"His road to victory was littered with the bodies of heroes." Someone once said that about Barry Crane, perhaps the best match point player of all time. By that he meant that people got to Crane's table and tried to do impossible things, took crazy chances. And of course they paid for their mistakes. But they weren't going to let Crane intimidate them-No Sir!!. In the last two Swiss teams at the club, our team played another team that didn't have as many points combined as three of our four members had individually. They beat us once, (by 16 IMPs) pretty convincingly. The other time we won 2-1 with four pushed boards. They didn't try to be heroes-just bid their system and used good judgment. That's just something to think about. Bridge hands are not played in a vacuum. Each trick is not what an analyst would call an "independent trial'. I always cringe when someone says "I know percentages and I play for them right down the line. Take this common situation. You K-x A-J-x-x-x (dummy) Players know that 3-3 breaks only happen about 36% of the time and 4-2 is the most common. Suppose you have a choice between playing for 3-3 or taking a finesse in another suit into the strong hand. So your best shot for the most tricks is King and then finesse right? Not really. If both opponents follow to the King and then Ace, your chances for an original 3-3 break have improved to almost 43% with the probabilities for original 5-1 and 6-0 breaks distributed in the same ratio as the original probabilities of 3-3 vs. 4-2. You have also gained every time the Q-x sat behind the Jack. Your chance of taking 4 tricks is now at least 52%. That beats finessing. Even at No trump. Try this for the optimum number of tricks: K-x-xA-J-x-x Play to the Ace-then to the King-if the Queen hasn't appeared, your chances of 3-3 are at least 52% and if the Queen fourth is on-side, you still make 3 tricks while also making 3 tricks every time the Q-x is off-side. Again at least a 52% play, a better chance than finessing. (Technical Advice from Terence Reese)

You've heard "8 ever, 9 never" about finessing for Queens, right? Sometimes that's not right. I was defending 6 Spades recently. Declarer pulled trump, finding me with 3 and partner with 1. She forced my club stopper and eliminated that suit showing up as me with 6 and partner with 2. She was now ready to play her K-10-8-x across from A-J-9-x-x diamond suit. She led low to the King and low toward her Ace. At the point my partner contributed a second diamond, she knows 10 cards in my hand (3 spades, 6 clubs, and a diamond) She knows 7 cards in my partner's hand (1 spade, 2 clubs 2 diamonds and 2 Hearts discarded on trump leads) Three unknown cards in my hand and 6 unknown in my partner's hand-odds are thus 2-1 to finesse. She played for the drop, against the odds, and lost.

If you have a two way guess for a Queen at No Trump (or less often at a suit contract), the stronger the pair you're playing, the more likely it is that the player with the Queen will discard first from the critical suit. (Make the most difficult discard early on the run of a long suit at No-Trump) **This advice is NOT guaranteed.**
