It may seem like the "A" players don't plan also-but not true! They are just much faster because of a gazzilion hands of experience. So take your time at trick one-plan your play.

Every so often we run into a spate of contention over who gets to turn the boards after a hand, or who controls this or that aspect of the play and playing area. So-relevant sections of Law 7: Section B2 "No player shall touch any cards other than his own during or after the play except by permission of the director." Section C: "Each player shall restore his original thirteen cards to the pocket corresponding to his position. Thereafter, no hand shall be removed from the board unless a member of each side, or the Director, is present." Section D: "Any contestant remaining at a table throughout a session is primarily responsible for maintaining proper conditions of play at the table." (This does NOT mean N/S get to play domination games or that they are the only ones to turn the boards-if you're going to do that, turn with all due haste after the completion of the previous hand. It DOES mean that N/S are responsible for environmental concerns-keep the trash from overflowing the E/W area. Also, at the end of the game, N/S are the ones on my (adjective deleted) list if the table and playing area around it are not completely clear. If I had my way, you couldn't play N/S for period of time if you failed in this)

Sometimes you need an extra trick and sometimes you just want one (like all the time!) Experience will teach you the best way to look for those extra chances. Here's one:

A-Q-10-4-2 K-3 A-Q-4-3-2 K-10

Consider these two suit combinations, what is your best shot at the most tricks? Most will play the first one King,Ace, Queen and hope the Jack falls. Close enough-it covers all the 3-3 breaks and any time the Jack is doubleton on either side. On the second, this play would be wrong. Remember "even numbers split badly, odd numbers split well." The outstanding six cards are more likely to break 4-2 or worse, than 3-3. The extra chance (about 12%, 1 in 8) is to hook the 10 on the first lead. 3-3 is about 37 ½ % while the finesse is 50%. Here's one I see misplayed all the time:

A-K-J-10-4

8-2

It seems people can't resist playing a top honor first before going over to take a finesse against the Queen. Singleton Queen off side is 3%. Queen fourth on-side (thus needing two finesses which you don't have available if you play a top honor first) is about 10 times more likely than the stiff Queen off-side. Even if it's Queen fifth or sixth, you still get 4 instead of 3 tricks. (another 18%) So taking 2 finesses beats playing ace and one finesse by 16-1.
