I am always learning something new, somethings I should have known already, particularly with the amount of bridge I play.

Last Sunday at the Individual game, my partner, a new player at CBC, opened in third seat with a two-spade bid. My RHO passed and with four spades KQXX, Hrts XX, Clubs XX and J109XX Dia. and nonvulnerable I decided to raise to interfere with any opponents bidding. All passed.

My partner made four spades. His holding was JXXXXX of Spades as trump. AX of Dia. XX of Hrts and AXX Clubs. E/W can make 5 hearts.

Copied directly from LOEB Bridge: The ACBL Convention Charts govern legal bidding agreements. The Open and Open+ Charts are intended for events with no masterpoint limits. The Basic and Basic+ Charts are intended for limited master point events. The Basic+, Open, and Open+ Charts allow "Any opening bid in a suit which is Natural, as long as it shows at least Near-Average Strength." An artificial opening bid at the 1 level must, by Agreement, have at least 10 HCP or meet the Rule of 19. The Basic Chart is more restrictive requiring an opening bid in a suit to show at least Average Strength. Average Strength is defined as "A hand that has at least 10 HCP or meets the 'Rule of 19'." Near Average Strength is defined as "A hand that has at least 8 HCP or meets the 'Rule of 17 '."

As he dropped his aces, I thought perhaps in third seat I may have opened his hand with 1 spade. After the round he and I looked at the hand. I count my hand as HCP's plus one point for the $5^{\text {th }}$ plus a point for any more cards in that suit. I counted 9 HCP plus 2 for the $5^{\text {th }}$ and $6^{\text {th }}$ spade to equal 11 points, thus in $3^{\text {rd }}$ seat, I might open with 1 spade.

We checked with the director and were told I should not open that or any hand with less than 10 HCP , even in third seat. He told us this was an ACBL CONVENTION CHART RULE for OPENING a HAND. To clarify, he refined and expanded his statement to include the below information I copied from LOEB Bridge and ACBL.

You may find this helpful in opening at the 1 level in any seat.

The Rule of 19 considers the length of a player's 2 longest suits. If the number of cards in a player's 2 longest suits plus their HCP are 19 or more, the player's hand meets the Rule of 19. A hand like ↔A76532 マ8 *KQ \& 8742 has just 9 HCP, but meets the Rule of 19 because it has 10 cards in their 2 longest suits and has 9 HCP.
The Rule of 17 is similar but has a threshold of 17 . If the number of cards in a player's 2 longest suits plus their HCP are 17 or more, the player's hand meets the Rule of 17. A hand like -A76532 v8 K 8 8742 has just 9 HCP, but meets the Rule of 17 because it has 10 cards in their 2 longest suits and has 7 HCP .

Further, ACBL states in it's handbook:

- In 1st \& 2nd chair, a NATURAL 1 level opening bid requires AVERAGE strength (10+ HCP)
- In 1st \& 2nd chair, a NATURAL or QUASINATURAL (3+ length) of a minor (1C/1D) requires AVERAGE strength (10+ HCP).
- In 3rd/4th chair, a NATURAL or QUASINATURAL 1 level opening bid requires NEARAVERAGE strength (8+ HCP) or satisfies the rule of 19.
