


British Summer Sim Pairs

Assuming N/S attempt to scramble to safety, they will alight in a seven-card black fit. Careful play will get them out for one off. Even if doubled, that is only -100.</p> <p>Were West able to get the 1NT in (possibly after a 1-minor opening), then they should be able to make eight tricks on similarly careful play. That is worth +120 to them.</p> <p>A board that demonstrates how stealing part scores when non-vulnerable can be a winning match-point tactic.</p>

A jump cue-bid should suggest a running suit and request partner bid 3NT with a stop in opener's suit. East obliges and then South does what?</p> <p>Double is definitely wrong. With so much playing strength it is right to bid on (with 4♥) and show the shape. Furthermore, E/W have told you that the spades aren't cashing in one go, so you may well not be beating 3NT – as in this case.</p> <p>It now becomes a case of judgement. Who is making what? Who is saving? I don't think it is clear to anyone. E/W have no idea how many clubs, aces and spades are cashing. Equally, when South bids 4♥ and North passes, they have no idea if this is just preference or genuine support and West has to pass before they know which strain N/S actually want to play in. I think you take one 'save' on the West hand as insurance at the favourable vulnerability, but this deal feels like guesswork for all concerned.</p> <p>Par on this deal is 6♣x-3 by E/W, but I get the feeling there will be a large variety of results.</p>

The major point of interest appears to be whether N/S can avoid conceding the overtrick. It will require leading a club at trick one as otherwise E/W have a critical tempo to establish the heart suit for club discards. Most Souths will open 1♣, so that should lead to a rapid +420 when North dutifully leads their suit.</p> <p>Unless E/W somehow contrive to miss game – possibly by East not showing the full value of their hand – or N/S get green vulnerability fever and attempt an ill-judged sacrifice, there won't be too much excitement on this hand.</p>

While there isn't the high card strength, there is some expectation of finding a degree of support opposite, perhaps enabling partner to save or defend as indicated. East would be unlikely to try 4♠ uncontested, but might gamble that the cards are lying well if North bid.</p> <p>As it turns out, 3♠ is the limit of the deal. East doesn't have enough horsepower to double 4♥ and will do well to get two diamond ruffs in partner's hand, although only one is required to get the magic +200.</p> <p>Provisionally, pushing E/W into 4♠ doesn't look a disaster, but look more closely. Unless clubs are led twice from North, there is a squeeze on South in the minors when the spades get run.</p> <p>So it seems that that on this particular deal, North's silence is indeed a virtue!</p>

In practice this will likely result in reaching a 3NT contract that isn't makeable without help from the defence, possibly with an auction along the lines of 1♣-1♠-2♣-2N-3N.</p> <p>Nothing wrong with that, but this deal shows the power of having controls when playing or defending 3NT – not that it is possible for either East or West to tell this for certain.</p> <p>South's best lead is a top heart – and it is indicated by the auction. North should signal positively for attitude and with N/S controlling the side suits, E/W would be held to just seven tricks.</p> <p>Should E/W manage to stop in a club partial, they will no doubt score very highly.</p>

Is there a way to bid it with any degree of confidence?</p> <p>After a 1♠ opening, West is too good for a limit raise and should establish a force. Most partnerships have a 2NT response available for that purpose now. Continuations now will depend on the precise response scheme the pair has, but East may show their shortage and West will cue-bid hearts – pairs should be able to cue-bid below game without promising extras if their hand has some suitability. East may now consider looking slamwards knowing that West would have signed off with total wastage and nothing suitable fitting in the red suits.</p>

It is difficult to construct intelligent auctions that finish in anything other than 4♥ (or possibly 5♥).</p> <p>It would appear that the only chance of a twelfth trick is if declarer leads a club back towards hand and South is caught napping. If West had made a slam try (perhaps via Keycard) and discovered two missing cashers, then South should be alert to this possibility and fly up with the ace pronto. On more murky auctions it may not be quite so clear as to West’s intentions.</p>

Many Wests will take advantage of the position and vulnerability (First, NV it is normally right to be a little more aggressive) and open 3♥. North will double, and East should barrage with 4♥ holding precious four-card support. This will come back round to North, who is now stuck with bidding 4♠. I don’t think it is realistically possible for South to guess to make a move. Besides, on many days the diamond ace will be offside and slam will be unmakeable.</p> <p>Were N/S to get a free run, is it possible to get anywhere near?</p> <p>After 1♠ – 2♠ (best to raise with three card support and a bit of shape), twelve tricks do look a long way off and North should just subside in game.</p> <p>Whichever way you look at it, +480 to N/S seems the most likely outcome.</p>

Holding 6-6 in the minors, West’s best strategy is to pass and hope they can make an ‘unusual’ style bid later in the auction to show both of their suits at once. Opening a pre-empt simply won’t give partner any idea of the true nature of the hand.</p> <p>East can open 1♠, South will overcall 2♦ and now the 6-6 hand may be silenced for good! North too may find it difficult to respond and instead just hope to go plus. 4♥ is playable for N/S, but only 3NT is makeable.</p> <p>If North dredges up a light/panicky/aggressive* 2NT response then game will be reached. With every card in the slot, making 3NT will not prove unduly challenging.</p> <p>(*delete as appropriate)</p>

The East hand isn’t quite good enough to jump rebid 3♥, although if the spade queen was in the diamond suit, the extra playing strength would tip the balance for me.</p> <p>South has a standout (passive) spade lead and from there declarer will twist and turn and probably end up with eight tricks unless the defence slips. Although the diamond suit is a two-way guess, the queen is located on the natural side to attempt four tricks in the suit. While the heart suit could be brought in for one loser, in practice declarer will use their one entry to dummy to take the trump finesse. Should declarer attempt ace and another, they will see the 8 drop on the first round, but it looks far too big a position to play to drop Kx.</p>

All the conditions are there – good source of primary tricks and fast tricks outside. It may be possible for them to stop low if the extent of North’s distribution comes to light. Then the likely bad offside club break becomes a real possibility.</p> <p>In practice though, after 1♣, South will bid 1♦ – always a good idea to test opponents negative double agreements by overcalling one minor suit with the other. 1♥ from West, 1♠ by North and now East has a rebid issue. Although only 13 points, their cards are well-suited and it is close to a 3♣ upgrade.</p> <p>Should they do so, then game will be reached. Otherwise after a 2♣ rebid West has a minimal game try and at match-points may well just subside. However, if game is reached, South is in an ideal position to maximise their gains with a sharp double. A 300 penalty will be the reward.</p>

West will open 1♦ and silence North in the process, thus allowing E/W an uninterrupted path to their final resting place. The question will be how the partnership shows the 6-5 shape in the majors after a 1♦-1♠-2♣ start. Some pairs may play a jump to 3♥ as that hand, although the modern style is for that to be a splinter. Others will have to bid 2♥ Fourth Suit Forcing and then bid 3♥ over the 3♣ response. West will then complete their pattern with 3♠ and East will opt for the 4♠ game.

On any lead declarer can establish the heart suit with a ruff. The key point seems to be whether they can divine the trump position and hold their losers in the suit to just the one. Any trump leads may give the lie away, whereas leaving declarer to their own devices (assuming North doesn't split prematurely) will probably see them put the nine in and lose to the doubleton ten. Scoring the full +450 will do very well for E/W.

Board 25 : Dealer North : E/W vulnerable

A routine game for N/S, so the key will be for the defence to hold it to ten tricks. Declarer may have difficulty untangling their pointed suit winners without generating an extra trick for the defence, so provided East does not release the ♣AK prematurely, declarer might find it hard to make eleven tricks.

The interest may therefore lie on the choice between 3NT and 4♥. The former makes the same number of tricks, so will scoop more vital match-points. Is there any reason for N/S to decide to play there?

After 1♦ – 2♥ (Strong) – 2♠ – 3♥ it is difficult for North to gamble out 3NT without the club stop and knowing that the hearts are absolutely solid. Should North pass initially, the auction may proceed 1♥-2♦-3♥ and now 3NT is more likely.

Board 26 : Dealer East : All vulnerable

The test here is for E/W to reach game and the right one at that. After 1♣ and a 1♥ overcall (minimal but you have to get those good suits in), those who have the agreement that 1♠ guarantees five cards will be well placed. If 1♠ could only be four, then when North puts the pressure on with a raise (to 3♥ is best), East might elect to try 3NT if unsure about an eight card fit. Those in the Strong and Five brigade will play in spades, probably at a level determined by the extent of bidding by N/S.

The play in 4♠ does require a little care though. The diamonds have to be established before trumps are drawn or a second loser in the suit will be created. However, with the trump pips being so secure, there should be no major alarms for declarer.

N/S are essentially passengers on this deal and will only get a good score if E/W fall from grace and don't collect their game.
