**June is the start of North American Pairs** qualifying. For the next three months we will have two NAP games for each sanctioned session we run. Stratification will be 0-500, 2000 and Open. Any NAP game held on Limited game days Tuesday and Friday will have a top limit of 2000 instead of 1500 or 1000.

**Saturday June 8 is the ECATS** Instant Match point game. This is a World-wide event sponsored by a British organization. Local ACBL master points are awarded-and you can tune in to the site to find out how your score compared to scores at 5,000-6,000 tables playing the same hand world-wide. Here's a hand from the Master Solver's Club printed in the April edition of Bridge World. There are 3 passes to you in 4<sup>th</sup> seat. What is your call? Decide and read samples from 26 experts' comments and scoring on the next page:

♠ Q-J-10   ♥ K-Q-10-9   ♦ K-Q-J   ♣ 9-8-6

1♥	100	chosen by 14 experts
1♣	90	chosen by 7 experts
1♦	70	chosen by 5 experts (hmmm...my choice-predictable)

David Berkowitz: 1♥-the suit I want led, the suit I want raised. The suit I want to play in.  
 Billy Eisenberg- 1♥. One club looks sick.

Rowntree and Walker: 1 Club. Does not misdescribe in any way. This feels like a No Trump hand but we can't see upgrading with flat distribution and no aces. The diamonds are much better than the clubs, but we are discouraging an opposing club lead. One heart would put us in hearts on a lot of hands we'd rather be in NT.

Bart Bramley: 1 Club-playing in a 4-3 heart fit with 23 HCP and two balanced hands is unlikely to score better than NT. Given opponents silence, a strong (ed: 3-card Heart) raise (of a 1 heart opening) by partner is not unlikely.

Mark Lair: 1 Club. Why distort the hand by starting with 1 heart on a reasonable 14-count?

Mike Passel: 1 diamond. Good diamonds, bad clubs, opening hand.

Ross Grabel: 1 diamond. This does not look like a hand worth upgrading but it is strong enough to think that it may be our deal. Some would open a lead prohibitive 1 Club, but I prefer a lead directing 1 diamond to hedge our bets in case we wind up defending.
