Green Point Weekend September 2019

The marketing of this event seems to be reaching an ever-wider audience. 143 people played in the pairs this year that did not play in the pairs in 2018. The equivalent number for the team event was 123, also slightly more than 80 people played this year who had not played in a Surrey event before. Nevertheless compared with 2018 we were down 5 tables in the Pairs and 3 tables in the Teams. The expectation is that this was largely due to the change of date so next year we hope to see a recovery as we will then be reverting to our usual date of the end of September (for your calendars this is now confirmed as 26 & 27 September 2020)

We contacted all those who were new in 2019 and all those from 2018 who did not participate in 2019 to seek their comments. This resulted in very many positive comments about the event, venue and organisation. Nevertheless there were some concerns raised about the prices of tea and coffee, some noises in the room, the quality of the PA system and unfortunately, one or two comments about upsetting behaviour at one or two of the tables. As a result we have contacted the Spectrum and hope to address the concerns raised relating to the venue for next year. The behaviour issue is one we take very seriously and as a result of the concerns raised we included this as a major discussion point at the Chairman's Consultation held at Bookham on 13 November which is reported in the next section.

Chairman's Consultation

This now regular event was held at Bookham on 13 November. It is an excellent opportunity for clubs and the SCBA committee to interact and to share problems and solutions relating to running clubs and the County organisation. This year we had 64 attendees representing, directly or indirectly almost 30 of Surrey's 46 affiliated clubs. Three topics were covered in the lunch break:

- Club Director Training: Richard Banbury gave a useful and thought provoking presentation on the role of a club director as well as explaining how information about future training events can be obtained.
- Membership Campaign: This topic was led by Meena Samani and involved presentations from Peter Exworthy (Leatherhead), Moira Nairn and Penny Moody (Camberley) who described the work they have done in increasing membership at their clubs by tapping into the large number of social Bridge players in their area and providing them a means to transition from social Bridge to club Bridge. The key lesson here is that there are a lot of people playing social Bridge but who find the idea of going to a club rather daunting. If we can make that step less frightening then we can have an immediate and significant impact on club membership. Details of the discussion in the breakout session are covered in the next section.
- Making Bridge More Welcoming: This topic was led by Suleman Akhtar. The main thrust of this topic was
 that there is no point in bringing new people in to our clubs or our County events if we allow one or two
 individuals to put them off coming again. We need to make it okay to complain about poor behaviour when
 it occurs and we need to be firm with the culprits. Details of the discussion in the breakout session are
 covered in the section after next.

The primary purpose of the event was to discuss the above issues, but we also managed to squeeze in a few hands of bridge – the top three pairs were:

Membership Campaign by Meena Samani A Blueprint for growing Club Membership - Surrey Success Stories

There is a buzz around Camberley, Leatherhead, Selsdon and Kenley Bridge clubs, to name just a few, who have recruited new players and encouraged and eased their way to regular duplicate play.

Each club took a view that new Bridge players were not just walking in to the club, that there are many social Bridge players who may have considered joining a club, but were daunted by duplicate play and the standard of play at a club and so the clubs needed to facilitate and encourage the players to try out duplicate play in a friendly and supportive way.

Camberley Bridge club is a major success story, from new player recruitment to execution of a very well thought out approach. Under the leadership of the Chairman Val Foster, Moira Nairn and Penny Moody have worked together to bring in new members. Moira focussed on **recruiting and advertising**, particularly to local U3A groups, where many people learn and play social Bridge, local and parish magazines, letter to Mr Bridge and on social media. Penny developed a series of 8 **Transition Play** lessons, with the focus on duplicate etiquette (e.g. Stop, Alert, leading face down), scoring and developing a partnership system card, together with making up hands with these themes, so that the players could practice.

These classes have been full, each time Camberley has run them, and a third class is planned for January. In addition, Camberley run **Supervised play** sessions, with club players volunteering to help at each table. Membership to the club is free and included for anyone joining these Transition classes.

Similarly, Peter Exworthy at Leatherhead also advertised 'Move up to Club Bridge' sessions with the help of John Cumming, a local Bridge Teacher, which is a mix of a learning topics and Supervised Play.

At the recent Surrey Clubs Chairman meeting, Camberley and Leatherhead clubs detailed how they went about each step and the lessons learned, after which there were breakout sessions on Bridge Development and Best Behaviour. Using the graphic above as a starting point, we talked as a group as to how each club could grow their membership, using a similar approach. There are 2 strands — recruiting social players to club play and working with local Bridge teachers and developing in-house Teachers to teach at the club and transition students to duplicate play via supervised play and / or gentle duplicate play. Both of these can be done in parallel.

The discussions also led to some suggested action plans and items to consider:

- Membership recruitment and Development should ideally be a standard and ongoing activity for club
 committees and members to address to develop a plan with target dates for marketing, recruitment
 and transition to club play, and progress reviewed at each committee meeting.
- In addition to local advertising, there are several free places and platforms where the club can
 advertise local golf, tennis and health clubs and free websites such as Nextdoor, and of course Surrey
 County Bridge website. Geographically close clubs can band together to advertise and run sessions.
- Club members and local Bridge Teachers can help run Transition classes and Supervised play sessions.
- Although there is more work required to run these sessions in parallel to main club sessions, it provides
 greater revenue and word-of-mouth publicity for the club. Daytime sessions are particularly popular
 and the EBU may be able to help financially if there are additional rental costs for venues.
- Bridge and food / drink go well together! Why not have cheese and wine supervised play sessions or coffee and cake sessions to break the ice and create a more relaxed atmosphere.
- It may take time for supervised players to move to the main club they will move when ready to do so.
 But, they can be encouraged to kibitz at the main session and to be mentored by a more experienced
 (but a gentle and patient) player. The first 150 boards played by a new player do not affect their more
 experienced partner's NGS. Subsequent mentoring sessions may use the recently announced Mentor
 code 12, which credits Master points, but does not calculate NGS.
- Clubs can develop Bridge Teachers amongst their members. EBED refunds the cost of the two-day
 Teacher training session to the club. See: http://www.ebedcio.org.uk/club-teacher-training for more
 details.
- Club websites can be more welcoming to new players, with a welcoming message on the front page, together with a contact name and telephone number. Each club could have a 'Learn and Improve' Bridge menu option with a graphic on the learning path (see Surrey or Richmond BC website) with names and contact numbers of local Bridge Teachers. Club websites can also be less serious and more colourful including pictures, photos, members stories, jokes, etc.

The success stories from the Surrey clubs mentioned demonstrates that it is possible to grow a club's membership and attendance, but it requires active leadership, drive and the support and goodwill of all club members.

Making Bridge More Welcoming

We had an excellent and lively discussion, at the Chairman's Consultation, with many useful thoughts discussed. It was clear that all clubs could be more welcoming to new players. Some of the key points arising in the session were:

- 1. A Best Behaviour Code is needed to remind some of what is acceptable and what is not. A number of points were discussed in the session. These have been captured in the following document (click here).
- 2. Notes and Guidance for Those New to Bridge. The objective of this document is to ease the entry of new players into club bridge. An initial draft document is available by clicking here.
- 3. The Elephant in the Room. On a show of hands in the group, every person raised their hand when asked if there was a grumpy member at their club. Such members are stopping people from joining clubs, losing existing members and changing behaviours of existing members (for example, the writer always plays N/S in one club to avoid one unpleasant player). Various thoughts were discussed about how clubs should deal with such members for further details, please click here.

- 4. Pastoral Carer. This concept is to have one person in each club whose role is the welfare and happiness of members, including settling in new players. The idea was well received by most clubs; as a concept, there appears to be nothing lost by trying it. For further notes on this concept, please click here.
- 5. There were a number of other great thoughts for making bridge more welcome. It is suggested that anyone involved with, or interested in, club management skims this list please click here.

We are very keen to have your comments or additions to the points above. The comments and experiences of those relatively new to club bridge is especially important. The above lists were compiled by those who have been playing bridge for many years and, in this context, the experiences of newer players is more valuable. So, please email our editor by clicking here.

For the record, SCBA has zero tolerance to bad behaviour and instructs directors at its events to note those behaving unacceptably. Such people will either be issued with a warning or barred from SCBA events.

Team Play

In previous Newsletters we have asked for volunteers to form a small team to visit clubs that want to run a team event but do not know how to. We now have those volunteers in place so if any club that does not play any team event but would like to try then please let one of the Committee members know.

Anecdotally we are told that one reason Team Bridge is not popular is that pairs find it hard to find other pairs to make up a team. The solution that at least one club has found for this is to allocate pairs to tables randomly on arrival by them drawing a card showing table number and orientation. This has proved very popular and enables people to enjoy playing Team Bridge without putting their NGS at risk. (NGS is determined only by the performance of a pair compared with other pairs that have the same cards. Their teammates have no more influence on their NGS that they would in a normal session.).

If there are an odd number of pairs, i.e. there is a half table, then a simple, normal pairs movement is chosen but the event is scored as a Cross-IMPs event not a Match Point event. This enables people to experience playing teams while coping with a half table. This was explained in detail in an earlier Newsletter and the relevant article is in the Library on our website here.

Finally, just a reminder that our next event is the Affiliated teams of 8 event to be held at Richmond Bridge Club on 12 January. This is a very interesting form of Bridge and we hope that as many clubs as possible will give it a try.

National Awards

A hand is said to be played double dummy if everyone can choose the cards they play with full knowledge of all four hands. So, for instance, declarer need never lose a finesse to a singleton King offside, because it's clear to all the Ace will drop the King.

Here we have our latest Double Dummy Prize Puzzle, for which the prize is free entry to a Surrey event at Oxshott of the winner's choice. On Timbo's DD Grading Scale of GENTLE - TRICKY - TOUGH, I'd say this one is GENTLE. So, although entries from everyone will be warmly welcomed, we're limiting the prize to those of NGS rating Jack or below — it would help me if you could include your NGS rating when you enter. Names of all those submitting correct-first-time solutions will be put in a Morris hat and the winner selected randomly.


Defence Hand for Improvers

Board: 462 Dealer: West Vul: None Contract: 4♠ by West Lead: ♥Q

West North East South

1♠ Pass 4♠ Pass

Pass Pass



We are South defending West's 4 contract.

Our ♠A and ♥AK should be worth three tricks, but we're still going to need some help from North if we are to defeat this contract. At least North has found the best opening lead.

We play the encouraging \checkmark 7 on partner's opening lead of \checkmark Q. North duly continues with \checkmark J. Which card should we play to trick 2?

We want to be on lead to play a diamond through declarer, so we overtake North's ♥J with our ♥K. Even if North started with only two hearts, this can't cost a trick.

We proceed with our plan by switching to \P T (top of a 3 card sequence). Declarer tries \P Q, but North wins with \P K and returns \P 3 to our \P 8 and declarer's \P A. At trick 5 declarer leads \P T, on which North discards \P 2 and we win with \P A.

What should we play at trick 6? The defence has already defeated the contract, but we would like to do better. The best chance for another trick is to defend passively. We therefore just play back our remaining trump. After this declarer can't avoid a club loser and finishes two down.

We achieved this optimal result by overtaking at trick 2, switching to diamonds at trick 3 and later returning a passive trump at trick 6. We avoided the mistakes of conceding a ruff and discard or opening up the club suit.

Transition Group
