Disturbing Opponents Club (DOC) by Dave Dressman

Following the 2015 clarification of allowable conventions versus natural bids including a 1. (could be short) and building upon Marty Bergen's Disturbing Opponent's No Trump (DON'T) defense, DOC is a way to show all possible 2 suiters over a 1. or a 2. opening bid at the lowest level.

DOC can also be used by right hand opponent of the opener if there is an artificial response to the 1. opener, and over a short Precision 1. opening bid.

DOC is ubiquitous. It can be used versus a natural 14, any "could be short" 14, a precision style big 4, an artificial 24 or any combination thereof that you choose. The natural bids it replaces occur less frequently and can be handled another way.

DOC is easy to remember because the **anchor suit** is always the suit above the artificial call. We assume 4-5, 5-4 or better distribution for two suits. Here is the structure versus 1C:

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1NT transfers to ♣ and shows ♣ and another suit;
2♣ transfers to ♦ and shows ♦ and a higher ranking suit;
2♦ transfers to ♥ Showing both Majors.
2♥ and 2♠ are Natural
2N (If the 1♣ opener is artificial), marionettes to 3♣ and shows a 1 suited hand.
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These bids are Alerts.

Versus an artificial 2♣ the same logic applies 1 level higher.

Responses (alertable):

1st step: I prefer this suit.

2nd step: I don't like your anchor suit. Pass if this is your suit or correct if not.

3rd step (not including 2NT): I don't like your anchor suit and hate the one above it.

2NT: Further describe your hand. Rebid 3♣ with a minimum.

Anchor suit advances are preemptive.

Other responses are by agreement, or default to a decent 1 suiter.

Other rebids are very rare and show a monster unless you discuss and agree to the contrary.
