
CBC NEWSLETTER AUGUST 2019

Learning to Count, Continued....

~ by Jack Self Last time we talked about starting to learn how to count out declarer's distribution by focusing on counting out the trump suit. Counting declarer's cards in each suit is important and something you **MUST** learn to do if you are going to advance to the upper levels of bridge players. Unfortunately, counting is not something a lot of bridge players do naturally, so you must force yourself to count. Sooner or later it will become automatic and you will no longer have to force yourself. The trump suit is often the easiest suit to count. Usually, you have some idea of how the trump suit lies by listening to the bidding. Let's stop here and take a short quiz. In each problem you are given the bidding and your holding in the trump suit as well. Try to figure out how many cards declarer has as well as your partner.

by you, 2♥ on your left, followed by three passes. You hold the Queen and two small hearts. How many hearts does your partner hold? Answer: Your left-hand opponent surely has 4 hearts. You don't know exactly how many declarer has but most likely four or five. Because you have three hearts, you know the most your partner can have is 2, and maybe only 1. Why is this important? Answer: Most likely declarer has five hearts, and dummy has two hearts. Since you have

Problem #2. The bidding goes 1♣ on your left, Pass by partner, 1♥ on your right, Pass

dummy has the ♥K864. Declarer wins the opening lead, cashes the Ace of Hearts to

<u>Answer:</u> No, no, no! Absolutely do NOT cover with the Queen. And don't even think about it. Just play low like you never heard of the ♥Q. Why? Because your partner cannot have more than 2 Hearts (Remember you placed declarer with at least 4 of

them). In fact declarer may have five of them and is not planning to finesse at all. He may be just giving you a chance to play carelessly if you do have the Queen. Besides, if you do cover, what good will it do? It won't promote a winner in your partner's hand and it certainly won't promote a winner in your hand, so all it will do is make declarer's life

easier. If you did your preliminary counting of the trump suit, you will be ready to follow to

declarer's V smoothly with a low heart and give declarer a chance to guess wrong.

Take another month to practice counting the trump suit and then we will discuss taking

two hearts, that means your partner probably has four of them.
