## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows : EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the League matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text
Want to substitute
Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egypt League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"
YES NO
Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the offi cial starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Egypt League match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

It cannot be too frequent that one sees a) a twelve loser hand and $b$ ) a free bid with such a hand. For it to pay off 3 s must make and $4 \boldsymbol{\square}$ must only go down one trick. If one is a believer in the Losing Trick Count then partner would need a three loser hand to justify South's bidding. I leave it to the discerning reader to decide if that is probable. The defence, which was not difficult, took the maximum and the contract failed by three tricks.

A pragmatic bid by North, it is almost impossible for South to hold an ace and two kings so the small slam will be a good bet. Declarer had no problem with the play. The main point of which is the correct handling of the trump suit. After the initial lead of a heart won in hand the correct play of a small club towards dummy loses no tricks whenever West has the singleton $\mathbf{~ K}$, doubleton K or K87 as the $\$ 10$ falls under the queen (about $33 \%)$. Starting with the J has the same chances except that it will lose a trick whenever West has the K singleton.

Dummy was entered by a heart to attempt to ruff another clubs but this was overruffed by West, who exited with a diamond. Declarer could now play a trump from dummy, East did best by rising with the ace and pushing another club through. Declarer rose with the trump king and when the
other two outstanding trumps fell under the queen declarer was home. 10 IMPs for Sporting.

After a couple of cue-bids the contract of $4 \checkmark$ was settled upon. Again the lead was the 10 taken in dummy with the ace. Aheart back to hand and a club then towards the king saw North split his honours as it lost to the ace. South could have immediately broken the contract by playing $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ and another but he returned a heart won in hand before playing a diamond that North took with his ace. He then exited with the E ruffed in hand. Declarer played a spade towards dummy, more in hope than expectation, and of course South won the trick cheaply. Yet again South had the chance to play the $\Phi \mathrm{K}$ to take the contract one off but declined and exited with a club, ruffed in hand, the two diamond honours were cashed and a small trump led to dummy's ten. The from dummy was now presented and

South, perhaps having had a small siesta part way through the play of the hand now had to discard on the 9 from dummy. As you may guess from the number of times South should have played the $₫ \mathrm{~K}$ this was the occasion when he should not, but did, and thus declarer made an impossible contract. So 12 IMPs to El Zohour.

Had West not led a diamond declarer should have made all the tricks as there is a minor suit squeeze against East for the thirteenth trick.

When North responds at the two-level it is not necessary for South to jump, the auction is not going to die in the immediate future. After the support from North, South can instigate a cue-bidding sequence that will see then to the excellent slam. The better bidding was worth 13 IMPs to Sporting. In a high scoring game Sporting came out on top 65-27.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

A more exciting auction. One might say that North's double turned out well as it is possible a slam might have been reached. The wisdom of such doubles is not immediately apparent to me but it appears that recently there has been a sale on red cards and people are eager to get their money's worth. If the auction should go ‘All Pass’ then you will be happy, the contract might fail by a trick but you know partner is not awash with defence after his spade pre-empt. All you have done is tell the opposition where the diamond honours
are situated. North led the 8 which as taken in dummy. The was unblocked and a spade ruffed in dummy. The king and ace of hearts were next and when a spade was led towards dummy North ruffed with his jack. He exited with a heart ruffed with the ten in dummy. A diamond back to the ace allowed declarer to cash the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ and exit with a small trump and then North had to find a lead from $\star$ K9 whilst declarer retained $\uparrow$ Q4 and so declarer took his tenth trick and scored 920 which was worth 7 IMPs to Protec.
