For Members of the Columbia Bridge Club

From the BOARD: The last regular CBC Board meeting was held on August 11, 1999.

• Kibitzing - The rationale behind the Board's decision to bar kibitzing at any game higher than locally rated games includes: It is against ACBL law to discuss hands during an event, but players almost always compare notes when kibitzing. This discussion is apt to be heard by other players. Players could alter their play based on information gained as kibitzers. Players could mistakenly kibitz a hand they have not yet played. The biggest defense for barring kibitzing by participants in an event is that the ACBL does not allow it at tournaments. Why would the Columbia Bridge Club want to counter-ACBL policy. If you still feel strongly about CBC's barring kibitzing, then submit your objections IN WRITING to one of the officers or board members of the club. This policy barring kibitzing does not apply to one who is not playing in the event.

Annual Proficiency Awards - Having added two more weekly games to the club's schedule, the minimum number of times a member must play to be eligible for this award was addressed once again. It was moved that the open proficiency race be based on having played fifty (50) times during the year, and a member must have played a minimum of 32

times in the invitational proficiency race. Motion carried.

• The Board has authorized the purchase of new bidding boxes for twelve (12) tables. If you would like to place such an order through CBC's sanction number for your own personal use please let secretary Pat Webb know. The cost through the club is \$26.00 per set of four boxes plus shipping and SC sales tax. The cost of ordering directly through ACBL is \$29.95 plus tax and shipping.

SPECIAL GAMES: Occasionally special games have to be scheduled at the same time as our limited-point games. One such game is the ACBL Instant Matchpoint Event at 7 PM on Wednesday September 15, 1999. When this happens, we still have a limited-point section which plays independently of the open section, but there will also be a second section of open players with no point restriction. Such games are Unit Games and ACBL sponsored events such as Charity, International Fund and Senior Pairs games. This does not happen very often. It is especially encouraging that the Wednesday night game is going so well as this means that with the current participation in that game there are sufficient tables so that IN Players have a wonderful opportunity not only to participate, but also to have their own section.

Other special games which may be set by CBC (<u>rather than ACBL</u>) are Club Championships, Charity Club Championships, NAP events, GNT events, Junior Fund games. These games include only the players qualified to play at the time they are scheduled. In other words, if a Junior Fund game is scheduled for Wednesday evening, only players with fewer than 300 points may play that night.

Speaking of special games 1999 NORTH AMERICAN'er PAIRS, throughout the month of September, players with under 50 masterpoints (as of the August point card from ACBL) can compete for ACBL Bridge Bucks. \$400 will go to the first overall pair in each of ACBL's 25 districts, and \$200 will go to the second overall pair.

Unit NAP Flight C Finals will be at the Aiken tournament on Saturday October 2, 1999. Unit NAP Flights A & B Finals will be on Sunday October 10, 1999 at the Tri-City Leisure Center at 11 AM & TBA. As lunch will be served, call Pat Webb to make a reservation. The District final will also be at Tri-City later in the year.

From Your Directors: Members will have noticed that your directors are enforcing time limits more vigorously lately. This is because Duplicate is a *Social* rather than a *Sociable* event. That's the difference between a competition and a past-time. Not only is *habitual* slow play a discourtesy to your friends in the competition, it is also against the rules like revoking or lead out of turn. After more than one warning, match points penalties can be imposed. So, leave all discussion of the hands and *socializing* until all boards for that round are played. And from your directors, Thank You.

Attached with this Newsletter you will find a brightly colored *EASY BRIDGE* flyer that you are encouraged to post at an area you frequent, such as your Church, Library, your place of employment or your developments' club house. CBC, Unit 160, and the ACBL is actively trying to generate interest in the game of Bridge. Lessons and play at CBC begin on Sunday September 12, 1999. Speaking of *Easy Bridge*, George Nichols has requested volunteers to help with Name Tags, Refreshments, Parking, or as a Greeter. It would be nice to have three or four volunteers every week, so if you can participate in any way please give George a call.


