Which Suit To Open?

Background

- Most of the time it's obvious to bid NT or your one long suit, but two-suited hands and present some problems.
- In the November 2016 Bridge Bulletin, Marty Bergen wrote an excellent article explaining which suit is best to open in a variety of situations.

Special 6-5 Situations

- Note with 6-5 and Rule of 20, you only need 9
 hcp mostly in your suits to open.
- Principle 1. If your 6-card suit is higher ranking, OPEN IT!
- Principle 2. With 6 clubs and 5 spades, OPEN 1 CLUB.
- Remaining discussion will be about hands where your 5 card suit is higher ranking.

Principle 3

- Principle 3. If one suit is much, much better than the other, OPEN IT.
- With: ♣ ▼87543 ◆AKQ1097 ♣Q2 open 1 diamond because this feels more like 7-4 than 6-5. I hate to lose the 5-card major!!!
- With: ♠ VAKQJ4 ◆987632 ♣AQ open 1 heart even though you are strong enough to reverse. Emphasize hearts. Principle 3 takes priority over 4 and 5.

Principle 4

If you are not strong enough to reverse, open your higher ranking suit.

With ♠AQ972 ♥A97542 ♦6 ♣3

Open 1 Spade with this minimum.

With ♠7 ♥AK964 ♦Q ♣K108763

Open 1 Heart and have an easy rebid of 2C over 1 Spade or 1NT. If you open 1C and Partner bids 1S, you are not strong enough to reverse.

Principle 5

- If you are strong enough to reverse, open the longer suit.
- Note that you need 17+ HCP to reverse with a 5-4 hand, but with 6-4 you don't need 17, and with 6-5 you can reverse with a lot less than 17 HCP!

Principle 5 Continued

With ♠ 74 ♥ - ♦ AQ942 ♣ AK10986

Open 1 Club. This hand is much better than the obvious 13 HCP! When you reverse into diamonds and then rebid that suit, Partner will know you have 6+ clubs and a big hand.

Five-Five Hands

- This one is easy!
- Just open the higher ranking suit!
- Don't unnecesarily reverse. Partner may not notice!

Four-Four Minors

- Many players always open 1 diamond to avoid a possible reverse.
- But with a balance minimum hand, you simply plan on rebidding 1NT regardless of which minor you opened.
- Other players open the stronger suit for the lead.

Al Roth and Marty Bergen

- Roth and Bergen disagreed on the strength required for an opening bid, but they both agreed on always opening 1 Club with a balanced 4-4 hand.
- How would you respond to 1 Diamond with
 - ♠7 ♥653 ♦Q65 ♣A85432

Would you be happy responding 1NT?

Three-Card Major Raises

If you've open 1 of a minor and Partner bids 1
 Spade

```
♠KQ10 ♥52 ♦ 8642 ♣AK98
```

 Just bid 2 Spades. This is less of a lie than 1NT and with 3 honors, even a 4-3 fit can work well.

Another Argument for One Club

- How about ♠J3 ♥965 ♦AK5 ♣K7542
- If playing 2/1, what would you bid over Partner's 1 Diamond Opening?
- If you always open 1 club with this type of hand Partner will have easy responses even if he raises diamonds with only 3.
