## All Change At The Top

In Round 19, El Ahly (1) and El Gezira (1) had whitewashes. In the second round of the day Protec and El Ahly (1) were the biggest winners. It is a case of another change at the top of the standings. Protec have regained the lead whilst last weekend's leader, Sporting have slipped to fourth. El Gezira (1) and Heliopolis are just ahead of Sporting but less than fifteen points separate the top four teams. Tomorrow sees the last two rounds. In the final round Protec will take on Sporting which may well decide the overall result. Both Heliopolis and El Ahly (1) have Byes tomorrow so some of the results will be out of their hands.

## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"
YES NO
Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the offi cial starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Egypt League match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

For the first match of the day we will watch the match between two middle of the table teams: El Gezira (2) versus El Ahly (2).

Should North double or bid 1•? If you double then partner will never believe you have five of them, if you bid $1 \%$ you may well lose the spade suit. With partner having passed game does not look probable so one could argue (and I am not saying you should) that if you bid $1 \checkmark$ and miss a spade fit it will not be disastrous but if you double and partner has a fit for hearts he will not realise the full value of it. At this table North took the route of a double and South could not find a bid which left East/West an easy path to Four Spades. The play need not detain us as declarer correctly played the trump suit and made eleven black tricks.


In this room when North overcalled with One Heart South not only realised he had a ninth trump but a tenth and eleventh as well upping the offensive value of the hand enormously and in a Meckstothian way raised to game (partner had freely supported his six-card major). South's offensive value may be strong but defensive values are sadly lacking and the wise decision was made to retreat to Five Hearts. The lead of the ace of clubs was followed by a diamond switch. Should declarer take a heart finesse of play for the drop. There does not appear to be any compelling reason for one play or the other. If you get it right you make your contract. If the contract is making then East/West should go on to Five Spades. If they do go on to Five Spades they will make it if the hearts are 2-0, so you need to defend the case where your other pair bid Five Spades and it is failing and it only fails if the hearts are 1-1 so my somewhat convoluted logic suggests you should play for the drop. You are now one off but as long as the other room is playing in spades you are making a profit and indeed El Ahly (2) gained six IMPs.

Again a case of a 19-20 2NT opener, almost every hand I have kibitzed where someone has opened a 19 point 2NT it seems to head for a bad result. Poor
old South has little option but to bid a doomed 3NT. When one hand holds the vast majority of the points, low count 3NT are much less likely to make than if the points are evenly divided. It was the case here, after a heart lead declarer was booked for two down.

North took my preferred option and open One Club and came to rest in an excellent part-score, making an overtrick and eight IMPs for El Ahly (2).

North led the ace of diamonds, to the 2,6 and 7. North had to decide whether to continue diamonds or switch. He knows his partner has close to yarborough so there are not going to be tricks from honour cards in South's hand. He knows South's diamond holding is one or three cards, If three then declarer must be 4414 with all the missing high honours and looks set to garner ten tricks. The only hope is that partner has a singleton diamond and so can defeat the contract with a diamond ruff. But North switched to a club, no doubt seeing the illusion of setting up a diamond trick for declarer.

North was prepared to take a minor risk and continued with diamonds and got his side's ruff and so defeated the contract by one trick. Twelve more IMPs to El Ahly (2).

If I had had to add a by-line to this deal it would have been 'Silence is Golden'. We all like to bid but sometimes the Green Card is the right bid. Those four hearts in East's hand are not exactly a huge asset, if you really want to bid why not await developments and make a decision one round later. Notice how North kept silent, suddenly a 16 point hand has slipped in value to closer to 12 but has excellent defensive possibilities. South led the $>7$ to the $\Psi A$ and a spade was returned to dummy's king. Declarer tried a heart from dummy and North leapt up with the king and gave his partner a ruff. Three more tricks from a crossruff by the defence and a trump trick still to come meant this low-level vulnerable contract failed by two tricks.

At this table it was East who realised the power of silence and so North/South played in $2 \boldsymbol{\text { ® }}$, another contract that failed by two tricks, so a simple partscore hand had cost El Ahly (2) seven IMPs

It was immediately evident that North had mislicked but as East had passed and West led before a TD arrived there was little that could be done.

South had little option but to bid 3NT and although it is possible to make 3 NT without the aid of the heart suit the remarkable distribution of the club suit, i.e. the singleton gave declarer an entry to dummy and finished up with twelve tricks but only eleven IMPs to El Ahly (2).

I do not understand the logic of opening this hand with One Heart - you can never get your distribution across after starting this way. Looking at the hands you want to be in Six Clubs, a 76\% chance slam. It is better than the heart slam as there is no chance of a club ruff and you can also cope with five hearts in the East hand. I cannot see from where East thinks three defensive tricks will arrive and the rash double was duly punished. Declarer easily making twelve tricks for an unusual way to score 1400.

Again the same opening and again the same mystery to me as to why one would so do. To compound the error South found a way of going down in a contract at the five-level when if actually playing slam would have made it. On the lead of a small diamond declarer won with the ace and played ace and another heart staking all on a 3-2 break in the trump suit. The actual distribution saw declarer forced with a diamond and now three trump tricks
had to be lost for an ignominious seventeen IMPs to El Gezira (2). Declarer's play is correct if the trumps are 3-2 and the clubs 2-0. If one is in the slam you have no alternative to crossing to dummy with a club and running the $\geqslant 10$, which in this case will bring home twelve tricks.

When the final whistle blew El Ahly (2) had beaten El Gezira (2) by 47-29.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

## Round Robin 20

At the start of the day Heliopolis and El Ahly (1) were lying third and fifth in the standings. Both had an outside chance of making it to the top. Both teams have a bye tomorrow so they can count on twelve points for one of their matches.

After the opening diamond lead ducked by East declarer had eight top tricks and so needed to establish a ninth. It was possible in all three of the other suits. Ideally it would be best not to lose the lead as the defence might have four diamonds to cash. To that end it seemed as though the spade suit fulfilled all the necessary criteria. Declarer crossed to dummy with a club and led a spade to the ten, though this lost to the queen the diamonds broke 4-4 and so declarer had nine tricks.

Declarer received the same lead and so faced the same problem. This declarer tried a different tack. Firstly cashing three rounds of hearts, perhaps
hoping for $\uparrow$ J98 trebleton (about 2\%) and when that failed to materialise cashed the king of clubs and although no honour appeared continued with another for the ace, setting up yet another trick for the defence. The ace of spades followed and then an unsuccessful spade finesse. West now led a diamond to partner's ace and the Q was cashed, East, no doubt, bemused by declarer's play failed to cash the master heart, which cost an IMP, but returned a diamond for West to take two tricks, the contract down and twelve IMPs El Ahly (1).

I saw no alert on South's opening 1 NT bid so I assume it must have been of the $15-17$ variety and probably one of the spades had been missorted into the hearts. The upshot was that South arrived in Four Hearts. The contract is surprisingly interesting. It can be defeated but needs good defence, also if the defence is not perfect then it needs good declarer play, let us see who prevails. West found the only lead whereby the defence can win, a small spade. At the table East won with the ace and returned a spade and now with the hearts 2-2 declarer was easily home. To beat the contract East must duck! And now if declarer plays ace and another trump East wins and switches to the J which runs round to dummy's
to establish the spades East pushes another club through for two club tricks. Declarer's alternative approach is since dummy's 8 won the first trick he can duck a heart in to West's hand, thereby depriving East of one of his entries but now the defence has another string to their bow, when in with the trump West now plays a spade to East's ace, takes the club return and gives partner a spade ruff. As I said, not an easy defence to find.

When I saw this hand I thought 'Ah we actually have a hand that might be passed out'. You can see how nearly right I was as four rounds of bidding landed West in Four Clubs. It is marginally amusing that in spite of all that bidding the declaring side never managed to mention their 4-4 majorsuit fit. I think that had East bid One Spade rather than doubling then it might have boded better. The defence lost the obvious four tricks, two diamonds and two spades for one off.

When North declined to enter the auction it left the way clear for East/West to soar to the dizzy heights of Four Spades, Which surprisingly had chances. To beat the contract South has to lead a diamond and with that holding and no bid from North it was not likely. Declarer's task was made easy when South chose a heart and now a diamond
loser could be quickly discarded on a heart and then it did not matter that the $\mathbf{Q}$ was offside. Another ten IMPs to El Ahly (1).
