By using Jacoby 2N South is able to lock onto the spade fit very quickly. In these auctions it can be very useful to warn responder that the opener has a very minimum hand. We do that by jumping directly to game and use lower level bids (where we have more space) to develop better hands. North has an aceless twelve count (including a none-too-great king knave doubleton in diamonds). South has a little in reserve for his 2N bid but respects partner's bid.

East does best to protect his minor suit holdings by not leading from there. A heart or a neutral trump work well. Left to his own devices declarer will finesse against ♥K and lead up to ♣K. Neither play is successful but the contract is assured – six spades, a heart, two diamonds and a club ruff.

It's also worth noting that when the auction follows this path, little is revealed about the responder's hand (apart from the good trump holding).

East has a decent fourteen count and good shape (5431). When East shows a splinter in diamonds West's holding of three small cards couldn't be much better. West has controls in the other side suits (not to mention good trumps) and can invoke RKCB. Partner's reply means that East West have four of the five key cards and they have the trump queen too. With only one missing and knowing of the singleton diamond West can raise 5♠ to slam.

Because of East's known diamond holding South can lead an aggressive ♦J with impunity (the lead is not going round to what could be an embarrassing ♦AQ in the East hand). North wins the first trick and exits with a neutral, second diamond. Declarer can play reasonable carefully by drawing two rounds of trumps (including playing one of dummy's honours) then ruffing a club low. He comes to hand with a heart to the ace and ruffs the other club high. East's hand is reached through another diamond ruff. The third trump is drawn and the contract is claimed. The 3-1 trump break made the hand a little trickier.

With the trump suit agreed at a low level opener has a series of informative continuations. Here he is able to make a splinter bid in diamonds. Partner has length there but the holding is so poor (in terms of hcps) that he appreciates that there is no wastage in the suit. If partner has ♥A, ♣A and the king and queen of trumps, 6♠ will be very playable. He uses RKCB and then a delayed ask for the queen of trumps. Opener answers in the affirmative and the 26 hcp slam is reached. With six trumps and a known ten+ card fit, North would have pretended to hold the queen of trumps even if the spades were king high.</p> <p>There is little to the play.
