Thinking on Offense: Here's a hand I played where, as the English would say, I was "too clever by half." An uncontested auction and play against a pretty decent pair.

I was aiming for 3 NT, maybe even if Ken showed a 4 card Heart suit, but in any case trying to entice an opening lead into Diamonds at NT. This 11 count is better than just 11 . Ken foxed that with the 4 Club call but you have to go with partner. So even when we are an ace control short, 6 clubs is the only real option to 3 NT. The opening lead was a diamond and I guessed right to play the Queen. (LHO is good enough that he is going to under lead a King more readily than a Jack. It took three rounds to draw trump and the ace of diamonds drew two small cards form opponents. I have to play that the ace of hearts is in front of my King. I'm missing 7 Spades to the King-odds are upwards of $70 \%$ they split $4-3$. I can make the hand with the Spade King stiff, second or third on-side. I can't ruff out King fourth on-side with only one trump left in hand (and it leaves me one discard short) but I can if it is fourth (or shorter) behind the ace, so play it for being offside it is. I lead the 10 to the Ace and the Queen off the table. RHO takes the suspense out of the play early by dithering but finally covers. Ruff the king away and ruff a diamond to the table where we find the Spades do indeed split 4-3 and a diamond and two hearts are discarded. A Heart lead from the dummy draws the Ace from RHO and the slam is home. Without a diamond lead the hand is simpler. Just make the Heart and then the Spade plays right away and after ruffing out the King, draw trump ending on the table and pitch 3 diamonds from your hand after pitching the board's second diamond on the Heart King. This was for those of you who wanted an example of how an "A" player thinks and plays. Make a plan people. What's not just your bid on this round, but your rebid after partner shows something? If you're in an unlikely contract, what's going to bring it home for a match point top? (If you're out there in the heavy rough, you're usually playing for top or bottom. How are you going to get a better score than the par contract the field is playing?)
