




















EPC Bridge Weekend Away

What should we do differently next time?

- I would prefer a 10 am start.
- A 10 o'clock prompt start on the Sunday (in room for 9.50) would just allow that bit extra for check-out.
- Have morning session, particularly the final morning, start at 10am too rushed checking out etc.
- Make clear the time of the event finish is 2 pm instead of 1 pm then people can organise their home arrangements accordingly and not be anxious to leave.
- Make the Golf start later and just suggest 9 holes.
- Let the people who want to ask questions play together and the people who do not want to ask questions play together.
- Ongoing advice for weaker players, perhaps? So few beginners, I realise how difficult this is. So, smaller groups moving more often?
- For a beginner and a full-time worker there was too much bridge played - perhaps have the Friday or Saturday night off to relax and socialize with the group as a whole - there were definitely people I hardly spoke too. Obviously over a 3-night break this would work better.
- Whether we should encourage a better player to play with a lesser player for one of the sessions.
 Appreciate some would not want to do this! Would not want to put them off playing. Perhaps a price for people who play with different players.
- At one of the sessions it may be entertaining to pick partners out of a hat.
- Perhaps draw for partners each session.
- Speed up the competitive play
- Whether we should encourage a better player to play with a lesser player for one of the sessions.
 Appreciate some would not want to do this! Would not want to put them off playing. Perhaps a price for people who play with different players.
- An excellent weekend in a very comfortable, well located venue for the first, of hopefully many, Priory Bridge weekends... well done.
- All went really well.
- I'm not sure that the organisers could have done much more.
- Carry on as you are, I would say.







Timeline of Recent Key Events

2018

January: A 12 hour 'Crash Course for Beginners' was run by Adam Friase. 23 people participated.

2017

- February: Robby Lee redesigned our web site so it had more of an EPC branded design.
- April: Edgbaston Priory Team 2 win division four of the Warwickshire Teams League. (Captain: Marijke Rodrigo with Gerri Draysey, Annabel Hampson & Sue Froggatt.)
- May: New Sunday evening monthly courses started with Adam Fraise with new sets of practice boards to support.
 September: Biggest ever number of bridge tables (17!!) at the club for the charity event in aid of the Motor Neurone Disease Association and raised £1.705. Jill Turner won the 'Ann

Dawes' charity trophy for the best individual score and Mark Wainwright's Team (Mark, Janice Wainwright, Caroline Faulconbridge & Jill Turner) were best team - scoring 8,960

- points.
 November: First ever bridge weekend away for 33 EPC bridge players at Puckrup Hall near Tewkesbury.
- November: The Ken Franklin pairs trophy was introduced and won by Marijke Rodrigo and Mark Reuben.

2016

- February: Marijke Rodrigo, Jan Weston, Ray Fiveash and Sue Froggatt are voted on the new Bridge Committee with Andy Taylor.
- May: We had several members who qualified as official EBU Directors... Annabel Hampson, Chris Martin, Marijke Rodrigo, Mark Reuben and Sue Stone... plus Ray Fiveash who became a Director in 2017.
- Spring: Jan Weston introduces 'Learn and Play' sessions on Tuesday and Thursday mornings to help beginners practice.
- June: Ray Fiveash set up electronic scoring using BridgeMates.
- July: New leisure and lifestyle survey of club members indicates a significant latent demand for bridge... almost 30% of members have an interest in learning how to play or are currently playing bridge.
- July: Robby Lee designed a new logo for EPC bridge.
- July: Marijke Rodrigo set up a 'Bridge What's App' group.
- July: Annabel Hampson spoke to members about why they learned to play and like/love bridge... and these were added as "member who play" to our web site. (We have noticed are really popular with players!)
- Autumn: New bridge duplicate sessions introduced on Thursday and Sunday evenings.
- Autumn. New bridge duplicate sessions introduced on Triursday and Sunday evenings.
 September: The club enters three teams in Division Four of the Warwickshire Teams League.
- · October: New 'Bridge Bulletin' introduced.
- · December: New Xmas fun bridge and meal was added to the calendar of activity.
- December: Barbara Loyo-Mayo was named 'Best Improver of the Year' by Peter Nicholds.

2013

- Tuesday afternoon bridge was set up on Tuesday afternoons. Peter Nicholds recommended affiliating the club with the EBU (so members could earn Master Points), advised on equipment and establishing protocols, directed (with assistance from David Motley) and gave lessons for beginners and improvers. David also helped set up this website.
- A new Bridge Committee set up with Ken Franklin, Andy Taylor and Ann Dawes.



Right of appeal

EPC Bridge Players '12 Golden Guidelines'

... to make playing bridge at the club an exceptional experience and promote wellbeing

Our club has a new vision statement: To deliver an exceptional membership experience which promotes racquet sport and wellbeing. To contribute to this and ensure that playing bridge at the club is 'an exceptional membership experience' we have developed '12 Golden Guidelines' we recommend players abide by

- Don't keep fellow members waiting and give the director a headache by being late. Arrive 15 minutes before
 bridge is due to start and be seated at a table five minutes before play. This helps the director decide on the
 movement and means bridge will start on time.
- Warmly greet your new opponents with a smile when they arrive at your table and thank them before moving on to the next table. No matter how well you play bridge always be welcoming!
- 3. Your opponents are entitled to know the agreements that you and your partner have. So at the start of a round explain the main features of your system e.g. "We play Acol with strong twos". Ideally complete a systems card to disclose your conventions to your opponents as this helps saves time and makes things crystal clear for everyone.
- 4. Don't give your partner any 'unauthorised information' by:
- Taking a long time to make a call or play a card. If there is any hesitation in the bidding
 your partner must be extra careful not to draw any inference from this and bid as they
 would have done if there had been no hesitation. Bid and play your cards smoothly and in
- Changing your mind about what to bid when using bidding boxes, for example, by touching 2* and then
 pulling out a pass card. Decide what your bid is going to be before reaching for or touching cards in the
- Only ask what a bid means if you are intending to bid and it is your turn to bid or play. Remember, you must
 ask the partner of the player who made the bid, not the player who made it.
- Familiarise yourself with what bids need to be announced or alerted. You can find a summary here. Avoid asking opponents what a simple bid means after it is NOT alerted.
- It is very important to call the Director when you need to sort something out. Don't try to sort things out yourselves, even if you know the rule. Please don't get offended when a Director is called on you - this is part of the game and the director is there to help.
- 7. Handling the cards:
 - . Before you look at your cards count them to check you have thirteen
 - . Don't pick up and mix your cards at the end of a game until the result is agreed with the opponents
 - Shuffle your cards after the hand before returning them to the duplicate tray.
- As declarer, if you can clearly see that all the remaining tricks are yours, you can claim them rather than play on.
 You must clearly specify how you will play the hand and draw all the outstanding trumps.
- Don't be a slow player or bidder. This can spoil the enjoyment of playing bridge for all the other plays in the room.

- 10. Don't give advice unless it's asked for.
- 11. If you do want to discuss a hand at the table, do it very quietly (otherwise people who haven't yet played it might hear you). If you do well, don't overly compliment yourself on a bid or the play until the opponent leaves the table. This behaviour could really annoy your opponents and result in a negative experience.
- 12. Lastly... no eating (we don't want sticky cards), turn your mobile phones off and enjoy!

Feedback: Bridge Crash Course for Beginners January 2018



Background

- Attended by 23 people (19 members, 4 non-members)
- Feedback below based on 15 responses
- There is now a waiting list of 8 people for the next course.

Scores

Tutor	5.9 out of 6 = 99%	84%

- Compared to 2017 Adam (the tutor) had a much higher rating.
- Food and beverage scored worst (and worse than last year).
- NB: Everyone said it met their expectations.

Most valuable part of course:

- All of it (mentioned several times).
- The card practice, then the run through of the play / The mixture of content and practice was excellent.
- The practice play.
- The explanations.
- The guidance by helpers.
- The handouts.
- · The bidding rules and frequent recaps.
- The opening bids and re-bids.
- The Andrew Robson special arrow cards.
- It was very sociable.

What would they suggest next time:

- Have slides as handouts (NB: Sent to some who requested them after the lesson finished.)
- Simplify the handouts.
- · Clearer rules/guidelines on changing tables partners mixing in, or staying as pairs.
- · More playing or practice miss the lunch.
- . Bit too fast at times (one comment) vs. fast pace but points the way to where to get practice.

Other comments

- "A tremendous amount of information covered so clearly."
- "So glad I took the plunge and signed up, Many thanks to the organisers! Well done."
- "Thanks so much to the whole team! Great preparation and it held my interest throughout."
- "Really interesting and enjoyable. Thank you."
- "This was excellent thank you."
- "This has certainly stirred my interest more than I expected."
- "As a reluctant pupil I now definitely feel inspired to continue to learn and play with similar people (but not too seriously!)."

Conclusions

- Most said they would continue: 86% said definitely, 14% said possibly.
- Preferences for future learning? Of the 8 who answered this question, 6 said Thursdays at the club, and 4 said Walker Hall on Monday's with Adam and 4 said lessons with Adam (not Mondays). The rest said they would practice at home (to consolidate), play with friends (non-members) and one said the U3A.
- 40% (6) asked to be added to the bridge what's app group.

Changes next time

- Reception need to be told they MUST take payments when booking and contact details to prevent unpaid no shows.





This links us to the EPC's vision.

Bridge at the EPC will provide fun and foster friendship.


