The Longest Day - June 20, 2016



The CBC's First Day of Summer Marathon Bridge Event to Aid the Fight Against Alzheimer's.

On the first day of summer, Monday, June 20, the Columbia Bridge Club will support the ACBL's charity for Alzheimer's research by participating in the Longest Day bridge event.

On this day, the CBC will host not just one, but three games. The first game will be at 12:30 PM, followed by a second game at 3:45 PM, with the third game at 7:00 PM. Each game will consist of either 18 or 21 boards followed by a 30 – 40 minute break for rest and a "bring a sandwich" style lunch.

All games will be open games with the usual stratification. A portion of each \$7.00 entry fee will be donated to the ACBL's Alzheimer's research charity. In addition, the game directors will be donating their services for the event.

So on June 20, everyone can play up to three times in shortened games while contributing to a worthwhile charity. And, of course, since this is a charity event, there will be extra masterpoints awarded to the top placers in each stratification.

Grab your partners and make plans to be there to play lots of bridge and help support the fight against Alzheimer's disease.

Hap Neuffer Grand Life Master

The CBC's very own Hap Neuffer has earned the ACBL rank of Grand Life Master. To reach this coveted level, a player must have earned 10,000 masterpoints and be the winner of a national championship title. Hap is the only player who has earned this title while living and playing in South Carolina.



Hap says that he first learned to play bridge at the age of 22 while attending the University of South Carolina. His then girlfriend wanted to learn to play the game so they decided to learn together. He went to the library and checked out 5 books on the game and was immediately attracted to the game for its intellectual appeal. (He also checkout out a couple of books on playing chess, but, after reading the bridge books, he never got around to reading the chess books).

He, along with his girlfriend and a couple of others decided to go and play in the duplicate game the USC Student Union. There he met Bonnie Lee, an exchange student from China, who was a very good player and the two became frequent partners, and from Bonnie Lee, Hap's knowledge of the game increased.

In 1984, Hap played in the prestigious Blue Ribbon pairs at the summer nationals and placed 4th overall.

Hap continued to advance as a player and in 1993, he and partner Livy Fernandez attended the ACBL nationals in Kansas City and won the National Mixed Pairs Championship defeating the world renowned player Ron Anderson and his partner Sabina Zenkel, who was then considered the best female player in the nation.

In the 15 years since 2001 to the present, Hap has played in the District 7 Grand Nationals Team event eleven times and won the district championship 6 times and came in second twice. In 2015, he was the district winner of the Grand National Pairs event.

Hap credits a lot of his success to his frequent partners in the past, including Arnold Levinson, Lucas Lebioda, Bobby McMahon, Bernard Washaeur, Mary Ellen Hendrix and Bobby Fechter. Currently Hap devotes a lot of his bridge time to his two favorite partners, Alice Moore and Margaret Barksdale.

When asked what advice he would give to beginner players to learn the game, he said that he would recommend that developing players read books and articles about collected hands where experts show you their bidding and play and discuss their reasoning behind their decisions. He also stresses that those new to the game need to play as much as possible so that they see the situations involving card play combinations repeatedly and can learn to handle them routinely when they come up.

The Columbia Bridge Club is extremely proud of Hap and his reaching the Grand Life Master milestone. We wish him continued success in the years to come.

On the way to the Nationals in D.C. via the Flight B Grand National Teams

Chris and I played in the flight B Grand National Teams in Morganton, N.C. on April 30 & May 1, 2016. We played on a team with 2 gentlemen from Anderson, S.C., Robert Yon and John Cullen. Two days of solid bridge is grueling and takes a lot of self-discipline to stay focused. My advice is to keep the eye on the prize and walk around if you get tired. Don't take a mental break until you are the dummy. Use this opportunity to give your mind a rest but watch all cards. You cannot say anything during the play of the hand but you can call the director at the end of play if you observe a revoke or other discrepancy. Lastly, take a break before the last set of boards and refresh yourself. Here are some differences between team approach and pairs:

- 1. Swiss teams are scored in IMPs (International Match Points). The *Net Difference* in total score between your team and the opponents determines IMP awards. Pairs events are scored by awarding points for the *Number of Pairs* that you outscored, even if only by 10 points (i.e. 110 vs. 100).
- 2. At match points, overtricks are vital. Because of the form of scoring, the suit is usually more important that the level of bidding. This is especially true of part score contracts. Playing in a major suit is much preferred to a minor, even when the chance of success is lessened. A 2-spade contract will yield the same score (110) when both make exactly. However, an overtrick in each will provide 140 vs.130 and the major suit prevails even though the total number of tricks is fewer (9 vs. 10).
- 3. In Swiss teams, the difference between bidding and making a vulnerable game and not bidding it can be 500 points, that's a lot of IMPs and can lose the round for you. Generally speaking, you should bid all vulnerable games if you have about a 38% chance to make. This is because the difference in score provides about 10:6 odds in your favor to do so. However, because the game or slam bonus is smaller when not vulnerable, one should have about a 50% expectation to make because the mathematical odds are less in your favor.

On with the journey... we made it to the finals and were in a head to head for first place. We were up by 12 IMPs at the half way mark. Chris and I play an opening bid of 4NT shows 6/5 in the minors with 6 losers.


I am the dealer and pick up: ♠ 6 ♥ 9 ♦ QJxxx ♠ AJxxxx Would you open this hand? If so, what would be your bid? First chair vulnerable, I opened the aforementioned 4NT, alerted and explained.

Now Chris has a decision to make. He holds this hand: ★ AKx ♥ 10xx ♦ AKxxx ★ Qx Knowing that I only held at most 2 major suit cards, Chris bids 6 diamonds.

Although he could obviously count 11 tricks, the vulnerability provided all the momentum needed to make this the winning call as discussed previously. The opening lead was the Ace of hearts and then left hand shifted to a spade, game over after pulling trump and the successful club finesse. We made 6 diamonds. The pair at the other table play Precision and have 2NT opening bid which means the same as our 4NT-opening bid, 6/5 in the minors. We actually lost an IMP because they did not get a heart lead and made 7. We lost the second half pretty badly **BUT** we get a stipend to go to the Nationals in D.C. in July to compete in the Mini-Spingold. We did not know this is the consolation prize. It is a wonderful opportunity and we are looking forward to the experience.

On another note, I am excited to be the incoming president. I love this game of bridge, a challenging, and exciting game that yields satisfaction, friendship, and a sense of accomplishment. I look forward to working with you all.
