## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO ) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"
YES NO
Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the official starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Pan Arab InterClub match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

How many trump tricks do you need to double a part-score contract, apparently West thinks that four is insufficient. I am confident that a double in that position should be punitive. I understand the reluctance to double a part-score into game but there have to be some risks taken, all you need are two tricks from partner who opened first in hand and if he has opened extremely light playing in 3e cannot possibly a disaster if he removes your double. Declarer had only six tricks and so was two off.

After the defence cashed two rounds of spades they switched to hearts and declarer then set about establishing the clubs before tackling trumps and so made his contract.

There is one declarer who is poorer but wiser
after playing the same contract and not recalling the maxim of establishing the side suit before touching trumps. He received a trump lead which was taken in dummy and then cashed the $\vee \mathrm{A}$ and ruffed a heart. He tried a low spade towards hand but North hopped up with his king to lead another trump. This was won in hand but the 4-1 break was exposed and the hand now just fell to pieces and he ended up three down - difficult to explain that one to your team mates.

A spade to the king and the return taken by the queen. West now fell from grace by continuing spades. He knows North has the 10 for multiple reasons. Firstly with four spades East would not have passed 14, with just three spades declarer would probably have held up and thirdly when

West returned a spade and East held $\mathbf{~ K} 10$ then he would have won with the $\mathbf{1} 10$. So to what suit should West switch, obviously not hearts, obviously not diamonds, and , oh, by the way, which suit did East bid? Clubs, so why not try a club you will be +100 rather -120 .

North made the good start of of the $>7$ to South's king and the equally good return of the $\downarrow$ Q was made, ducked and the $\$ J$ followed. This time declarer took his ace and tried the $\boldsymbol{1}$ ducked by North. A small spade towards the king held the trick and now a small heart for the jack and queen. Now all North had to do was cash his top tricks and play a heart to South who could then take the setting trick with the $\$ 10$ but no North gave away the contract by switching to a club. Another no hope contract succeeds. Five IMPs to Sporting.

At the end of the session in a very low scoring game - the biggest swing on any board was seven IMPs - Sporting edged Wadi Degla 22-10. Three of the other matches did not find these boards so flat as there were scores 59-31, 69-11 and 72-17.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

The good news was that the trumps behaved kindly, the broke 5-5. It rarely is good for a team to be playing in the same suit in both rooms and so it was here: thirteen IMPs to El Gezira (1).

If North felt he must bid for a second time then I think he would have done better to bid $4 \diamond$. He can almost guarantee that his partner will bid $4 \vee$ if he doubles. The defence started with their singleton diamond and when declarer took a losing heart finesse he suffered the ignominy of two diamond ruffs and still had a spade to lose and so was three off. Yet again there seems to have been a bidding misunderstanding. Probably starting with the $3 \&$ bid, either an immediate bid of $4 \checkmark$ to get the hand off your chest or a double and then you can bid both of your suits would seem to be better options. I suspect 4 NT was meant to be natural but the misunderstanding rolled on with a momentum of its own - unstoppable until the six-level was reached. Yet again Burn's law has been broken and again in diamonds and at a higher level, at this rate we will have a contract of 7 with a 1-1 fit soon. This was fourteen iMPs to El Ahly (3).
