Hereford Bridge Club is hosting the qualifying round of the National Pairs at 7 pm on Tuesday, February 8th, 2011. All bridge players are eligible to enter this competition and will be most welcome.

This is a national competition. About one third of the pairs at the qualifying round will be invited to take part in the Regional Final at Bristol Bridge Club on March 20th. The top pairs at the Regional Final qualify to go on to play in the National Final at Hinckley Island on April 16th & 17th.

Entry fees for the qualifying round will be £9 per pair, payable at the event. Table money of £40 per pair will be charged at both the Regional and the National Finals.

Hereford Bridge Club meets at Saxon Hall off Hoarwithy Road, Putson, Hereford, at 7 pm every Tuesday. The National Pairs will be open everybody and we hope as many members of the County as possible will enter. You are welcome to turn up on the night, but it would be better if you could book a place in advance, just in case we run out of space. There's a Welcome in the City

Hereford BC and Wyeside BC are always keen to welcome any players who wish to broaden their experience encourage them to play on Tuesdays or Thursdays.

Since April, Hereford BC has had a quarterly Seminar evening, with a host and the 'visitor' sub waived. Similarly BC Wyeside is hoping to hold welcoming evenings the on Thursdays of March, April & May 2011, commencing with a Seminar, host, sub waived, Level 2 system limit and some post-event hand analyses either by e mail or website.

One of the Hereford Seminars was 'Why and How to Count', based on the book 'Countdown to Winning Bridge' by Tim Bourke & Marc Smith (Master Point Press).

As Declarer, in addition to....


- always count your tricks before you play to trick one
- decide which suits to count
- remember the bidding
- count the points from a 'limited' hand (1NT opener)
- delay the crucial decision (finesse etc) until the latest possible moment

you also need to....

• discover each Defenders' shape.

Sometimes the Defence will help you by pre-empting (7 card suit), opening a weak two (6 card suit) or showing a two-suited hand (minimum 5 / 5).

Here is a Hand to play (as South), after 1♥, 2♥ (showing at least 5/5 in the black suits), X, 2♠, 3♥, Pass...you? 3 NT – why not? This is a good choice as 4♥ fails on the Club ruff.



The Q♠ lead runs round to your K. If hearts are 3/2 you can scrape home, but . . STOP! You know ten of West's cards but must find out what he/she holds in the red suits. You play the Q♥ and all follow – great. Now you lead a small diamond to the Ace & back to the King – what? Yes, to discover West's exact distribution - 5,1,2,5. Now you play a small heart and finesse with confidence, making 1 spade, 6 hearts & 2 diamond tricks.

What happens when West shows out on the Q♥? Oh dear! Diamonds are now 3/3 and you will have to finesse through your J♦ – and go 2 down. That's Bridge!
