"No Play" or "Late Play"

A director has many roles to fill at each game. Before the game starts they are responsible for arranging the room for play such as putting out the bid boxes, table mats, pencils, convention cards, setting up the computer, etc.

At game time they determine the type of movement to be used, collect and account for the entry fees, and enter the players names in the computer system.

At the end of the game the director must tabulate the results and make them available to the players, post the results om the web site, send a file with the results to the head director, store all excess equipment and material, and make sure the room is secure.

Of course a major part of a director's job is to ensure that the game runs in an efficient and orderly manner, that the laws are correctly and impartially enforced, and the playing environment is such that our members will have a pleasant and enjoyable experience.

Part of the task of creating an enjoyable environment is to make sure the game runs in a timely manner. The ACBL offers several guidelines. "Bridge is a timed event."* ACBL guidelines are that 15 minutes per board be allocated per round. "The director has an obligation to players not to allow one or two persons to make the game unpleasant for the majority,"*

The directors have to balance the rights of players to be given time to think during their auction and play against the rights of others who must wait for slow players to finish. Not only is it irksome to be waiting to get to the next board but the waiting parties are then losing time to play their next round. It should also be noted that slow play by one table impacts not only players at that table and the ones waiting to move to the table but also to the players at the next table who are waiting for the players to come to their table.

The guidelines suggest offenders should be warned when there is a late play and given one round to get back on schedule. If they do not get back on schedule either a late play or no play should be assigned. Directors have a discretionary option of assessing a penalty for persistent slow play.

Our directors generally adhere to the ACBL time guidelines but we also understand that some times we need extra time to play and bid particular hands and we take that into consideration when dealing with slow play. Our policy is quite well understood and fair. When a table has not started play on a board and the allotted time has expired and all the other players in the game are finished the director should advise the players not to play the hand. If the bidding has completed but play has not started the players should be advised not to play the hand.

The question of whether the board is to be a "late play" or "No play" has to be then determined. The question is purely up to the discretion of the director. Generally however there is not enough time at the end of a session for a "late play" so it is normally deemed to be a "no play". It is a question of available time for the room. In our games that start at 1:00 PM we have to vacate the room by 4:20 PM In our 6:30 PM games we have to be out by 9:50 PM. It should be remembered that a director's job is not done when the final results are posted. After posting the results for the players they must print out summary sheets; post the results on the web; make a copy of the file to be sent to the head director so it can be sent to the ACBL; make sure all the supplies and equipment (pencils, conventions cards, electronic scoring pads, table mats etc) have been stored; and the computer shut down aand sceured. All these tasks have to be completed before the room is considered vacated.

As noted in my article in June 2014 a "no play" has no affect on the pair's overall result. If the pair has a 60% game with a no play it's final result will be 60%. The pair's final result is based purely on the number of boards it did play.

As players we appreciate the fact that we want to play all of the boards at every game but sometimes a director has to determine that it is not in the best interest of the others in the field.

Checking the Hands from The Common Game

Many member of the club have expressed concern about how well The Common Game (TCG) hands fit with the expectations for randomly dealt bridge hands. Fortunately, the probabilities for the shape of hands, card combinations, and distribution of high card points have been worked out and are well understood. For example, we know that the chance that the next hand will have a 4432 shape in some combination of suits is 21.55%. The average number of HCP in a hand is 10, and 91% of hands will have somewhere between 3 and 16 HCP.

We also have loads of data from the actual TCG hands. We can inspect the actual deals for evidence that they meaningfully deviate from the expected norms for randomly dealt bridge hands. Thanks to TCG, I have hand records for both day and night games from July 23, 2013 through August 20, 2014. This is a total of 394 games that represent 14,184 boards and 56,736 hands each for day and night games. So far, I have analyzed only the day game data. The night game data will provide an independent "hold out" sample to check any significant findings that arise from the day game analysis.

For an example of testing the actual frequencies in the hand record data against the theoretical frequencies, let's look at the number of hands with a void in any suit. The theoretical percent probability that a hand will have one or more voids is 5.12%. Further, the statistical formulas that account for the variability across samples tell us that 90% of the samples of 14,184 random bridge hands will have somewhere between 4.81% and 5.42% hands with at least one void. Looking at the North hands in the data, we find there are 727 hands with voids of the 14,184 total hands or 5.13% – well within the 90% boundaries calculated above. For East, South, and West, the percentage of voids are 5.03%, 5.01%, and 5.27% respectively.

With the large data set at our disposal, the statistical tests are extremely sensitive. Let's <u>suppose</u> that the deal generator had a bias and was actually dealing hands where 6.00% had voids. As a player, you would see about one extra void hand every three games – pretty hard to observe without keeping careful records. Yet the test in the example above would detect the bias over 99.8% of the time. The test would not miss even a small difference like the one between 5.12% and 6.00%.

Using overall sample, several aspects of the TCG hands were tested. These were:

- 1. The frequency of hand shapes, e.g., 4333, 4432, 4441, 5332, etc.
- 2. The percentages of voids and singletons in the hands
- 3. The direction, suit, and denomination of singletons
- 4. The distribution of high card points (HCP) for both players and partnerships

None of these tests found any violation of the statistical expectations for bridge hands.

We all know that a given card, like the 8 of spades, will be in our hand 25% of the time, on average. We also know that it does not show up every fourth hand, like clockwork. Rather, the sequence is "clumpy" – sometimes we get the spade 8 three hands in a row, other times we won't have it for 6 hands. Statisticians use a "Runs" test (nothing to do with the Norwalk virus) to look at patterns in the presence/absence of a value in a sequence of like TCG deals. The Runs test is sensitive to manipulation of a series of data points. People tend to think that random data are "choppier" than they really are.

ANOTHER EXAMPLE OF THE GREATNESS OF OUR VILLAGE PLAYERS: BY HENRY HOOD

Let me tell you about one of my occasional partners and some of the things he does at the bridge table and away from the bridge table. First of all, he plays with his wife! Wow, I don't think I could. (I mean playing bridge with my wife!) As a matter of fact, I am sure I could not. But, I am also sure that I would be delighted to have his wife as my partner. I only get to play with him every other Thursday, but I wish it could be more often. After each session, he takes the time to e-mail me about certain hands of interest taking much time to educate me as to how the hand should have been played or how we managed to get fixed like the neighborhood cat and very little could be done to avoid it. In the middle of one of our games, he asked me if I was playing bridge or poker. I assume making reference to some of my bids. But, he always does this with a smile and a genuine effort to help me to become a better player and partner.

The following was shared with me by Alex Booke. The incident happened during the very first board of a recent game. Alex was playing with his wife Sandy against Mr. Lee Esworthy and wife Kay. The very first board was hotly contested ending up with Team Alex playing five hearts doubled. When the dust cleared, the Booke team was down two for a score of minus 300!

They proceeded to play the next two boards without incident, and upon completion were sitting around chatting, waiting for the next round to be called. Lee asked his wife to see her first hand and discovered that Kay had revoked on the second trick. The hand was long over and scored and accepted by all and by rule Lee was not obliged to say anything, but he insisted the Director be summoned. Paul came over and all the details were explained, resulting in a reverse in fortune for Alex and Sandy, going from minus 300 to a plus of 650!

His honesty should be a shining example to all. Kay commented "That's my Lee!" with a show of pride. He had counted the hand and determined that Kay could not have a singleton diamond and therefore the results. Alex and Sandy were so touched that they asked me to share with all.

Mr. Lee Esworthy is quite a guy! I will miss our every other Thursday games as he has headed north!


INTERFAITH HOLOCAUST REMEMBERANCE AT ST. TIMOTHY CATHOLIC CHURCH

WE WILL NEVER FORGET

The pain is still right below the surface. On Tuesday, April 14, survivors of the Holocaust, their families and their liberators joined together with others in the community to commemorate the genocide at St. Timothy Catholic Church.

The interfaith Holocaust Remembrance, attended by hundreds of local residents, focused on what it meant to rescue a Jew during the Holocaust and on who the rescuers were.



Others carried the memories of parents, grandparents and loved ones who lived and died during the Holocaust. Miriam Apfel was separated from her family at age 12, taken from her home in Sosnowiec, Poland, to work for the SS in Markshtat. She had lied and told the soldiers that she was 16 and had offered herself in place of her father in order to spare his life. By the end of the war, only Miriam and nine other family members had survived. She had lost more than 100 members of her family, including her parents.

Holocaust Remembrance Day, or Yom Hashoah, begins today (April 14) at sundown.

Yom Hashoah, established by the Israeli parliament in 1951, coincides with the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising and with the liberation of the concentration camps in western Europe, according to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

Guest speaker at the Interfaith Holocaust Remembrance in The Villages was Stanlee Stahl from the Jewish Foundation for the Righteous. The foundation was formed to learn and be inspired by those heroic people who risked their own lives and the lives of their families to rescue Jews during the Holocaust.

Locker's hope is that history will not repeat itself. He gives of his time to educate others on the tragedy of the Holocaust.

"Lest we forget," Locker said. "Lest we forget."

Sixty-five Villages 299ers Win Silver in Ocala

The ACBL Ocala Spring Sectional Tournament is always one of the most popular tournaments for Villagers, and a year ago a record fifty-one 299ers from The Villages earned silver points there. Then in the April 2015 tournament the record was broken as 65 Villages 299ers (by my count) won silver points.

Dave Harris and Danny Clark won more than 5 silver points on Friday alone, as they had two great games in the 299er pairs - a 67% game on Friday afternoon, and a 62% game that morning.

Alex Birman and Alan Stern finished first in the 299er game on Friday morning with a 65% game, worth 2.4 silver points. Also on Friday morning John Kuyper and Nick Pund scored 62%, tying Jan Gawenda and Bev Magnuson. Just behind them with a 61% game were Barbara Fallone and Mary Jane Garner. A total of 32 pairs participated in the Friday morning 299er game, and 7 of the first 9 finishers were Villagers.

On Friday afternoon, when Dave Harris and Danny Clark had their great 67% game, Jan Gawenda and Bev Magnuson were close behind, at 64%.

In the Saturday morning 299er game, with 36 pairs participating, Villagers took 6 of the top 7 places. Joann Roorbach and Cathy Thomas finished first at 63% (worth 2.89 silver), and the following Villagers also had games above 60% that morning: Barbara Fallone and Mary Jane Garner, Pat DeArmond and Frances Rolph, and Ted and Jo Dicorpo.

In the Saturday afternoon 299er game Villagers took 5 of the top 10 places, with Carol and Jim Fangman having a great 62% game.

Some Villages 299ers won silver points playing with non-299ers in the open game or with non-Villagers. This summary does not cover them, and focuses on pairs of 299er Villagers with games above 60%. Congratulations to all 65 of the 299ers who won silver points in Ocala.
