## The Penultimate Weekend

After the marathon of five matches last weekend a less frenetic four matches are being played this weekend. In the first session Protec and Sporting were the big winners. In the second round Wadi Degla and Heliopolis amassed big scores. In the standings Protec maintain a 25 point lead and there is a challenging group of three teams: Heliopolis, Sporting and El Gezira (1) who have broken away from the rest of the pack by over twenty points. It will be hard for those to make it up into the medal positions.

## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"
YES NO
Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the offi cial starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Egypt League match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

West led the singleton ten of clubs to the king and East took the ace and switched to a spade. West won and continued the suit won by the jack in dummy. Declarer needed to tackle trumps, there was perhaps a slight indication that West was short in clubs and thus had more vacant spaces whether this was South's reasoning I do not know but he elected to finesse against West and so made his contract.


Oh dear, Exactly the same auction and lead, am I in for yet another flat board. The play diverged at
trick one when East ducked the opening club lead. South had the same problem as to how the trumps should be tackled and the choice was against East. This resulted in twelve IMPs for Sporting.

West made the correct assumption that South's major was not hearts. East led the queen of hearts which West overtook and tried to cash another heart. Now North vould make his contract. West needed either to lead a diamond or to play partner for the ace of clubs and thus a club ruff. The heart continuation allowed declarer to finesse successfully against the jack of clubs and so discard his losing diamond.

West ventured a penalty double with his five-card trump holding after partner's takeout double. East unfortunately chose to lead a spade which went to the jack king and ace. The king of clubs followed ducked by East. A small spade brought the queen from East who cashed the ace of clubs with declarer dropping the jack. A club continuation was ruffed by West who led a diamond to dummy's ace. A diamond was ruffed and declarer exited with a small trump to East who played another diamond, again ruffed by declarer. A spade went to dummy's ten and declarer was now guaranteed two more trump tricks to bring home his game.

I do not know whether North was playing a 19-20 opening 2 NT or had 'borrowed' a point. If the former then I do not understand why South would want to be in game and if the latter then he will find himself frequently in no-hope games. We all understand the rewards of bidding game but the concept of needing 25 points for 3NT has a substantial amount of history behind it as does 3NT not making on a combined 23 count. An unnecessary 6 IMPs to Heliopolis.

Having initially passed North denied the opposition any chance of entering the auction by bidding game - there are perhaps some that say he might be worth a splinter bid of $4 \diamond$ as there could easily be some South hands where slam could be on, for example give South the king of spades instead of his small club. Playing at the four-level was not difficult and in fact when declarer elected to tackle the hearts the right way round he ended up with an overtrick as when the queen fell he had for heart tricks and could discard a club and just lose two trump tricks.

North decided to take the long road to game and the upshot was it gave East a chance to speak and quickly a good save in Five Diamonds was reached - it is only three off non-vulnerable against a vulnerable game. North now had a difficult decision to make and he chose to bid one for the road. Now declarer's task was more difficult. When he found he had two trump losers he could not afford to misguess in the rounded suits. He chose to play East for the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$ and that led to a swift one down and thirteen IMPs to Heliopolis.

I do not understand the point of North's Double if he is going to bid 3NT over South's response. It looks as though the defence have six tricks to cash, and indeed they have, the only problem is that they must cash them and this is where the defence fell down. A heart was led and won in dummy with the king. Declarer played another heart taken by East who led the $\mathbf{~} 10$. West needed to take his ace and switch to a diamond but he let the spade run into North's hand who now had an unexpected nine tricks and an even more unexpected, but much needed, twelve IMPs to El Gezira (2).

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.
