners, 6 B partners and 8 C partners. A hand came up that illustrated a lot of issues faced by partnerships and shows some of the differences in how the game is played on different levels. First the auction (both Vulnerable):

So your partner has shown a great Spade hand-probably off shape 18-19 at the top right? What would you expect him to do with \triangle A-K-J-x-x-x \forall K-Q-x \Diamond K-x-x \Diamond x over 3 Diamonds? Let's return to the question after looking at three hands you might hold:

A ♠ 10-x-x-x ♥ x-x-x ♦ x ♠ Q-x-x-x-x
B ♠ Q-x-x ♥ x-x-x ♦ x-x ♠ J-x-x-x-x
C ♠ x ♥ x-x-x ♦ x-x ♠ K-9-x-x-x-x

Very bad hands, right? But what you do with them is key to what your partner will do over three Diamonds. So what did you do with those hands? My regular partners know that with hand A at my first opportunity I would bid 3 Spades (that's right: 0-6 and I'm serious about the zero) With hand B I would pass the first chance and over 2 Diamonds, offer up 2 Spades (raise with 3 card support-I've already shown this hand is no where near 6 points by passing first). With hand C (the actual hand I held) I pass both times and would expect my regular partners to pass 3 diamonds like a shot. My partner that day was someone I'd never played with before and he bid 3 Spades just like he would in the Limited games. With a Club lead, both minor aces wrong (predictable on the auction) a 5-1 trump break behind him and leading from his hand the whole time, he was lucky to get out down 3, doubled. I ran this hand in on a Limited game sit out and watched the results. No one played less than 3 Spades-some not even doubled!! Let us draw the curtain of charity over those who persisted to 4 diamonds. Lessons: A) hand evaluation-all three hands I gave you are dreck. B) Re-evaluation after partner bids- Hand A and B have improved to a level where support can be shown C) Hand C is still dreck-Pass. (Those who would do a weak jump shift, please start your next session at my table) D) "Oh, but I can't bid on so few points! (A and B)" Well, you better. As Jerry Helms (and other experts) saying goes "Support with support" Partner knows all he needs is 3 spades and the Jack of Hearts from you to have a decent shot at 9 tricks (you can't hold more than 2 diamonds). Unless he knows you show support with 3 cards some how, he is always going to walk into that swinging door and get hammered when you hold something like hand C. E) Partnership trust-Partner won't go off the deep end (OK, OK-someone else's partner with a modicum of sanity won't) because you showed 0-4 by your first pass. If you pass twice, partner knows you're short of support and can defend accordingly. Partner has to trust you to show support with 3 or more trumps and you have to be able to trust partner to realize your (lack of) strength on the auction. F) If you insist on playing every good hand you're dealt, I hope you had fun playing this one across from hand C (or 4 Diamonds going the other way). "It may not be wise; Watson, but I assure you it is essential." Basil Rathbone as Sherlock Holmes "The Lady in Green"
