(Some of them were still eligible for 0-100 and one of those still eligible pairs won the 0-1000 event that day) So when you move up, nothing to be afraid of, you're just re-joining the people you played at a the 0-100 level.

"Yesterday's over my shoulder, so I can't look backward too long.." These words from Jimmy Buffet (Changes in Latitudes, Changes in Attitudes) should be taken to heart by all bridge players. I recently played a Swiss match against a pair that hashed over the last board while trying to play the current one all through the match. I sat there amazed: one inferior bid, play and defense after another. You'd think at least the dummy would try not to distract declarer while she's playing a ticklish contract. What a waste of energy that should go into the project at hand. Since defense is usually the last thing a player learns though the most useful, here is a list of questions players should ask themselves as they await their partner's opening lead. (This list is from Danny Kleinman, one of the best teachers and player/coaches today, printed in The Bridge World January 2011) After the auction: a) How many cards does declarer have in each suit? (Some auctions are more revealing than others-but try) b) How many cards will dummy have in each suit? (ibed) c) How many points does declarer have? (And where are they likely to be?) d) How many points does dummy have? (ibed) e) How many points does that leave for partner? (And –Where are/could they be?)

Now anticipating the opening lead: f) How many cards do you expect partner to have in each suit? g) What suit do you expect partner to lead?

Now he makes the opening lead and you see dummy: h) Did partner lead the suit you expected? If he didn't, can you guess why not? i) From what holding might partner's lead be from? (Think: count and/or attitude or top of sequence) j) What can you infer from partner's lead about his holdings in other suits? k) Are there any surprises in dummy? l) How should you plan the defense? (Consider your partner's likely distribution and point placement)

m) How do you expect declarer to play the hand? n) If he plays as you expect, what should you do? o) If you obtain the lead, what do you play? p) Is there a special situation that needs immediate consideration (such as whether to duck a high card, cover an honor or split honors or false card) to prevent a tell-tale huddle later.

Of course as declarer you're asking yourself mirror image questions about the defense. Some advancing players think we can see though the backs of the cards. No, it's just that this list is so automatic that it just seems that way. Try it yourself and see how your game improves.
