## DIRECTOR' CORNER

The laws of bridge cover almost all facets of the game, even the most obvious. These are some of the more basic laws.

Law 38 forbids the bidding of a contract of more then seven. So in case you were wondering how to sacrifice after the opponents have bid 7 no trump, you can't. A bid of 8 clubs or diamonds etc is forbidden. Apparently someone in the past tried it so it became necessary to pass a law making it illegal. Nice try!

Law 41 covers the process for making the opening lead. The "presumed" leader (and as we know it is not always the actual leader) should place the opening lead face down in front of them. Only after the lead has been placed face down can leader's partner ask for a review of the auction or for an explanation of any of the bids. Too often the "presumed" leaders ask their partner if they have any questions before placing their lead face down. This is not correct. Only after placing their lead face down should they ask partner if they have any questions. After the lead is faced the dummy's hand should be placed face up in front of him. The correct procedure for exposing the dummy's hand is that their hand is to be "...sorted in suits, the cards in order of rank with the lowest ranking cards toward the declarer, and in columns pointing lengthwise towards declarer. Trumps are placed to dummy's right." Feel free to ask your partner if you have any questions about the process.

Law 65 covers how played cards are to be arranged on the table. When one side wins a trick, "... the card is pointed lengthwise toward his partner." When the opponent's win the trick, "...the card is pointed lengthwise toward the opponents." The Declarer can require a card pointed be changed if it is incorrectly pointed. Also Dummy or either defender may draw attention to a card pointed incorrectly, but only until the lead is made to the following trick. Played cards must be "orderly" arranged in front of each player and should not be disturbed at the end of play until an agreement is reached by both sides as to the number of tricks won.

Law 66 concerns the inspection of tricks played. As long as their side has not led or played to the next trick, a player who has not turned his own card face down may require all played cards to be displayed. Also until a card is led to the next trick, a player is allowed to look at the card they played to the last trick but not expose it to any other player. At the end of the play all played or unplayed cards may be inspected to settle a claim of revoke or the number of tricks won or lost. At no time should a player touch another player's cards. After a claim has been made if a player mixes their cards up in such a manner that a Director is unable to reconstruct their hand, the Director will rule in favor of the other side.

Effective August 1, 2016: Unbalanced 5-4-3-1, 6-3-3-1, and 4-4-4-1 hand patterns may be opened 1NT, provided the singleton is either an $A, K$, or $Q$ with no more than one doubleton. Not allowed are shapely $5-5-$ 2-1 or 6-4-2-1 or 7-2-2-2 hands. One may now open the following hands 1NT: \& -AK109 PAQ92

The hand \&AQ107 『K1092 7 \&AQ105 must be opened 1\& not 1NT.

The change does not impact the one allowable exception of a partnership agreement where 1NT is treated as $100 \%$ forcing opening bid (and not considered "natural") with any distribution. The use of such an unbalanced, non-natural 1NT opening must be alerted.
