## The End Of The First Weekend

Session 3 of the Round Robin saw Protec score another maximum while both El Ahly (2) and El Gezira (2) had fine wins. Session 4 showed what an up and down game bridge can be as Wadi Degla went from a zero to a maximum, with El Gezira (1) only two IMPs for a maximum.

At the top of the standings Protec have a substantial lead but there are four teams behind them all within four VPs of one another, they are Heliopolis, El Gezira (1), Sporting and El Ahly (2).

## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"

Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the offi cial starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of Egypt League InterClub match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

If East/West are really playing a 14-17 no-trump then perhaps this hand will convince them to change their mind. I agree they are a trifle unlucky in that South has an obvious diamond lead and even more unlucky in that 3NT makes all the time because the diamonds are blocked and only four can be cashed.

Strangely on this hand East did not alert his 1NT as 14-17. When South started with a small diamond declarer won with the $\$ 10$, cashed five rounds of clubs and then led a heart. When South leapt up with the ace, ten tricks were assured.

West, perhaps taking a rosy view of his four nines invited to game and was accepted. South happened upon the lead of a small spade to the ace with a continuation of the 10 covered by the queen and king and then cleared the suit. A heart towards dummy was won by the king, this showed that the heart ace was not with two winning spades. Five rounds of clubs followed leaving $>\mathrm{Q}^{9}$ and Q9 in dummy. Knowing that only two diamonds were outstanding declarer cashed the ace. At this point declarer can lead any card from hand to make the contract, the only continuation to go down is to play a small heart and then put in the 99 in dummy. Yes, you guessed it, declarer snatched defeat from the jaws of victory. Declarer knows South still has the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ and therefore has one heart
and one spade or two hearts, if it is one heart then North has three including the ace, if it is two then North originally had five spades and we know from earlier that if that was the case then with the ace of hearts the contract would have been down a lot earlier. QED South has the $\vee$ A. So 6 IMPs to El Gezira (1) rather than the opposite score.

The lead of the 9 found the queen for declarer but it was not enough to allow the contract to make as declarer could mot avoid the loss of a trump, two diamonds and a club, so the contract failed by one trick.

This sequence is the real reason I included this deal. All bulletin journalists live to report a Biltcliffe coup. This has four parts, 1) the auction could have been passed out in a part-score 2 ) a bid is made and then the opposition continues to game 3) the game contract is doubled 4) finally the contract is made. West could have passed out $3 \vee$ but he took a bid, the opposition continued to game,

West then doubled. Would the game be made and a report of a Biltcliffe coup appear in the bulletin, sadly not for there was no way for declarer to engineer a tenth trick so two IMPs to Heliopolis.

I am not sure what South was trying to say with his 3 bid but obviously it was showing some strength. North kept his powder dry awaiting developments and when East attempted to steal the contract he entered the fray with his heart suit. I would be grateful if someone could explain the logic of East's Double, his defensive assets appear to be the chance of a trump trick (and even that did not come to fruition) and it got the result it deserved. When declarer took a successful finesse in the trump suit he was rewarded with an overtrick. The club slam was always there but would one want to be there it requires the hearts to come in without loss and after the weak two bid that does not seem overly likely. Notice that had West switched to a club at trick two after winning the opening spade lead the contract would have only just made.

South did not have a difficult bid after his partner's Double and even less trouble making his contract on the lead of a small spade which declarer ducked twice, so he lost two spades and a heart.

South may have been over optimistic in his expectations in defence. To show a profit by passing you will need to take the contract three down as you must believe you have a certain game. Additionally defending low-level doubled contracts can be tricky and frequently a trick can be lost in the defence which was the case here as declarer was permitted to ruff a heart in dummy and so escaped for one off and ten IMPs to Heliopolis.

Surely South misclicked, but he was rewarded in the end as East and West climbed too high and with four major suit losers the contract was two off. And eight IMPs to El Gezira (1).

At the end of the match neither side had much to cheer about, Heliopolis shaded it by 33-26

## An Interesting Deal

Session Two of the Round Robin produced an interesting play and defence hand towards the end of the match.


At nearly all the tables the contract was 3NT played by West. Of the nine times it was played it failed three times, unfortunately not because the defence was at its best but because declarer did not make the most of his opportunity. At two tables on the lead of the $\boldsymbol{\top}$ declarer played the $\boldsymbol{\mathrm { K }}$ from dummy, a play I find surprising. The lead suggests that North also holds the 10 and thus playing small from dummy would give one a finesse position, so playing the king led to defeat. Let us see how the hand should be played.

North leads the $\mathbf{\$ J}$, small from dummy and South wins with his ace. Now the obvious switch to clubs with the 8 , declarer correctly ducks and North wins with his queen. He can exit safely with a spade. Declarer may need to preserve entries to dummy and so plays low and South discards the 7 .

The general plan is to either make two heart tricks or force North to lead a club into the tenace. From the play of the hand you know North has six spades and the KQ with probably just one other, this leaves four red cards. How do you read North's distribution, the more likely is $2-2$ in the red suits. If you assume that this is the distribution then your best hope is he has the V J doubleton.

So armed with this plan declarer now has to take four diamond tricks finishing in dummy. This calls for careful management of the spot cards. Play the $\downarrow 7$ to the ace and then the $\downarrow 2$ to the king and then the $\$ 10$ to the queen. This leaves the $\diamond 5$ in dummy and the $\$ 3$ in hand. Now cash the last round of diamonds and lead a heart towards your queen. Is North wide awake? If so he can thwart your plan by throwing his jack under your queen. It is your lucky day as North plays a small heart. You now cross to dummy with a spade and lead the $\vee 8$. What is South to do? If he rises with the ace the $\geqslant \mathrm{K}$ becomes your ninth trick and if he plays small then North must win and can cash a spade but then lead into the club tenace and poor old South goes to bed with the $\vee$ A.

If you believe that North has three hearts and one diamond then you can make the contract without an error by North if he holds either or both of the YJ10. At the point where you started to cash the diamonds just take one round to enter dummy and lead the $\geqslant$. If South ducks you run it to North who will exit with a spade and you can now lead another heart towards your queen thereby setting up a second heart trick. Any other play by South either immediately gives you two hearts tricks or exposes North's honour to a finesse.

Those hearts spots were vitally important as was their location.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

Sporting had had a nice lie in as they had a bye in the first match of the day. Would they be refreshed and in tip top form or still slightly sluggish with sleep still in their eyes. El Ahly (1) would be hopeful it was the latter.

When a diamond was led West took both his honours in hand and crossed to the ace of trumps to discard a club on the ace of diamonds. He now had eleven tricks.

Here North led the PQ to declarer's ace. He unblocked the diamonds and attempted to cross to dummy with a heart ruff, he was soon a wiser and poorer declarer as South overruffed, cashed the \& AK and led another to allow North to make his $\dagger \mathrm{K}$. Crossing to the trump ace rather than ruffing a heart is a form of safety play, after that the defence would only possibly have two trump tricks and a club trick between them. 11 IMPs to El Ahly (1).

Declarer received the lead of the $\geqslant 10$, taken in hand and immediately set about the club suit. North went in immediately with the ace and continued with a diamond. Declarer took this in dummy and came to hand with the ace of trumps to take a successful club finesse. A small spade brought the jack from South, queen and North's king. A heart continuation was ruffed in dummy and the $\$ 10$ drew the outstanding trump. The K provided a parking spot for the losing heart and declarer could concede a diamond trick and have the rest for a well-played hand and the contract.

The same heart lead went to declarer's ace and a heart was ruffed in dummy. The spade was now attacked and a small one was ducked round to North who exited with a diamond. Declarer was in all sorts of trouble now and could not avoid going down. As is often the case the important step was to immediately tackle the club suit, also
declarer's play in the trump in the other room was well reasoned as the second round will probably expose the situation and save you from having to make a guess. 12 IMPs to El Ahly (1).

East got the hand off his chest in one simple manoeuvre. North doubled and South had to decide whether this was based on defensive tricks or was for takeout. As South I would have taken the double out but then I have sight of all four hands but I am in no way dogmatic about it. It is not possible to always make the right choice when the opposition have pre-empted. Declarer lost the obvious two diamond tricks and scored up 750.

East took a more measured view of his hand and decided to open at the one-level and keep bidding clubs until the opposition ran out ideas. The problem with his plan was that the opposition ran out of ideas too early and so he was left in $4 *$ making eleven tricks and so lost 12 IMPs to El Ahly (1).

When the full time whistle blew El Ahly (1) had won by 44-15.
