October 4th is one of the most popular games in the ACBL calendar. The instant Match Point game will be held at 7:00 that evening. The score sheet gives you the match points for every possible contract (and a few really unlikely ones) right there at the table. Analysis books and hand records after the event. Our monthly 8 is enough teams and Individual events are pushed back one week but will definitely be held.

October is Jane Johnson Club Appreciation month and also another month of International Fund Games. These all carry a special sanction so grab the big master points while you can!

I've done this before, but there is always a new crop of players coming up who haven't heard it yet: Talking to your partner as you put down the dummy is not illegal as long as you aren't trying to tell him or her how to play the hand. It's just a bad idea on two counts: 1) it gives your opponents a slant on the hand that they might not have been thinking about if you hadn't said anything. 2) It distracts your partner from counting tricks and losers and planning the play of the hand. Do it if you want but it is a handicap.

Bridge is a game of mistakes-the better the player you are, the more you realize this. Everyone is faced with the same problems sometime during the round. The only players who don't face opponents who make mistakes are players who don't give them a chance to make mistakes. A couple months ago, I wrote about a hand where several players made the mistake of a quick claim with a concession of a trick. In a close game, that's the difference between winning and losing. I sit there and (silently I hope) laugh at players who claim on trick three or four conceding one on the end when I see the squeeze play even they might have accidentally stumbled into that would make them all. This is without considering the mistakes in discarding, signaling, and even keeping track of whether it's a suit or NT contract you're playing. These things happen, but not if you never give them the chance to happen.

If you are third hand (playing to your partner's lead) and you hold touching cards, force the fourth hand to go high by playing the lower of the touching cards. Example: partner leads a deuce and you hold KQxx. Play the Queen, not the King. Partner sees the Ace win and can figure out you hold the King-but if you play the King, he can't know you have the Queen. If you have a string of touching carsds, still play the second highest of those cards. If you are on lead of course (first hand) lead the highest of touching cards promising at least the next card lower. Generally speaking, it is better to play low if you are second to play to a trick. Major exception: if you hold Kx or Qx in front of an AJ(9)x or AJ(10)x or longer combinations. Your partner needs to know when to take his honor or have a chance to score two tricks with Honor, ten and small card in the suit. In these cases you play your King or Queen.
