## Information for Captains

## Very important notes, Kindly circulate to all of your players

1. The BBO accounts for the TDs are as follows :

EBF, EBF_1, EBF_2, EBF_3, EBF_4 and EBF_5
2. At the beginning of each match/session, the TDs have to start more than one table at the same time in order to host all the championship matches and they place the players in their seats according to pre-sent line-up.... Sometimes, we have a late offline players (please check the event regulations for penalty of late arrival at BBO) and this may cause some delay in the other matches/tables.
In order for the TDs to avoid this, they will hold an empty seat for you and they will move to host another match and then back to the late table. For that reason, it is quiet normal that your players might have a message from the TD through the BBO server with the following text

## Want to substitute

Would you like to play in Teams tournament \# xxxxxx Teams "Egyptian League as a substitute? Your partner will be xxxxxxxx"
YES NO
Please alert your players to accept this request ASAP.

## *VERY IMPORTANT NOTES *

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.
Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the offi cial starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the Egypt League match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section ) and wait for our invitation.

On a diamond lead declarer immediately cleared the spade suit and when a club was returned he ducked once before cashing his thirteenth spade and setting up a diamond for his ninth trick．

Again a diamond lead won in hand and followed by a spade to dummy．Now declarer erred from the straight and narrow by ducking a heart won by North who immediately attacked clubs．The contract could now no longer be made as neither of the majors broke kindly．Had he just relied on a 4－2 spade break he would have been home．He was unfortunate as relying on the spade break may have failed with the loss of three club tricks a dia－ mond and a spade．One of the majors breaking
$3-3$ is over $60 \%$, so an unlucky line. Twelve more IMPs to Protec who had started off with 25 unanswered points over the first four boards - it looked as though it was going to be a 'usual' Protec match.

In this room East and West were not given the opportunity of helping declarer in the bidding. East led the $\uparrow$ K which declarer ducked but he took the continuation. The ace of trumps was cashed and had declarer continued with another high trump he would have been home but he played a small heart which West gratefully took with his jack and gleefully gave his partner a heart ruff. Next the ace of clubs and a club ruff brought about declarer's discomfort, especially when he found that the Q was doubleton. Eight IMPs to Heliopolis.

After West signed off after the $5 \boldsymbol{2}$ bid I do not see the reasoning by East for advancing to the slam. With the trumps 3-0 offside it was a forlorn affair but even had the trumps been kinder it would still have been a poor contract and failed unless the diamond suit had no losers.

Strangely the effect of the more vigorous preempt stopped East in his tracks and so he rested in 5 $\boldsymbol{\omega}$. After the club lead established a club trick for declarer he played well, playing three rounds of trumps, winning the heart return, cashing his club winner, eliminating the club suit and then exiting with a heart. South elected to exit with the $\$ 10$ - had he stopped to count declarer's hand he should have realised that a ruff and discard was of no use to him and thus could have played a heart and left declarer to try and find the actual layout of the diamond suit. Thirteen IMPs to Heliopolis.

On a diamond lead declarer won in dummy and promptly lead a heart towards the king which held, a low trump followed taken by East's ace. A small club ensued which declarer took in hand and unblocked the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ before crossing to dummy with a club to cash the $\uparrow$ Q discarding a spade, a further round of diamonds ruffed established the thirteenth one and now a club ruff gave declarer and embarrassment of riches when the queen fell. West was welcome to take his master trump whenever he liked and then the rest of the tricks were declarer's.

The defence got off to a better start when a spade was led which was won in dummy. Two rounds of clubs were followed by a third round ruffed in dummy. Declarer now tried to cash three rounds of diamonds to discard his losing spade but East ruffed with the jack of trumps and declarer ditched his loser. A club from East now allowed West to ruff
in with the ten and a fourth round of diamonds saw East ruff with his ace leaving West with still a trump trick to come for one down. The defence had made four of their five trumps and no other tricks and yet another eleven IMPs to Heliopolis.

On Board 12 Helipolis gained another six IMPs when they made a part-score in both rooms.

A heart lead would have put the contract beyond the reach of declarer but a club lead gave hope, especially when the eight in dummy held. The four of trumps was next and when East played the two dummy contributed the six! To make the contract the ace of clubs needs to be cashed to discard a
heart before leading a diamond but declarer started immediately on the diamonds to the queen and ace. When declarer now played a second round of diamonds to West he could lead a high heart giving the defence two tricks. Now declarer could not avoid either a defensive ruff or trump trick so he was one off.

Played by North in this room declarer was treated to the ace of hearts lead which made his job much less difficult. There followed a game of ping pong where both sides attempted to aid the other but the final piece of self-immolation was performed by East and declarer came home, no doubt with increased blood pressure and a racing heart but it was a much needed twelve IMPs to Protec and saved slightly more than one victory point.

At the end of a rollercoaster ride Heliopolis had done themselves a power of good by beating Protec 76-37.

## Undo regulations

1. The undo button is activated from the beginning
2. Click the undo button to stop the play instead of typing STOP at the table chat.... It will be used just as a stop button.
3. Call the TD
4. No Action from any party will be taken before the arrival of the TD.
5. The TD will instruct the opponents whether to accept the undo or not.
6. The TD will keep counting the undoes for each player, only 2 undoes are allowed for each player during one session.
7. If the opponents accept - before the TD arrival - , play continue but they might be penalized and all parties forfeit their rights for any kind of rectification later on.
8. If the opponents don't accept - before the TD arrival - , play stops and the TD decide what is to be done.
9. The TDs reserve the rights to adjust the score of the board for any unauthorised information might arise from using the undo process.
10. The Head TD has all the rights to deactivate the undo button at any time if problems arise from activating the button.

East was more sanguine about his hand and as he had no feature and was minimum he subsided into $4 \boldsymbol{4}$ - evn that required a modicum of care not to fail but he brought home ten tricks and fourteen IMPs for Sporting.

West would probably have liked to have manoeuvred the contract to be played by East as he was not sure as to whether East had the spade ace or the two missing kings, but when East decided to support diamonds rather than show the five-card heart suit it was not possible. With the lead of the ace of spades declarer could immediately claim twelve tricks.

the contract, also one's defence does not look that solid, you cannot expect two tricks from the club suit and it also appears that they have a double fit and they are notorious for throwing up strange results. Had East the gift of second sight the lead would have been a small club and then a major return would lead to one off, but when the king of clubs hit the notional baize there was no way back and North recorded +750 .

In this room East decided that he was going to play the contract come what may, probably thinking along the lines that his hand was worth a lot of tricks in offence but not that many in defence. He was certainly pleasantly rewarded when partner turned up with some pearls - the queen of clubs and a singleton diamond. When the spade finesse was successful he write down a score of +1540 . This equated to twenty IMPs to El Zohour - I do not recall seeing a bigger score this tournament - but if you want to try to beat, go ahead but please let me know so I can record it.
