Just to mention a few good performances (I know I miss somebody): Scott McPherson and Bill Charlwood won the opening event, Pat and Bob Webb won two single session Open pairs and were 3rd in a two session Open, Hap Neuffer and Margaret Barksdale won a single session pairs event and 2nd in a two session event, Bill Charlwood, Jay Shahani and Abdul Ghaffar won two 2nd bracket KO's Mary Townhill, Sandy Geis, Bernetha Henry and Tom Balcerek won a 2nd bracket KO Joyce Hill won a BAM, a top bracket KO and 78 MP's overall. Francine Moring had a lot of 2nds and 68 MP overall, Bill Charlwood 53 MP, Betsy Stanton had 49, Jay Shahani 46.5, Chris Webb 44, Pat and Bob Webb 43, Bernetha Henry 41, Hap Neuffer 33, Lee Webb 32.

We will be running Open STaC events the week of August 18-25 (while Joyce and I are in Hawaii). Play well, often and win for the CBC while we're gone, OK?

Everyone plays negative doubles, right? Question doesn't even come up anymore. Trouble is, some don't play them very well. If one more partner of mine makes this &^^\%\$ mistake again I am coming across the *&#\%@ table reaching down their *(&\$\%\$ throat and ripping out their *&\%)_@ heart. Consider these actual hands, examples of a dozen or 15 butchered lately:

- A) S- A-K-x-x H- K-Q-10-x-x D- x-x C- Q-x
- B) S- A-10-x H- A-Q-J-x-x D-x-x C- K-x
- C) S- K-Q-x-x H- K-J-x-x D-A-10-x-x C- J

As I say these are your hands that you open one Heart on A and B and 1 diamond on hand C. Your left hand opponent overcalls A and B with 2 Diamonds and your partner and RHO both pass. What is your call? Come on-you know what it should be. If you say anything but "Double", you're about to lose your heart the hard way. You know your partner doesn't have a negative double and you know he has no penalty double available to him. If he wants to penalize an overcall, he has to depend on you to re-open the bidding with a double. He might also hold a hand he isn't strong enough or shapely enough for a free bid or a negative double. My hands across the table from A) and B):

- A) S-10-x-x-x-x H-x-x D-x-x C-K-J-x (makes 3 Spades)
- B) S-Q-J-x-x-x H-x D-x-x-x C-Q-x-x (makes 4 Spades)

Figure out who got the short end of the matchpoint score on those two hands. Now look at hand C). I held that hand and after my 1 Diamond open and 2 Club overcall by LHO-P-P to me, I doubled. We found out my partner held A-Q-10-8-7 of Clubs and the Queen of Diamonds. Yes LHO overcalled a suit that was King-nine sixth with the Ace of Spades, Queen of Hearts and King of Diamonds. Down four (making the Spade Ace, Diamond King and two trumps) was not good for him. Now, you are allowed to pass in this situation if you hold a trump stack of your own against the over caller. You know your partner does not have a negative double, he isn't waiting to penalize (you and the over caller own the trumps) and any off-suit fit you have is a poor one (partner's suit can't be that good or he'd have enough to respond over the over caller and between your suit and the trump stack against opponent, you don't have enough cards to fill partner). Now my best partner has been cured of this "No Balancing Double Syndrome". So, go now and remember to make your balancing doubles! Your partner will appreciate it.
