## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"

Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the official starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Pan Arab InterClub match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

A bold bid by North to bid game, some might have just invited. West decided against leading the unbid suit and tried declarer's by placing a small diamond on the virtual table, declarer perforce won with the ace in dummy and took five rounds of clubs, West shedding two diamonds and a heart and East a spade and a heart. Declarer exited with a heart to West's queen and for reasons unexplained failed to cash the ace of hearts, West has already seen three hearts from the South hand (two were discarded on the clubs) and he cannot possibly have a fourth or he would have responded One Heart. West persevered with the $\underline{Q}$ and South, perhaps realising that West did not have the correct view ducked and was rewarded when West continued spades allowing an unmakeable contract to succeed. Fortune certainly favoured the brave on this deal.

With one of the two red suit finesses working and when the defence decided against cashing their ace of clubs an overtrick was conceded.

At last the Biltcliffe coup for which I have been waiting. West could have passed out $2 \propto$ but elected to bid on. North was not going to keep quiet with his hand, even though $4 \checkmark$ should fail by two tricks, he elected to go for the minor suit game. Now step three of the coup, West doubled and as we shall see step four will come to fruition.

Had West led a heart the outcome may well have been different but he chose the $\uparrow$. Too late he now switched to the $\geqslant$ J taken by declarer's ace. The J was now advanced ducked by West while declarer threw a heart from dummy. The queen was covered by the ace and ruffed in dummy where the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ was cashed, rendering the 8 master. When it was played East ruffed but South overruffed and cashed the K discarding his losing heart in dummy and now the only loser was the ace of trumps. Eleven tricks.

North could do little else as he did not value his club void when he knew that it was partner's second suit. At this table West demonstrated that an
initial heart lead will hold declarer to ten tricks. The effect of the lead is that declarer cannot get back to hand to cash winning clubs and so has to lose a heart. Nine IMPs to Sporting.

A club came back taken in hand and another diamond led towards dummy. This time declarer rose with the king, which held, and cleared the diamonds to give him three diamonds, three clubs, two hearts and a spade and ten IMPs to El Ahly (2)

Not an easy contract, but not impossible. West cashed the ace of diamonds and exited with a trump. Declarer drew them all and took an extra round, discarding one of each suit from dummy. He then cashed the A and followed with the queen. West was awake and did not take his king. Declarer cashed the and exited with a spade. West then took his Q and exited with the final spade and so declarer then had to concede a trick to the K . Had he not cashed the A before exiting All West could do would be to play back his last spade and then A and another would crush the opposition. If West does not unblock his Q then he will have to give dummy the $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ and if he does unblock then the $\mathbf{j 1 0}$ are enough to establish a second club trick.

On the lead of the declarer was not required to exercise much grey matter to arrive a $t$ ten tricks and six IMPs to El Ahly (2).

At the end the session both teams could look back at things that might have been different but after sixteen boards only one IMP separated the two teams as El Ahly (2) had won 37-36. If either team wishes to challenge for the top spot then they will need to exercise more care.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

## A Look Back to Last Weekend

Last weekend there were some hands that looked normal, even close to dull, but on further inspection some of them proved very interesting indeed, especially those from the first session of the second day. Here is one.


Most Wests opened 1 and a large number of West responded 1 1 . I prefer a bid of $1 \vee$, why? Because if partner has a four-card major it will not get lost, however if you respond $1 \boldsymbol{\alpha}$ then even if partner has four hearts it may be difficult to get them into the auction. I saw this happen a couple of times and the final contract was a miserable $2 \boldsymbol{1}$ played by East. However when East bids $1 \geqslant$ it is not difficult to finish in the heart game. When West supports hearts East hand rockets in value - remember that ninth trump is worth a huge amount so even if West only invites game you should accept. The play is interesting. There is a lead to beat the contract but can you see it, even with all four hands exposed, I suspect not immediately. I also suggestt you would not underlead your ace of spades at the table, but that is the only way to break the contract. To make (or break in case of declarer error) requires precise play. The Achilles heel for declarer are, amazingly the 87 in the South hand, also he must try and avoid a trump lead from North.

On the normal lead of the king of diamonds obviously declarer must win. Whilst there do not seem to be many losers, neither do there seem to
be many tricks, the plan must be to establish two club tricks to go with the ace of diamonds and make seven trump tricks by way of a crossruff. I will spell out the way the contract can be made and give a brief explanation as to why other lines will fail (which are many) it is a surprisingly interesting hand and I do recommend getting a pack of cards out and playing through the various lines - I think, at times, you will be surprised.

So at trick one we win with the ace of diamonds. The only way to make the contract is to immediately ruff a diamond. The intuitive play of a club towards the queen loses if South ducks! He then takes the second round and continues with a third. This will lead to a second trump trick for South try it and see. If instead a low spade was led with the idea of setting up a crossruff North rises with the king and switches to a trump and now you when you attack clubs South can draw some of your trumps leaving you short.

So after ruffing a diamond you must tackle the clubs, if you play a spade North will win and yet again push a trump through. South will win and can now put partner in with a spade to lead a trump but you rise with the ace and now peacefully go about your crossruff, cashing your clubs on the way. Eventually you will make the final heart in your hand en passant when you lead the fourth round of spades from dummy.

So to make this contract against best defence (after the $\diamond$ K lead) you must immediately ruff a diamond, establish the clubs and then duck a spade, if during all this North gets a chance to lead a trump you rise with the ace. When all of this has been accomplished you set about your crossruff, making the final trump in your hand en passant to loud cheers from your supporters.

There were a couple of 'joke' hands.

3NT played from the West is ice cold! Thanks to the void in clubs in the North hand, the jack and ten of diamonds being tripleton, the queen and jack of spades being doubleton and the ace of hearts on side. My guesstimate of the chances of this contract? About one chance in ten thousand.

Six Spades from the West hand is another making contract, again thanks to the void in the club suit in the North hand. This contract is an outright certainty at about $0.2 \%$ chance compared with the previous deal. There is one sad person who managed to fail in the contract of $4 \boldsymbol{4}$. They received a heart lead which they won in hand, unblocked the $\checkmark$ KQ and tried to ruff a heart in dummy. They were rudely awakened when South overruffed, cashed the AK and led a third to ensure a trick for his partner's trump king.

I appreciate that West liked his hand and that there was not much room for manoeuvre but is it likely that East can cover four of the five losers in the red suits. An interesting question to check with your partner is what is the meaning of the East's Double, assuming that West's 3 e was forcing to game. Hopefully his answer will be the same as yours. South was not hard pressed to double and the contract duly failed by one trick. The good news was that the double showed no loss. Undoubled the loss
was 12 IMPs, exactly the same as when doubled.
