November 7 is a Unit game-please play in it to support Unit 160 here in South Carolina. **November 25**th Monday night is an ACBL wide Charity game for the national charity-we're still trying to re-build bridge clubs along the Gulf coast-please play this one if you possibly can.

Differences in bridge mechanics: I've heard some bridge teachers advocate looking at opponents' card during an auction. I don't necessarily agree that you have to 'protect' yourself like that. I try never to interrupt my opponent when he's making a mistake. I would never pick up a convention card in a live auction. I would especially not do it if I had no intention of bidding. They are liable for alerts if their bidding is non-standard and if they don't alert, you have a case for damages (call the director!) Depending on when you do pick up their card, it could even be called "unauthorized information' by the other side. If you are just curious, save questions for the end.

There are no alerts during ace-asking sequences. The reason is because it is so easy to mess up an auction like that that alerts and questions do more to clear up misunderstandings than to advance the rights of opponents to know what's going on. Examples: One partner thinks they are cue-bidding while the other thinks he's using some exotic form of Exclusion Blackwood. One partner thinks they are playing regular Roman Key Card and the other thinks 1430 or just Standard Blackwood. But after the bidding closes, the ace asking partnership must tell the opponents what form of ace asking they used and what the responses showed before the opening lead is made. Good reason to make those leads face down-you can't recover a face up lead if you make it before those explanations.

Joyce and my card is re-worked constantly towards three goals in our use of conventions:

- 1) Deliver the most information to partner with one bid possible while using the opponents' bidding space. This is why the Meckwell version of DON'T is so effective. A major suit overcall is in the auction right now-one step instead of the usual 2-steps. Also Leaping Michaels, mini-Roman 14-18, two asking bids (2NT or 3Clubs) over weak twos-and so on.
- 2) Use conventions that simplify your bidding structure. These free up other bids for other uses. This is why big club bidders have a head start on a lot of auctions.
- 3) Use conventions that allow you to compete aggressively and help on defense if you don't wind up declaring. RosenKrantz doubles and redoubles (or their lack), our 2 diamond 'Flannery' overcall of opponent's minor open, two suited overcalls (or their absence) and others fit in this category. If you have them on your card, USE THEM! Don't expect to make every contract you bid for with them, if you don't go down (sometimes badly) you aren't bidding enough.
