

Don't Forget – As declarer, when you can take a trick with one of equal honors, take the trick with the higher equal. It is far more deceptive.

E.g., playing in NT w/♠KQx. If a low ♠ is led and RHO plays the J and assuming you wish to take the trick play the K. West may assume partner has the Q as she would play the J from QJ.

Do the same w/AQJ. If a low card is played and RHO plays the 10 play the Q. LHO will probably assume her partner has the J as she would play the 10 from J10.



Is Bridge Really Difficult

If you were complaining to a nonbridge player about how difficult the game of bridge was and you told them that there were only 15 words in the bridge vocabulary do you think they may think you are a bit of a dunce or a complainer?

Those 15 words are: pass, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, spades, hearts, diamonds, clubs, double, redouble and notrump.



"It is important to understand why we learn conventions. They are tools to help us better communicate with partner. But we must become a craftsman and learn to use our tools effectively. Until we do, we will not be able to get the most out of them.

The process of learning to use a new convention can be a difficult one. We will often take one step back (make mistakes or have bidding mix-ups) in an effort to move forward. It is important for us to recognize this and realize that adopting a new convention and learning to use it effectively is a long-term investment in improving our game."

Don't Forget

When giving partner a ruff, the card you lead is Suit Preference Signal telling partner which suit to return after the ruff.



The following bids are where I find newer players resisting the most. I have heard almost every excuse in the book for not using them.

Why? I have no idea. They are extremely simple and convey a ton of information with responder's single bid. Once you use one of them opener knows exactly what you, as responder, hold. They are:

If partner opens a major and you hold two-card support with 6-9 HCP your bid is 1NT. That is unless partner opened 1♥ and you held 4♠, then, of course, you would respond 1♠.

This is a very precise bid and tells partner exactly what you hold. E.g.,

♦AJ432 **♦**109 **∀**KQ4 **∀**J32 **♦**A32 **♦**QJ54 **♣**983 **♣**AJ107

If partner opens major and you hold two-card support and 10-12 HCP your bid is 2NT. Unless you hold a five-card suit of your own. If partner had opened 1♥ and you held a four-card ♠ suit, you of course, would bid 1♠.

This is a very precise bid and tells partner exactly what you hold. E.g.,

♠AJ432 **♠**Q9 **♥**KQ4 **♥**J32 **♦**OJ54



If partner opens a minor and you hold 6-9 HCP and no four card major your bid is 1NT.

♣AJ43 **♣**Q109 **★**RQ4 **★**1032 **♣**A32 **♣**Q54 **♣**983 **♣**AJ107

If partner opens a minor and you hold 10-12 HCP and no four card major your bid is 2NT.
This is a very precise bid and tells

This is a very precise bid and tells partner exactly what you hold. E.g.,

♣AJ43 **♣**Q109 **★**KQ4 **♥**J32 **♣**AJ2 **♣**QJ54 **♣**983 **♣**AJ107

Partner opens a minor and you hold 13-15 HCP and no four card major your bid is 3NT.
This is a very precise bid and tells partner exactly what you hold. E.g.,

≜AJ43 **≜**Q109 **∀**KQ4 **∀**J32 **≜**AJ2 **♣**KQJ54 **≜**983 **≜**AJ107

When you resist using these responses you must always remember:

Bidding is a conversation between you and your partner. The more precise your bidding is the more accurate will be your contracts.

One advantage of bad bidding is that you get practice at playing atrocious contracts. Alfred Sheinwold

MAKING A PLAN Suit Contract

Don't play to the first trick too quickly. STOP and think when dummy comes down. LOOK ahead and plan your play to at least the next few tricks.

Concentrate on the opening lead for a few seconds. Decide what it tells you about the leader's length or strength in that suit.

Mentally review the bidding. If one of your opponents has bid, try to come up with a general picture of his point-count and his length in the suit bid.

For most suit contracts, your **PLAN** should be:

- 1 Count your losers. Which ones can be disposed of or turned into winners (by trumping, finessing or discarding them on a side suit).
- 2 Look at each suit and estimate how many tricks it offers -- top tricks and tricks that will be good after you establish the suit.
- 3 If your plan calls for trumping one or more of your losers in the short-trump hand (usually dummy), do that before you lead trumps -even if you have to give up tricks to set up the trumping position.

- 4 Next, lead trumps, counting as the opponents follow to each trick. Pulling trumps will usually be your best plan if you have good honor strength and/or length in one or more of the outside suits.
- 5 After you've collected all the opponents' trumps, lead your longest side suit. Give up your losers early.
- 6 Last, cash honors in your short suits. Continued page 8.

TIPS

You cannot defend properly unless you remember the bidding.

You cannot defend properly if you make faces or show other signs of disapproval.

You cannot defend or play properly unless you count.

If partner makes a nice play please compliment her/him.


Consider your opening lead. The fate of many contracts is determined by that one card. Use the bidding as a guide.


Take your time before playing third hand to the first trick it is often times the most important play you will make in the entire hand.


Kantor bridge tips

PLAN FOR NO TRUMP (continued from p. 4.)

- 1 Count your winners and potential winners. If you don't have enough top tricks to make your contract, decide which suit offers you the best chance of creating more winners.
- 2 Lead that suit first (normally it will be longest side suit). Give up the tricks you have to lose early.
- 3 Keep leading the suit until you've established your tricks (count the defenders' cards as you go), then cash your winners in the suit. When you move to a different suit, start counting again.
- 4 Last, cash honors in your short suits.
